

Beefers capture 2014 OAPBA crown with sweep over Otters; First-ever title for longtime manager Rod Caborn

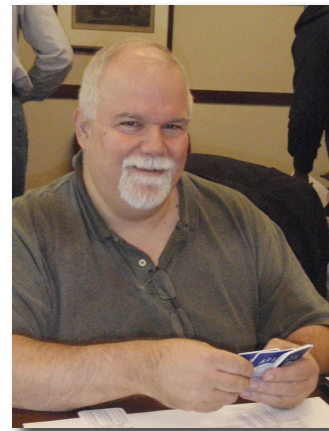
First appearance in World Series for manager Jonathan Stilwell



Rod Caborn's (L) Beefers (43-35), the second oldest active franchise in OAPBA, finally won their first championship in 2014, defeating **Jonathan Stilwell's Otters (43-35)**, who made it to the World Series in the franchise's fourth year of operation.

The Beefers, seeded fourth in the 2014 playoffs, roared through the playoffs, taking four of six to upset **Dave Larson's top-ranked Taz Devils (46-32)**, and then sweeping the Otters in four games to win the 2014 World Series. Caborn's (left) 2014 crown ended a remarkable stretch of six consecutive OAPBA championships (2008-2013) by Joe Passiatore, who retired from active play at the end of the 2013 season, guaranteeing a different team would win the league championship in 2014.

The Otters, managed by Jonathan Stilwell (right) roared to a 28-11 finish in the 2014 regular season to tie for second with **Walt Taylors's Whatevers (43-35)** and Caborn's Beefers. In the first round of the playoffs, the Otters, facing the Whats, lost the opener, but won the next four games to advance to the 2014 series.



For the majority of the 2014 season **Steven Korb's Turfbeaters (39-39)** resided in first place, but a late season collapse by the Turfies dropped them to .500, four games out of the playoff race. It was the second time in the past three seasons that the Turfies ended the season at .500, just missing the playoffs.

Marc Bostrom's Road Warriors (33-45) hit only .196 for the season and wound up 13 games behind the front-running Taz Devils.

Dave Mitchell's Piranhas (26-52) slogged through their eighth losing season in a row and fourth straight season with 50 or more losses, but with a base of young players acquired through four straight first round picks, kept looking forward to a more hopeful future.

Miguel Cabrera becomes OAPBA's first batting Triple Crown winner

Whatever 3b Miguel Cabrera won MVP honors for 2014, becoming the first batter in league history to capture the batting Triple Crown. For starters, Cabrera the league in batting (.318), HR (23) and RBIs (61). Cabrera also topped league batters in on-base percentage (.419, and tied with with Devils CF Shin-Soo Choo) for the slugging lead (.631). Cabrera (left) was third in base hits (81), seventh in runs scored (37) and fourth in bases on balls (42).

The **Taz Devils Clayton Kershaw** was equally as dominant on the mound, winning the pitcher's Triple Crown by leading the league in wins (12-3), ERA (1.96) and tying for the league lead in strikeouts (115) with Beefer righty **Max Scherzer**. Kershaw led in innings pitched (124.0), but also surrendered the greatest number of bases on balls (53).



Kershaw (right) was the first pitcher to win the pitcher's Triple Crown since the **Highlanders Greg Maddux** in 1995 and the first pitcher to win as many as 12 games in a season since the **Platoon's Chris Carpenter** went 13-1 in 2010.

OAPBA turned 27 years old in 2014

OAPBA completed its 27th season in 2014, making the league one of the most successful, longest-operating face-to-face leagues in all of APBAdom. The league first began play in 1988 with Joe Passiatore, Joel Prinsell, Bryant Applegate, and Steve Lorman.

None of the original Founding Fathers remain active in the league. Currently Caborn and Dave Larson, whose Taz Devils started in 1991, are the league's longest-operating managers. Walt Taylor's Whatevers, which started as the Metropolitanans, is the league's longest-operating franchise, playing continuously since the league began in 1988.

For 2014, there were changes aplenty. Joe Passiatore (Platoon II) and Kris Stenger (Gashouse Gang both dropped out of the league, reducing the number of operating franchises to seven.

The Platoon roster was redistributed among the remaining seven franchises while Stenger's franchise was put on a "hold" status, with the roster maintained for the 2014 season (including the 2014 draft), although the franchise was inactive for league play.

For 2014, The three division setup dropped in favor of a seven-team, one league set up. The schedule was reduced to 78 games, from 80 games, with a break at 39 games to allow three roster changes. The top four teams qualified for the '14 playoffs.

2014 Regular Season

First half: Korb's Turfbeaters take command



Steven Korb's (left) Turfbeaters, after a 3-5 start, took four of five from Rod Caborn's Beefers in their third series of the season, launching them on a 17-4 run that put them atop the standings for the entire first half.

During their 17-4 run, Turfbeaters pitching only allowed 33 runs. In their final series however, in five games vs. the Whatevers, Turfie pitchers took a holiday, giving up 32 runs in the five-game series, with the only Turfie win a 13-1 rout of the Whats. Despite losing four of five to the Whatevers to end the first half, the Turfbeaters looked like they might run away with the 2014 pennant.

After the end of the first 39 games, the Turfies (24-15) had a two-game lead over **Dave Larson's Taz Devils** and a three-game lead over **Walt Taylor's Whatevers**.

Both the Devils, who won five of their last seven, and the Whats, who won six of their final nine games in the first half appeared to be gaining momentum for a second half run, but it was questionable whether or not they could overtake the red-hot Turfbeaters.

Rod Caborn's Beefers hovered around .500, disrupted by a six-game losing streak near the end of the half, ending at 20-19 for the half, four games behind the league-leading Turfs.

Marc Bostrom's Road Warriors suffered from road weariness resulting from four extraordinary first-half extra-inning losses, all on the road, three of them to the Piranhas. The Moss Park team lost 6-5 to the Beefers (19 innings). Then then dropped two marathon decision to the Piranhas, 4-3 (17 innings) and 3-2 (13 innings). As if two marathon losses to the Piranhas were not enough, the Roadies ended the first half on the short end of a 1-0 15-inning loss to the Piranhas, which snapped a Road Warrior four-game winning streak, giving them a 17-22 record at the end of the half.

Dave Mitchell's (right) Piranhas almost got to .500 at 14-16, winning back-to-back extra inning games (4-3 in 17 innings and 3-2 in 13 innings) against the Road Warrior, but lost seven of their last nine contests to slip to 16-23 to finish the first half.

After a promising 10-8 start, **Jonathan Stillwell's Otters** dropped 12 of their final 16 games, including a five-game losing streak to end the first half at 14-20, and apparently to out of the running for a playoff slot. (*Note: the Otters had a 34-game first half*).

The biggest offensive explosion in the first half was a 14-5 win by the Whatevers against the Taz Devils, led by three-run homers by the Whats' Shane Victorino and Joe Mauer. The Turfbeaters were on the



losing end of two the league's three biggest offensive explosions in one game in the first half. The Beefers won two of the lopsided wins, 13-4 vs. the Turfbeaters and 13-2 v. the Turfbeaters, while the Turfs were the winners in a 13-1 final series win against the Whatevers.

Second half: Taz Devils overtake Turfies. Otters come out of nowhere to finish in three-way tie for second place

The second half of the 2014 season was one for the ages in OAPBA. Highlights included:

- The steady play of Taz Larson's Taz Devils, who were able to catch the Turfbeaters and finish first in regular season play.
- An incredible run by Jonathan Stillwell's Otters to capture a playoff berth.
- A collapse by Steven Korb's Turfbeaters, who saw their first half lead evaporate.
- A season-ending three-way deadlock for second place that resulted in a controversial seeding for the playoffs.
- A second half swoon by the Piranhas that saw them record their fourth straight 50-loss season.

Dave Larson's (right) Taz Devils, hovering just below first, won nine of their first 12 games to open the half, improving to 31-20. After a split with the Beefs, The Tazzies won three of four from the Whatevers and swept the Piranhas. The Devils, however, gave it right back, suffering a four-game sweep by the Otters, and an opening game loss in a series against the Turfs, falling back to 31-25. The Devils won their next three games from the Turfies and roared down the stretch at 15-7 to take the top spot in the regular season standings.



Steven Korb's Turfbeaters, after an outstanding first half, dropped three of five to the Devils to start the second half, but rebounded to win six of their next eight to put their record at 32-20. From that point, forward, however the bottom fell out. The Turfs went 7-19 the rest of the way, including losses in nine of their final 10 contests, to fall out of the playoffs. Although they finished a respectable 39-39, the season was a disappointment because of the second-half collapse that cost them a shot at the title.

(Note: the Turfbeaters were managed by various managers during the second half because of business commitments by Korb, but the team was managed aggressively and competitively with no letup on their opposition).



Walt Taylor's (L) Whatevers dropped eight of 11 to start the second half, but moved into contention by winning nine of 11, including a five game win streak. Later, after losing five games in a row, including a sweep by the Beefs, the Whatevers fell to 35-34. However, they hit the final turn at full speed, winning eight of nine, including, four of five from the Otters, in Whoville, in their final series, highlighted by a grueling 5-4, 12-inning victory. What righty Matt Harvey threw a final game 5-0 shutout to tie the Whats and Otters at 43-35, but both teams had company in the final standings.

Rod Caborn's Beefers fell to 23-24 after a 4-5 start to the second half, but a six-game win streak, including three of four wins against the **Whatevers**, seemed to put them back on track. The Beefs then dropped seven of the next 12 and, with four games left, a record of 39-35 and losing sight of the playoffs, the Beefers stunned the **Whatevers** in a four-game sweep to finish tied for second at 43-35.

With no one particularly paying much attention, **Jonathan Stillwell's Otters** won five of their first 10 games in the second half to improve to 19-25. The Otters then took off on a seven-game winning streak, including a four-game sweep over the **Taz Devils**, to get into the winning column at 26-25. The streak ended with a 3-1 loss to the **Roadies Madison Bumgarner**, who threw a five-hitter.

After splitting their next two games, the Otters took off on another seven-game win streak, ending with a 5-2 loss to **Turfbeater** righthander **Julio Teheran**, to reach 34-27, putting them in a tight battle with the **Taz Devils** for the league lead. The Otters kept the pressure on, winning eight of their next 11 for a worst-to-first turnaround at 42-31.

Marc Bostrom's (right) **Road Warriors** started off the second half by going 11-11 to make their record 28-33, only five games short of .500. A 13-4 pounding by the **Whatevers**, however, seemed to send the **Roadies** off the cliff, losing 12 of their final 17 games to finish in sixth place at 33-45, thirteen games behind the front-running **Taz Devils**.



Dave Mitchell's Piranhas, fighting to avoid their fourth consecutive fifty-loss season, began the second half hopefully enough, with lefty **Cliff Lee** beating the **Beefers** 7-4. The **Fish**, however, then spiraled into a seven-game losing streak that ended when **2b Robinson Cano** slammed three home runs to lead the **Piranhas** to a 9-3 win over the **Otters**. **Ervin Santana** then followed with a 3-0 shutout of the **Otters**, but the **Piranhas** then lost six in a row, three in extra innings, before edging the **Turfs** 6-5 in 13 innings. The **Fish** then went into another six game losing streak, scoring only six runs, before **Santana** once again came to the rescue, shutting out the **Road Warriors** 2-0 on three hits. The **Piranhas** then dropped 11 of their last sixteen games, finishing at 26-52 for the 2014 season.

2014 Semi-final playoffs

Otters surprise Whatevers in five games to advance to Series in fourth season

Jonathan Stillwell's Otters, seeded third, capped off a remarkable second-half run by surprising the **Walt Taylor's** second-seeded **Whatevers** (43-35) In five games to advance to the 2104 World Series in only their fourth season of operation.

After the **Whats** won the opener 2-1, it was all **Otters**, who won the next four games in a row.

A tough 3-2 **Otters** win in 10 innings in Game Two and 8-7 come from behind **Otters** victory in Game Three seemed to take the starch out of the **Whats**, who generated only eight hits and three runs in the final two games.

The highlight of the series was a series-clinching 3-0 one-hitter by the Otters Bartolo Colon, who had a no-hitter going into the eighth inning before a single by Whats LF Michael Bradley broke it up.

Fourth-seeded Beefers derail top-ranked Taz Devils in six games



RHP Max Scherzer won two games as the Beefs made it past the Taz Devils in the playoffs first round.

The first round of the 2014 playoffs opened with an upset, with **Rod Caborn's Beefers (43-35)** surprising **Taz Larson's Taz Devils (46-32)** in six games.

Statistically, the Devils outplayed the Beefers in almost everything in the series. The Devils outhit the Beefers (.252 to .226), had a better OBP (.336 to .265) and outscored the Beefers 34-33 in the six-game series. On the hill, the Devils team ERA was better than the Beefers (4.14 to 4.87).

The Beefers made up the difference in power (10 home runs to eight for the Devils) and on defense (two errors versus 10 for the Devils). The Devils defense was their Achilles' heel, allowing four unearned runs in the series.

The Beefers (43-35) had tied for second in the regular season standings, but were relegated to the fourth-place seed, based on total runs scored during the regular season, which put the Beefers (301 runs) behind the WhatEVERS (317) and Otters (307). Dave Larson's Taz Devils (46-32) had the best record in the league in 2014.

A controversy arose as the playoff finished off. With the Beefers, Otters, and WhatEVERS deadlocked at 43-35, it was decided to allocate the second, third, and fourth seedings based on total runs scored.

The WhatEVERS wound up seeded second, the Otters, third, and the Beefers fourth. This resulted in the top-ranked Taz Devils facing off against the fourth-seeded Beefs and the Whats against the Otters.

After the playoffs concluded, a check of the rule book revealed that head-to-head play likely should have been the determining factor for seedings, although it was not entirely clear, since there had never before been such a deadlock. The decision to use runs scored as the tie-breaker gave the World Series home field advantage to the Otters against the Beefers, which, it turned out, never came into play as the Beefers went on to sweep the Series.

2014 World Series

Beefs make short work of Otters; sweep series in four games



Rod Caborn's Beefers (43-35), after 24 seasons and 1,957 games in OAPBA, finally captured their first league championship, sweeping four straight from **Jonathan Stillwell's Otters (43-35)**, Weds., Oct. 9.

The Beefs pitching minimized the Otter offense for the first three games, allowing only two runs. Over the four games, the Otters stranded 31 baserunners, repeatedly squandering

opportunities by failing to deliver with runners in scoring position

Andrew McCutchen (L), who hit a pair of two-run homers in Game Three, and was 4-13 with five RBIs in the four games, was named Series MVP.

The Otters Mike Trout opened the Series with a home run off Mat Latos, but that turned out to be the high point of the game, and the Series, as Latos went six innings to win the opener 3-2, defeating Otter righty Jose Fernandez. Beefer righty Chris Tillman and reliever Seth Maness blanked the Ottes 5-0 in Game Two.

In Game Three, McCutchen hit a pair of homers, before kayoing himself out when he collided with the CF fence, in a 6-1 Beefer win.

In the final game, a tense battle was broken up in the bottom of the ninth when Beefer pinch-hitter Ryan Raburn doubled off Otter reliever Brandon Kintzler and Beef C Yan Gomes followed with a two-run home run for a walk-off 6-4 win and the Beefers first title.

Whatever's Miguel Cabrera wins first-ever Triple Crown in OAPBA history



Whatever's slugger **Miguel Cabrera** was a one-man wrecking crew in 2014, leading OAPBA in all three primary batting categories to win the first Triple Crown in league history.

Cabrera dominated the statistics, but he also delivered when the Whatever's needed him the most, particularly in the second half.

Cabrera was a driving force behind the Whats drive to the playoffs. Just after the start of the second half, against the Otters, he hit four home runs in a series. Later, against the Piranhas, Cabrera banged out key late-inning hits in two consecutive games to lift the Whats to close wins.

Against the Road Warriors, Cabrera went deep twice in a 6-4 win.

In a season ending series against the Otters, Cabrera saved his best for last, *slamming three home runs in one game*, as the Whatever's took a key 5-2 victory.

2014 OAPBA Draft

Piranhas draft #1 for third straight season; take 2b Robinson Cano as top pick

Dave Mitchell's Piranhas, drafting first in the league for the third straight season, took **2b Robinson Cano** (L) available via the dispersal of the Platoon, with the first pick in the 2014 draft. Cano joined Piranha teammates **OF Bryce Harper**



(2013) and **P James Shields** (2012) as the league's top draft picks over the past three seasons.

Jonathan Stilwell's Otters selected **P Jose Fernandez** with the second overall pick in the draft with **C Yadier Molina**, another former Platoon stalwart, going to Steven Korb's Turfbeatrs. **SS Hanley Ramirez** was picked for the inactive Gang franchise. **RF Wil Myers** went fifth, taken by Marc Bostrom's Road Warriors. Rod Caborn's Beefers, drafting sixth, filled a hole in LF with **Carlos Gonzalez** and **P Yu Darvish** went seventh to Walt Taylor's Platoon. Caborn's Beefers, drafting eighth, after obtaining the pick in a trade with the Devils, grabbed **RF Yasiel Puig**.
