# A Stat-Drunk look at the TBL Draft - 2015 Edition

#### I'm So Confused!

Blue Hill has a decent shot to make the playoffs.

## TBL: The good, the meh and the ugly

There are 8 very good teams in the league – 4 per conference. Knoxville is the beast this year – the best offense by a wide margin (almost 1000 runs scored) and the 4<sup>th</sup> best pitching. The downside - their first pick in this draft is #109. Can their competitors become good enough to mount a challenge?

There aren't very many very bad teams this year. New Westminster, Columbus, and maybe Kansas and Las Vegas have a shot to lose 100 games but no one will lose 110.

The other 12 teams could all be just under .500. This will set up 2 very different races for the last wildcard spots in each conference.

The National Conference's 4 very good (100+ wins) teams are Knoxville, Berkshire (formerly Portland), Munich and Melrose. Who will snag the last playoff spot? Midwest has the inside track, but Maracaibo, Hudson, Taylorville and even Northboro may have a shot. Count no one out. Getting to 81 wins might not even be required. In a conference where 4 teams win more than 100 games, no team might lose 100.

In the International, there are 3 teams looking better than 90 wins – Grand Cayman, Gotham City and Brobdingnag, with Rye close on their heels. No other teams in the conference project to 81 wins at the moment. Three of the leaders are in the Mays Division, which means the winner of the Clemente will make the conference semi-finals. Who will that be? Blue Hill and Warrenton (formerly the FOG, now just the fog of WAR) are at the top with mid-70s win totals and similar draft positions. Whitman is a little behind with a worse draft position. Columbus is far back, but with slightly better draft prospects.

The team with the most draft picks in the top 4 rounds is, for once, NOT Brobdingnag! As of this writing, New Westminster has 9 of the first 91 draft picks. Of the eight leaders mentioned above, Brobdingnag has 8 picks in the first 4 rounds, and Gotham City has 5. Of the contenders, Hudson has 6 picks in the first 4 rounds. Midwest has only 3, but two of them are #2 and #3. On the flip side, Melrose has only one early pick and Knoxville has none.

### Feast and Famine in the draft

What's on offer this draft? Fewer players for one – 218 available (compared to 232 last year, 237 in 2013) What's missing? Relievers mostly (14 fewer relievers, 1000 fewer innings than last year). There are only 5 grade 13+ starters (compared to 10 last year). There are 10 closer-grade relievers available.

How about position players? The story is a bit better there if you're looking for catchers or 1B/DH types. Fewer OF than last year, about the same number of IFers.

There is one thing in this draft we haven't seen recently – a card like Jose Abreu's. 12 hits, 2 walks plus a 42, 145 games. Oh, and did I mention 1-1-6-6? This card represents at least 30% more offense than any card in the drafts of the last 3 years. There are a couple of other cards that are as good as the best in previous years – JD Martinez and Josh Harrison. All of these guys will turn 28 this year, but that's a lot of present value. Then there's Casey McGehee – 32 years old, but 160 games of 11 hits, 3 walks. Then there are the usual raft of promising prospects, especially in the infield, with much more promise than current value indicates.

The flip side of having fewer players available is that there are more carded players already owned. Fewer teams have urgent holes to patch.

#### Where do we stand now?

Knoxville is still a beast. Berkshire has closed the gap a little, Munich and Melrose still rate to win close to 100 games, and Midwest still has an edge on Northboro, Maracaibo, Zion and Hudson.

Blue Hill has a slim edge over Warrenton in the Clemente but Warrenton has the first pick of the round, Blue Hills the fourth, which will make it quite a battle. Grand Cayman and Gotham City may both win 100. Brobdingnag will win more than 90 and take the Ruth. Rye has fallen back close to .500 for the final playoff spot but they pick second in the round, giving them a comfortable margin over Greater Ohio and the second finisher in the Clemente.
