The APBA Professional Golf Game is the only one of its kind. Thirty-two of today's top golf professionals perform for you with their woods, irons and putters in astoundingly characteristic fashion—the same degree of accuracy as well as club distance!

You will find Arnold Palmer, Doug Sanders, Jay Hebert nearly always on the fairway with their tee shots, while others, like Dow Finsterwald and Johnny Pott, will not as often be down the middle of the fairway on their long shots off the tees. Slugging George Bayer will average the longest distance off the tees and Mike Souchak, too, will blast the ball for long yardage when you give him the driver!

Billy Maxwell, a deadly accurate iron artist, will be the shortest with his woods off the tees — just as in real life! Gene Littler will rival Maxwell for iron accuracy on your APBA golf course, and you will observe the same similarity to real life in the putting performances of the golfers, too. Billy Casper will prove himself to be just about the master putter for you that he is on all the greens throughout the country. Dow Finsterwald will be characteristically deadly within ten to twelve feet of the cup, and Doug Ford and Mason Rudolph also will be among your outstanding putters. Bob Goalby will prove to be one of your mediocre putters and Arnold Palmer, outstanding as he usually is on the greens, will miss a short putt now and then, just as in real life! However, he and Player and Nicklaus will be among your consistently best golfers in a series of several matches.

You Must Select Their Clubs

As characteristically, however, as these professionals are made to perform for you, they can be made to play quite poorly by you, if you do not choose the proper clubs for each of their shots. With the aid of key distance numbers for woods and irons, shown on each golfer's card, you must decide which club is best for each golf shot and you must take into consideration both the flight of the ball and its roll, especially on shots involving hazards such as sand traps, water or trees.

18 of the Country's Toughest Holes

When your APBA pros tee off on any one of APBA's eighteen holes you may be sure that the setting is a realistic one, for these professionals have actually played these holes many times in their careers.

Every tree, every sand trap, every pond, stream or ocean front is just where it is in real life. The widths of the fairways, the shapes of the greens, the distance from tee to cup, they are in the same place on the same holes in APBA as you would find them if you were actually playing the courses they are made to resemble, for APBA's Golf Course is made up of eighteen of the most challenging and difficult individual golf holes in the United States, as cited by the golf professionals themselves. No two of these holes are from the same course. In full color, showing fairway and rough demarcations, sand traps, bodies of water, trees and greens, they are completely calibrated in black five-yard squares for marking the distances of your shots in any and all directions.


There's the beautiful but treacherous celebrated sixteenth hole at Cypress Point Country Club on the Monterey Peninsula in California. It's APBA's number seventeen, a pai three. Flanked by the blue Pacific ocean, it gives you a moderate sized green, trapped on all sides, to shoot at some 220 yards away. With some of the pros you will use a brassie off this tee, with others a spoon or perhaps a two iron.

Then there's the long 590-yard 14th hole at the Los Angeles Country Club. All but 600 yards long, this par five hole is APBA's number one. It's long and has two large sand traps immediately in front of the green.

Or take APBA's number eleven, a 155-yard par three. This is actually the twelfth hole at Augusta National Golf Course in Augusta, Georgia, home of the famed Masters Tournament. Native pines flank the fairway, a wide stream leads up to the green which is trapped front and back. In the 1959 Masters, Arnold Palmer took four strokes to reach this green, then two-putted for a triple-bogey six. He could do the same for you. He might also par or birdle the hole, or with that very rare break that sometimes comes in the roll of the ball on the green, he might even make; a hole in one! For in APBA it's the same as in the real, living sport itself!





Truly an Innovation in Table Games

Like its famed predecessors, the APBA Major League Baseball Game and APBA Pro Football Game, APBA Professional Golf is the most novel and realistic reproduction of the professional sport it imitates. It is not the typical table golf game with eighteen repetitious fairways and greens, with pure chance determining the strokes per hole.

Each of the thirty-two pros is different from the others and must play each hole according to the types of hazards confronting his particular distance and accuracy potential from tee to green. Some of the holes require several experimental rounds before one can successfully determine which clubs to use for certain types of golfers. A long hitter, like Paul Harney, may be able to play over a hazard, while a short hitter, like Gene Littler, might find it advisable to fall in front of it.

Flight, Direction and Roll —

The golfers don't just hit the ball for a certain lump distance, either. Each shot is broken down into distance of flight and its distance to right or left (if any) and the distance of roll after hitting the ground. And just as in real-life, the shorter the club used, the shorter will be the roll in relation to the overall distance of the shot. When pitching to the green with a 9-iron, the roll may be negligible. With a driver it may be as much as fifty yards! No other golf game does this.

The golfer's accuracy will be reflected in the percentage of shots that go off center or fall short of the intended mark, and it may differ with different types of clubs. Ted Kroll, for example, will be far more accurate with his short irons than with his woods and long irons. Art Wall, a great putter, will not be as impressive with his irons as he is with that putter.

Fairway, Rough and Trap Shots

The effectiveness of these great pros will be affected also by the lie of the ball, for APBA Professional Golf gives different kinds of results for shots made from the fairway and the rough and the sand traps! A shot from the rough or a trap is, of course, more difficult than one from the fairway. This, too, is a completely new feature in golf games.

APBA'S full-color golf holes show the fairway and rough just as they are on the same corresponding holes in real-life. Different shades of green clearly show when a ball is in the rough or on the fairway. An off-center shot may not necessarily drop you in the rough when you are playing on a wide fairway, but beware of those narrow-waisted fairways! They may cause you some trouble!

Varying Lengths of Putts

The professionals putt on APBA's greens with the same proficiency as they do on the procircuit. Here again the lie of the ball determines the golfer's chances for a one putt when he reaches the green. The distance to the hole from one foot all the way out beyond a hundred feet is taken into account when your pro-addresses the ball in preparation to putt in APBA golf. It is important, therefore, that you make a good approach shot to the green with your wedge or iron, for the closer you are to the cup, the better your chances of sinking the putt! The expert putters, of course, have a progessively better chance at any distance from the hole than the less proficient of the putting pros.

Changing Locations of Cups

The location of the cups on APBA's greens does not remain the same. They are moved to different positions each time around the course. The cup may be moved to any one of six different points on each green. This gives an added variety to the nature of each hole, for depending upon the location of the cup, the shot may have to be made differently from the previous time around. This, too is done on all golf courses and is yet another realistic and rempleiely review feature in golf games. A simple roll of the dies determines which of the six possible points will be the hole location.

Choice of Putting Strategy

Another novel feature of APBA Golf is the option you may exercise on long putts. You may elect to try to sink the putt or to just play for a good position in order to better insure your making the second putt! The very same decision the pros have to make in real-life!

Anyone of these thirty-two professional golfers, which APBA gives you in this exciting game, can have a good round of eighteen holes. Anyone of them can have a good four rounds and win the tournament (72 holes), but over a series of tournaments, touring the pro circuit, the top golfers in real-life will excel likewise in APBA Golf! If you give them the right clubs!

SAMPLE SCORES

Here are two sets of four round results as played with just six of the golfers. Note that Gary Player won the first "tournament" with a five-under-par 275 and that Arnold Palmer, who was 282 in the first, won the second with a 271 by scoring a blistering six-under-par 64 in the fourth round.
