Giants pitching lifts New York to 1912 National League replay win; Pirates season-ending surge to catch Giants falls short by three games

The New York Giants won the 1912 National League replay with a 104-50 record, ahead of the surprising Pittsburgh Pirates, who gave the Giants a late-season scare, before the Giants rebounded over the final two weeks of the season to finish three games ahead of the Bucs.

The pennant battle boiled down to Pittsburgh and New York throughout the entire replay. Chicago was a distant third and never really close to making a challenge for the lead. The other six teams in the pennant race were not even close to being in contention.

Giants and Pirates duel for first place through first third of season

The Giants, Pirates and Cubs immediately served notice that they were to be the only contenders in the pennant race. Chicago won five of their first six games and held the lead through April 18, but the Cubs quickly fell into third place, where they remained throughout the entire season.

The Giants came out of the gate with a rush, winning ten of their first 12 games, but they could not shake off the Pirates, who started equally as fast, finishing April with eight straight wins. By the end of April, both teams were tied at 14-3 with the Cubs four games behind and the rest of the league further back.

On May 1, the Giants **Red Ames** let a 5-3 lead get away and lost to Boston 6-5 while Pittsburgh, behind spot starter Jack Ferry, edged Cincinnati 3-2 to win their ninth in a row, giving the Pirates sole possession of first place. Pittsburgh won their next seven in a row, extending their win streak to 16 straight before losing to Boston 6-5 on May 11, with the Giants two games behind.

The Pirates continued to hang on to the top spot through late May. On May 27, in the first meeting of the season between the two-front runners, New York, behind **Jeff Tesreau** moved into a tie for the lead by edging Pittsburgh 3-2 with RF **Red Murray** driving in Tesreau with the winning run in the bottom of the 10th on a sacrifice fly. The next day, the Giants moved to the top of the standings when 2b **Larry Doyle** hit a grand slam HR in the bottom of the eighth to give **Rube Marquard** a 6-0 two-hit shutout victory. On May 29, the Pirates moved back into a tie for first with New York as righthander **Marty O'Toole** threw a shutout of his own, holding the Giants to only three hits in a 5-0 shutout win.

On June 1, the Pirates again seized the lead behind **Babe Adams**, who threw a five-hitter to beat St. Louis 10-1. The next day, however, New York moved back into a tie for the lead when Red Ames beat Brooklyn 7-6.

On June 3, Pittsburgh fell to the Reds 4-2 while New York rolled over Boston 9-3, giving the Giants sole possession of the lead. New York and stayed there for the remainder of the 1912 replay. However, despite some remaining in second place most of the summer, the Pirates were not yet finished in the pennant race.

The Giants build up a huge lead in mid-summer

From June 3 through August 11, the Giants pulled away from the rest of the league, going 51-14, .784. After taking the lead on June 3, the Giants won seven more in a row, extending their win streak to nine games before dropping a 2-1 decision to Philadelphia's **George Chalmers**.

New York then embarked on a 28-game road trip. The Giants started by splitting a four-game series at Brooklyn and then ran off eight wins in a row before the Cards Rube Geyer beat Marquard 6-3 in the opener of 16 games in the West. After taking the next three in a row from the Cards, the Giants won three of four at Chicago, then split with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, finishing the long road trip with a seven game lead over the Pirates.

After falling out of the lead on June 3, the Pirates, dropped five of their next seven, before ending the short slump with four-game sweep of St. Louis, followed by a pair of wins over third-place Chicago. The Pirates then gave all their gains back, losing six of their next seven games, all at home, falling eight games behind New York.

From June 24 through August 10, the Giants continued to play at a torrid pace. The Pirates, meanwhile, drifted further and further behind. By August 10, the pennant race looked like a Giants runaway with the New Yorkers holding a commanding 15-game lead over Pittsburgh.

On August 11, however, the pennant race took a dramatic turn.

Pittsburgh goes on tear and almost overtakes New York in final third of season

Starting on August 11, Pittsburgh won 11 games in a row, all at home, sweeping Brooklyn and Philadelphia in four-game series and then winning three from the last-place Braves before the streak ended Aug. 22 with a 3-2 loss to Boston righthander **Walt Dickson**. The Giants, meanwhile, dropped seven of 12 games during the first three series of a long Western swing.


By Aug 23, Pittsburgh had crept to within nine games of the Giants, with a head-to-head four-game series against New York next on the schedule. The Pirates capitalized on the matchup, winning three of the four contests, including a stirring 1-0 win by Howie Camnitz, closing the gap to seven games by August 28.

New York won their next five in a row to return their lead to nine games, but things began to slide again on September 3, when the Giants were swept at home by the Cubs, 8-2 and 8-4, in a doubleheader at the Polo Ground. Chicago's **Lew Richie** then beat Jeff Tesreau 3-2 in the finale of the series at Wrigley Field. The Giants then lost three straight games to seventh-place Cincinnati before rookie **Larue Kirby** stopped the Reds 4-1 on Sept. 7. The Pirates, meanwhile, pounded Philadelphia 12-0 and 7-3 to close the gap to five games by September 8.

Pittsburgh then invaded the Polo Grounds for a four-game showdown series with the possibility that the Bucs could draw even closer to the New Yorkers.

The Pirates did exactly what they had to do, sweeping the Giants in the four-game series to pull within one game on September 12. Pittsburgh's Marty O'Toole shut down the Giants to win the opener 8-3. The Pirates then won three tense one-run games in a row, with Camnitz edging Christy Mathewson 4-3, Babe Adams defeating lefty **Hooks Wiltse** 5-4, and **C George Gibson** driving in a run in the top of the eighth to lift Pittsburgh to an exciting 6-5 win and a surprising series sweep.

During their remarkable run, from August 11-September 12, Pittsburgh was 27-5 while New York stumbled to a 12-20 record, slashing the Giants lead from 15 games to only one game over the 32-game stretch.



The Giants rebound; win nine of final 12 games to clinch the pennant

With a dozen games left in the season, all on the road against their weak Eastern opponents, the Giants were looking tired and vulnerable while Pittsburgh had all the momentum going for them.

New York, however, dug deep, winning nine of the final 12 games, all against the weak East, while Pittsburgh finally cooled off, winning seven of their final twelve, all against their Western opponents; good, but not enough, to overtake the Giants, who finished three games ahead of the Pirates by season's end.

The 1912 NL pennant (replay) was the second in a row for New York (104-50) while Pittsburgh (101-53) finished second for the second straight season, considerably closer the previous (replay) season, when New York won with a 106-48 record with Pittsburgh 11 games behind.

The quality of the Giants pitching in 1912 was again a major point of differentiation.

New York's quartet of **Christy Mathewson, Rube Marquard, Jeff Tesreau, and Red Ames** performed just slightly better than Pittsburgh's trio of **Marty O'Toole, Claude Hendrix, and Howie Camnitz** and the Bucs combo of **Babe Adams** and **Hank Robinson** in the fourth starter slot.

Team by team recap

First place: New York Giants, 104-50, .675, +3 games

The Giants success was due to Christy Mathewson's remarkable 32-6 campaign, which set the New Yorkers apart from the Pirates. Without Mathewson, who led the league in ERA (2.00) and complete games (32), the Giants could have not won the pennant.

The Giants led the league in ERA (2.63), complete games (97), strikeouts (758) and fewest bases on balls (400), with the team stats greatly influenced by Mathewson's performance.

Lefty Rube Marquard (22-14, 2.27) started out like a house afire, winning nine of his first 12 starts, including five shutouts. Marquard cooled off after June 7, however, going 13-9 over the remainder of the season, and losing six of his final 10 starts. Marquard led the league with 210 strikeouts and had six shutouts.

Jeff Tesreau, like Marquard, started fast, winning six straight to start the season, including shutouts in his first two starts. After dropping a 9-4 decision to St. Louis on May 18, his first loss, Tesreau won seven of his next eight starts to improve to 13-2. From July 1 though the end of the season, however, he was 7-6, which included a couple of losses in relief.

Red Ames (14-8, 2.50) was 14-5 through July 27, capped off by back-to-back shutouts, but Ames did not win another game through the rest of the season. Reliever **Doc Crandall** (7-3, 3.76) was effective in the early and middle part of the season, but struggled from August 1 until season's end.

Offensively, the Giants hit hit .272 as a team, second to Pittsburgh, and led the league in OBP with .3432, while scoring 771 runs, the most in the league. Their leading hitter was C **Chief Meyers**, who hit .354, but did not qualify for the batting title because a shortfall in plate appearances. 2b **Larry Doyle** (.287, .333 OBP, 13 HRs) led a well-balanced lineup with 95 RBIs. 1b **Fred Merkle** (.298, .373, 70 RBIs) and RF **Red Murray**, .283, 86 RBIs) and LF **Fred Snodgrass** (.271, 106 runs) also were offensive standouts. 3b **Buck Herzog** drove in 70 runs.

On defense, the Giants ranked second in fielding percentage to the Pirates, committing 174 errors.

Second place: Pittsburgh Pirates, .630, - 17 games

The Pirates led the league in hitting (.283), ranked second in runs scored (755, only sixteen runs less than New York) and triples (123) and their team pitching ERA (.276) was second in the league to New York.



Offensively, All-Star SS **Honus Wagner** (.326, 88 RBIs, 12 HR, 26 SB) was the team's top batter, but it was OF **Owen Wilson**, who played both CF and RF, whose contributions made an enormous difference. Wilson hit .273, with 32 triples, 15 HRs, and 112 RBIs, while having an outstanding season on defense, earning him MVP honors.

Led by Wagner and Wilson, the Pirates led the league in defense, committing only 154 errors.

Pittsburgh's **Mike Donlin** hit .325, was 5-10 as a pinch-hitter.

LF **Max Carey** (.301, 95 runs) and 1b **Dots Miller** (.278, 93 HR) also had good seasons. Aging **Mike Donlin** (.325, .399 OBP) contributed while playing part time in RF.

The Pirates had three 20-game winners in **Howie Camnitz** (24-7, 2.04), **Claude Hendrix** (22-10, 2.26), and **Marty O'Toole** (21-12, 2.72). **Babe Adams** was 13-6, 2.79 and mid-season call-up **Hank Robinson** was 7-8, .297 with a pair of shutouts. **Jack Ferry** (6-2, 1.94) was effective out of the bullpen.

Third place: Chicago Cubs 89-65, .578, -15 games

Chicago had a monotonous 1912 season, settling into third place April 19 and remaining there for the entire season. They never really threatened to move up in the standings and, as the bottom five teams fell further and further behind, third place virtually contested for the Cubs.

3b **Heinie Zimmerman**, 2b **Johnny Evers** and righthanded pitcher **Larry Cheney** were the team's standouts.

Zimmerman was a contender for MVP honors. He almost won the Triple Crown, hitting .344, to finish third in the batting race. He led the league with 23 HRs and 121 RBIs, and notched 200 hits, including 37 doubles. Zimmerman led the NL with 328 total bases and topped the league in slugging (.564). If the Cubs had out-performed Pittsburgh or New York, Zimmerman would have won the MVP award.



Larry Cheney led Chicago with 21 wins, 2.23 ERA..

Evers (.325, .405 OBP) surprised with his offense and was outstanding on defense. **Frank Schulte**, the 1911 MVP, saw his batting average drop to .263, but hit 12 HR and drove in 68 runs. Backup OF Ward Miller hit .299 in limited action.

Larry Cheney was a consistent winner all season, finishing with four wins in a row to go 20-12, 2.23. **Jimmy Lavender** (18-12, 3.60), struck out 145 hitters and was solid all season long, as was **Lew Richie** (15-12, 3.20). A surprise was veteran **Ed Ruelbach** (13-6, 2.53), who recorded shutouts over both New York and Pittsburgh and beat the Giants three times. **Mordecai (Three-Finger) Brown** was 6-3, 3.57 with three saves.

Fourth place: Brooklyn Dodgers, 69-85, .448, -35 games

Brooklyn drifted in the second division most of the season, but went 16-9 in September to finish in fourth place, a game ahead of Philadelphia.

Nap Rucker had an outstanding season, shaking off a poor 1-4 start to finish 25-9, 2.01, finishing an eyelash behind Christy Mathewson for the ERA title. The Dodger lefty tied for most shutouts (6) and was second in strikeouts (179) to New York's Rube Marquard. Making Rucker's performance more remarkable was the lack of productivity by the Brooklyn offense, which hit only .247, last in the league and committed 192 errors.

The only other Brooklyn pitcher to hit double figures in wins was righty **Pat Ragan** (13-12), who, from August 6 to the end of the season won five of his last seven decisions.

Batting champ 1b **Jake Daubert** (.352, .422 OBP, 88 RBIs, 201 hits) was the heart of the Dodger offense. LF **Zack Wheat** had a solid second half to hit .286 and drive in 82 runs. 3b **Red Smith** had a great run in mid-season and hit .302 with 84 RBIs. **John Hummell**, who split time between 2b and the outfield, hit .309. Unfortunately, the rest of the Dodger offense was poor, at best, and allowed too many unearned runs, hampering the Dodger pitchers ability to win.

Fifth place: Philadelphia Phillies, 68-86, .442, -36 games



Other than **Grover Cleveland Alexander** (17-17, 2.59, 175 Ks) and **Earl Moore** (11-14, 3.11) the Phillies pitching left much to be desired.

Even Alexander struggled over the second half of the season. After starting out 10-6, Alex went 7-11 the rest of the way, including two four-game losing streaks. Moore

Phillies RHP **Earl Moore** threw the only no-hitter in the NL, beating St Louis 7-0 on Aug. 21

reeled off five straight wins in July, including three consecutive shutouts, but lost five of his last six decisions, the only win a 7-0 no-hitter against the Cardinals on Aug. 21.

Starter-reliever **George Chalmers** (4-4, 2.64) provided some decent long relief outings.

Tom Seaton (9-17, 3.23) lost nine of 11 decisions in mid-season, but won three of his last five starts, but newcomer **Eppa Rixey** (8-12, 4.53, and lefty **Ad Brennan** (9-6, but a hefty 5.56 ERA) were not very effective.

Offensively, CF **Dode Paskert** (.307, .395 OBP, 80 BB, league-leading 48 doubles) led the Phillies. 3b **Hans Lobert**, an All-Star in 1911, suffered limited playing time because of injuries, but hit .295. LF **Sherry Magee** (.294, 77 RBIs to lead the team) was solid, but CF **Gavvy Cravath** under-performed, hitting only .233, driving in 68 runs.

Sixth place: Cincinnati Reds, 89, .422, -39 games

The Reds started their season losing 11 of their first seventeen games and things went downhill from there, playing themselves out of contention with a miserable 3-23 record in May. From that point forward, the Reds found themselves battling to stay out of the cellar, which they finally managed to accomplish on August 12, eventually passing St. Louis, to finish a disappointing sixth.

Cincinnati only hit .247 and lacked power, so they depended on speed, which LF **Bob Bescher** provided in abundance. Bescher (.261, .369, 104 runs) stole 101 bases, but the only players who did much to drive him home were OF **Armando Marsans** (.326, .376, 60 RBIs) and inconsistent OF **Mike Mitchell** (.260, team-leading 64 RBIs). 1b Dick Hoblitzell (.286, .353), was moved into the leadoff slot in mid-season, walking 59 times and scoring 75 runs.



OF **Armando Marsans** hit .326 and drove in 60 runs for Cincinnati.

Cincinnati had decent pitching, but the entire staff suffered from non-support.

Righthander **George Suggs** was outstanding. Suggs (22-13, 2.73) went 14-4 from July 17 until the end of the season, winning his final seven starts of the season.

Lefty **Rube Benton** (17-23, 2.83) lost seven of his first eight decisions, but came on strong at the end of the year, going 9-6 from July 28 to the end of the year. Hard-luck **Art Fromme** (11-23, 2.99) suffered from a lack of offense, with the Reds scoring only two or less runs in 12 of his 23 losses. Bert Humphries (4-14, 2.87) pitched decently in relief, but was also victimized by the Reds weak batting output.

Defensively, Cincinnati was abysmal, recording 225 errors and 174 unearned runs

Seventh place: St. Louis Cardinals, 64-90, .416, -40 games

The Cards hovered around fourth place for the first two-thirds of the season, but slowly sank in the standings as the end of the season progressed, finally settling into seventh place on September 12 and remaining there until the season ended.



Lefty **Slim Sallee** (16-16, 2.62, 18 complete games) was the centerpiece of the St. Louis pitching staff, but there was little backing Sallee up. **Bob Harmon** (12-19, 3.85) lost seven of his first eight decisions, but won three in a row to end the year, to avoid 20 losses. **Rube Geyer** (9-11, 4.19) tied for the league lead in saves with five. **Sandy Burk**, acquired from Brooklyn in mid-season, was a surprise going 6-1, 2.19 with the Cards.

Cardinal batters were led by 1b **Ed Konetchy** (.286, 9 HR, 86 RBI) and LF **Lee Magee** (.292, .346) and RF **Steve Evans**, who hit only .246, but drove in 86 runs.

Cardinals righty **Rube Geyer** tied with Brooklyn's Nap Rucker for most save in the NL with five.


Eighth place: Boston Braves, 56-98, .364, -48 games

After dropping Rustlers as their nickname, the newly re-named Braves seemed to be energized, going 21-23 over the first two months. Their lack of pitching, however, caught up with them, and the Braves eventually sank into the cellar, finishing last for the second straight year.

Despite their last-place finish, the Braves were fun to watch, hitting .269 as a team, third in the NL. The team ERA of 5.30, combined with a league-high 581 BB, doomed Boston to the cellar.

John Titus (.347, .430 OBP, 99 RBI, 43 doubles, 179 hits total season), acquired in mid-year from Philadelphia in exchange for 1911 batting leader Doc Miller, was a terror at the plate for the Braves, hitting .376 for Boston with a .457 OBP. 2b **Bill Sweeney** (.343, .425 OBP, 74 RBI, 107 runs) was a standout. C Johnny Kling hit .311 as a part-timer, while CF **Vin Campbell**, acquired from the Pirates before the season started, hit .266 and scored 91 runs. Left-handed hitting **Ben Houser** (.281, .326, 10 HR, 72 RBI) also provided a potent bat.

Righthander **Hub Purdue** won six in a row to start the season and finished 15-13, 4.37, while **Walt Dickson** (10-13, 3.59) was solid, appearing in 36 games, mostly in relief. The remainder of the Braves staff was less than great with aging **Otto Hess** (9-18, 4.92) and young **Lefty Tyler** (6-26, 6.90) suffering pounding after pounding as the Braves went into free fall after their promising start.

New York's Christy Mathewson, Pirates Owen Wilson stand out among NL All-Stars

The runner-up Pittsburgh Pirates led the All-Star selections with four Buccaneers named to the 1912 NL All-Star squad, with the pennant winning Giants placing two players on the NL All-Star team.

The four Pirates selected were MVP **Owen Wilson** in RF, whose OF defense stood heads and shoulders above the rest of the league, SS **Honus Wagner**, the most accomplished infielder in the league, and pitchers **Howie Camnitz** (24-7, 2.04) and **Claude Hendrix** (22-10, 2.26, 170 strikeouts).

Cy Young winner **Christy Mathewson** (32-6, league-leading 2.00 ERA) led the pitching selections. Joining Mathewson was **C Chief Meyers**, who hit .354, but failed to win batting title because he lacked the necessary plate appearances to win the batting crown.

Pittsburgh's **Camnitz** (24-7, 2.04) and **Hendrix** (22-10, 2.26, 170 strikeouts) kept the Pirates in the race all season long. Rounding out the starting pitcher staff was Brooklyn lefty **Nap Rucker** (25-9, with 6 shutouts and 179 strikeouts). Rucker was named Reliever of the Year with five saves, which tied him with St. Louis righty Rube Geyer for most saves.

Batting champ **Jake Daubert** (.352, 201 hits) of fourth-place Brooklyn was the All-Star 1b. Two members of the last place Boston Braves, **2b Bill Sweeney** and **RF John Titus** were named to the All-Star team. Sweeney hit .343 and notched 204 hits, including 26 doubles, while Titus, who hit extraordinarily well after being traded to the Braves, wound up hitting .349 with a .429 OBP and 99 RBIs

Pirates **SS Honus Wagner** hit .326, .381 OBP, with 39 doubles, 19 triples, and drove home 88 runs. **LF Bob Bescher** (.261, 389 OBP) walked 86 times and stole an astounding 101 bases as the Reds tried relied on Bescher's speed to try and offset a weak-hitting offense.

Mathewson, Meyers, and Wagner were repeaters from the 1911 NL replay All-Star team

1912 National League standouts

New York's Christy Mathewson dominated NL pitchers



No player in the National League was more impactful in the 1912 NL pennant race than the Giants ace pitcher **Christy Mathewson**. Mathewson's 32-win season was the difference between New York and the tough Pittsburgh Pirates, who only finished three games behind the Giants.

Mathewson started the season with nine wins in a row before succumbing to Pittsburgh 5-0 on May 29. He then reeled off 12 straight wins before losing again to the Pirates 9-1 on July 25. After splitting his next two decisions, Mathewson won seven straight to improve to 29-3, but then hit a wall trying to win his 30th game, dropping three straight before shutting out Brooklyn 12-0 on three hits to improve to 30-6. With Pittsburgh breathing down the Giants' neck, Mathewson then won his final three starts of the year to finish at 32-6.

Mathewson won the NL ERA title with a 2.00 ERA, topped the league in complete games with 32 CG, and ranked sixth in strikeouts with 165 Ks. His control was almost faultless, walking only 20 batters in 310 innings pitched. The only team that troubled Mathewson was second-place Pittsburgh. Mathewson beat the Pirates three times, but four of his six losses came to the Bucs, including a relief loss on 6-5 loss in relief on September 12.

The Giants righthander was also a force at the plate, hitting (x).

Pittsburgh's Owen Wilson surprises as Most Valuable Player

Pirates outfielder Owen Wilson earned MVP honors on the basis of his solid offensive output combined with his superior defensive skills.

Wilson did not dominate the league's offensive stats, even though he finished second in the league with 112 RBIs. He led the league in triples with an astounding 32 three-batters and finished fourth in slugging at .481. For the season, Wilson hit .273 with a .309 OBP with 20 stolen bases. His 15 home runs, second in the league.

What really set Wilson apart was his outstanding defense in the outfield. Splitting his time between center and right field, Wilson committed only five errors in CF and one in RF, throwing out a pair of baserunners against Philadelphia on July 12. Fearing Wilson's strong (39) arm, opposition baserunners were frequently pre-empted from trying to advance from first to third or from second to home.

Some of Wilson's highlights for the 1912 season included:

- June 1 3-5, with a home run and **five RBIs** in a 10-1 win v. St. Louis Rube Geyer
- June 20 4-5 with **five runs scored** in 23-1 win over Cincinnati
- July 19-22 11-17 (.647) with **three home runs and 12 RBI in a four-game series v. Boston**, including two home runs and 6 RBI in a 9-6 win on July 21
- Aug 27 HR #13, plus a double and triple and **five RBIs** against New York
- Sept 16 **4-4 with two triples** and three RBIs and a walk against St. Louis
- Sept 14-17 11-16, .688, with **three triples and four RBI** in four game series **against St. Louis**



Pirates OF Owen Wilson excelled in both CF and RF, preventing base runners from advancing and throwing out x runners.

Runner-up for MVP was Chicago 3b **Heinie Zimmerman** hit .344, second in the league, and led the NL with 23 home runs, 121 RBIs, and a .564 slugging percentage and 328 total bases. He had an OBP of .386 with 200 hits, and scored 104 runs. Zimmerman, however, struggled defensively at both 1b and 3b, committing 18 errors, and allowing a significant number of opposition hits to get past him.

Boston 2b **Bill Sweeney** led a surprisingly robust Braves offense, hitting .343, third in the league, ranking second in OBP at .425, and leading the league with 204 hits and 107 in runs scored

Pirates SS **Honus Wagner** was outstanding defensively at SS for Pittsburgh while hitting .326, fourth in the league, and second in total bases with 295.

Overlooked was Boston OF **John Titus**, who started the season with the Phillies, where he hit .276 in 44 games, driving in 23 runs. After being dealt to the Braves on June 21 for 1911 batting champ **Doc Miller**, Titus started hitting and never stopped, batting .376 as a Brave, with 36 doubles, 19 triples and 74 runs batted in, teaming with Sweeney and 1b **Ben Houser** to give the Braves a surprisingly potent offense.

Brooklyn's **Jake Daubert** led the league in batting with a .352 BA, and drove in 88 runs, while playing great defense at 1b for the Dodgers.

Cincinnati LF **Bob Bescher** (.261, .369 OBP) stole 101 bases, far outdistancing anyone else in the NL. Bescher walked 86 times, second only to Chicago's Jimmy Sheckard (125 BB). Cardinal 1b **Ed Konetchy** hit .282 and, along with teammate **Steve Evans**, drove in 86 runs.

Outstanding pitchers

Nine National League pitchers won 20 or more games in the 1912 NL replay, led by Mathewson (32-6)

The runner up was Brooklyn lefthander **Nap Rucker** (25-9, 2.01, 179 strikeouts). Despite despite pitching for a team that often struggled on offense, Rucker rebounded from a slow start was able to keep on winning throughout the season. Rucker led the league in appearances with 46 games and also saved five games to tie for the saves lead with Cardinal **Rube Geyer**.



Dodger lefty Nap Rucker won 25 games to lift Brooklyn into fourth place.

Pittsburgh's duo of **Howie Camnitz** (24-7, 2.04) and **Claude Hendrix** (22-10, 2.26 ERA) who led a strong Pittsburgh pitching staff that also included **Marty O'Toole** (21-12, 2.72) who won his first seven starts in a row, before running into control problems that resulted in 153 bases on balls, tops in the NL

Mathewson's mound teammates lefty **Rube Marquard** (22-14, .227 and league-leading 210 strikeouts) and righty **Jeff Tesreau** (20-8, 2.38) combined with Mathewson to win 64 games among the threesome.



Cincy righthander **George Suggs** was a combined 8-7 against the top three NL teams

Cincinnati's **George Suggs** (22-13, 2.73) had a fine season, despite a lack of support from one of the NL's worst offenses. Cubs righthander **Larry Cheney** (20-12, 2.23) led the Chicago pitching staff and St. Louis workhorse **Slim Sallee** (16-16, 2.62) was the leading pitcher on a dismal Cardinal pitching staff.



Slim Sallee (16-16) failed to get much support from Cardinal batters. Six of Sallee's losses came when the Cards were shutout when he was pitching.



Cardinal righty **Bob Harmon** (12-19) threw two one-hitters, both against Chicago. He carried the first one-hitter, a 2-0 win on June 5, into the 8th inning and the second, a 5-0 win, into the 9th inning. Cubs OF **Ward Miller** broke up both no-hit bids.

The dominance of New York and Pittsburgh was clearly reflected in the NL team statistics.

Pittsburgh led the league in batting (.283) and slugging (.392), and triples (123, led by Owen Wilson's 32 three-baggers) but finished behind the Giants in runs scored, tallying 755 scores to New York's 771 runs. The Giants led the league in OBP (.342) and finished second in BB to Chicago, whose league-leading walks total was bolstered by NL leader's Jimmy Sheppard's 125 BB.

The Giants and Pirates both had team ERAs under 3.00, far better than the bottom six teams. The Giants pitching staff walked the fewest batters (400), allowed the fewest HRs (23) and, led by Christy Mathewson, led the league in CG (97). Chicago and St. Louis had nascent bullpens, both with 12 saves. The Giants trio of Mathewson, Rube Marquard and Jeff Tesreau (20-8) combined for 74 wins while Pittsburgh had three 20-game winners with Howie Camnitz (24-7), Marty O'Toole (22-10) and Claude Hendrix (22-12). Chicago's Larry Cheney (20-12) led the Cubs, but the Chicago staff simply was not as deep or effective as the Giants and Pirates.

Brooklyn had the worst batting average in the league (.247), the worst OBP (.309) and their team ERA of 4.32 ranked seventh, but the Dodgers managed to find a way to battle their way past Philadelphia for the fourth place. Cincinnati was hobbled by a spotty offense (.248, seventh in the league and 19 homers, last in the NL, plus a porous defense with 225 errors, second in the league), but had a team ERA of 3.33, fourth in the National League. The Phillies led the league in doubles (262), but also led the league in strikeouts (732).

St. Louis hovered around the bottom in batting (.250) and, other than southpaw Slim Sallee (16-16, 2.62), the Cardinal mound staff struggled all season long. Defensively, the Cardinals had 242 errors, the most in the league, which led to 127 unearned runs. Boston finished a surprising third in batting, helped by the acquisition of John Titus, who hit .376 for the Braves after being swapped by the Phillies for the 1911 (*replay*) batting champion, Doc Miller. The Braves pitching, however, was another story, with a bloated 5.30 ERA, influenced by a league-leading 581 bases on balls and 932 total runs allowed.

Defensively, the Giants and Pirates had the best defenses in the NL. The Pirates committed 154 errors, fewest in the league, while the Giants made 174 errors. Chicago, with the strong middle infield of Joe Tinker and Johnny Evers, ranked second fewest in the league with 167 errors committed.



1912 National League Batting Notes

Season Jake Daubert wins batting crown. NY's Meyers hits .358, falls short on plate appearances

Brooklyn 1b **Jake Daubert** won the 1912 NL batting crown with a .352 batting average just edging out Boston's **John Titus** (.350), Chicago's **Heinie Zimmerman** (.344) and Boston's **Bill Sweeney** (.343). The batting crown was not without controversy.



New York C **Chief Meyers** hit .358, but fell 25 plate appearances short of the required 477 plate appearances necessary to qualify for the batting, slugging and on-base percentage championships. Meyers only had 379 at-bats and 452 total plate appearances. If one factored in an additional 25 plate appearances, Meyers batting average dropped to .334, well below Daubert's .352.

Special note: Before 1920, a player generally had to appear in 100 or more games when the schedule was 154 games, and 90 games when the schedule was 140 games. An exception was made for Ty Cobb in 1914, who appeared in 98 games but had a big lead and was also a favorite of League President Ban Johnson). I used the 3.1 x games played (477 plate appearances as the standard for qualification.

Daubert saw his average drop during September, hitting .304 for the final month, while Titus was 28-77, improving from .347 on Sept. 4 to a season-ending .350, only two points shy of Daubert. Heinie Zimmerman fell out of the race after a 3-18 series against Philadelphia, Sept. 9-12, while Sweeney hit .405 from Sept. 4 until the end of the season to finish at .343.


In May, Daubert hit two game-winning RBIs in a five-day span. On May 13, Daubert singled home the winning run in the 14th to beat Plttsburgh 2-1 in a 14-inning game. On May 23, Daubert again singled home the game winner, in the 16th inning, to lift the Dodgers to topple Cincinnati 5-4.

He posted a 16-game hitting streak, May 22-June 6, going 29-65, .446, with 12 RBI, 15 runs, 13, BB, five doubles, and a pair of triples during the streak.

In a July 6-9 series, Daubert was 10-16, .625 with four RBIs, a double, and a triple, but the Dodgers lost three of four games to the Cardinals.

Season Cubs 3b Heinie Zimmerman dominated NL batting



Chicago 3b Heinie Zimmerman was the best hitter in the 1912 NL replay. In addition to his .344 batting average, Zimmerman led the league with 121 RBIs, 23 home runs, 238 total bases, and a .564 slugging percentage. Zimmerman ranked third in the batting race and his .386 OBP ranked 10th in the league.

While he recorded gaudy batting stats, however, Zimmerman was a drawback on defense. He often allowed ground balls to get past him for hits during frequent appearances at first base and was mediocre, at best, at third base. He was also slow on the basepaths as a baserunner, often clogging up the bases in the midst of Cub rallies.

 Apr 24 4-4, all 5 RBIs, including a three-run homer off Cincinnati's Art Fromme, in a 5-1 Cub win
 Apr 29 6-6, with 2 doubles, five runs, and a two-run HR off Cardinal righty Bill Steele in a 16-3 Cub victory
 June 8 Solo HR #7 to beat Pittsburgh's Claude Hendrix 1-0
 Aug 24-27 8-15 with a *home run in four consecutive games*, going 8-15, .533, 8 RBI against Philadelphia
 Sept 18 4-6 with two doubles, a 3R triple, 3 runs scored and 6 RBIs in a 15-3 romp over Pittsburgh

- Boston's **Bill Sweeney** was 9-19, .474, with a pair of doubles against St. Louis Sept. 2-4, but the Braves, mired in a last-season swoon, lost three of four games. In the same series, **Cardinal 1b Ed Konetchy was 11-22 with four RBIs**. Earlier in the year, **Sweeney was 8-12, .750** in a three-game series sweep against Cincinnati.

- New York's **Chief Meyers had a 15-game hit streak**, June 20-July 6.

- Philadelphia CF **Dode Paskert** hit five doubles in three straight Phillies wins against Boston May 31-June 1. Against Brooklyn Aug 2-4, Paskert stole seven bases in a four-game series against Brooklyn

- Boston OF **Jay Kirke had five four-hit games during** the season. Kirke was a surprise for the Braves, hitting .308 for the 1912 season.

- Late season Cincinnati call-up **Pete Knisely went 9-17, .529, to lead the Reds to three wins** in four games against the Giants Sept 5-8. Knisley hit a three-run HR off New York's Doc Crandall in the second game of the series, to lead the Reds to a 9-1 triumph.

- Boston RF **John Titus**, who hit so well for Boston after his acquisition from the Phillies on June 21, had two monster series late in the season, while trying to chase down Jake Daubert for the batting title. **Titus was 8-17, .471, with nine RBIs** in four games against Cincinnati Aug. 24-27, and **9-18, .500 in a four-game set against the Pirates** Sept. 5-8.

- Boston 1b **Ben Houser had a terrific six-game stretch June 2-July 4, going 15-27, .556, with 15 RBI**. On July 1, Houser hit his fifth and sixth home runs of the season, both off St. Louis righthander Rube Geyer.

- **Reds LF Bob Bescher led the majors with 101 stolen bases**. The Reds, seeking to overcome a popgun offense, ran Bescher at every opportunity. On July 4th, in the second game of a doubleheader against the Giants, Bescher stole four bases, including second, third and home on one sequence, as the Reds beat NY 7-1. Bescher also stole four bases against the Giants on July 21, but the Reds lost 6-5.

- **Brooklyn LF Zack Wheat hit .563 (9-16) in a four-game stretch against St. Louis** Aug. 24-27. Wheat hit a pair of home runs, a triple, and drove in seven runs as the Dodgers won three of four games.

- Cubs OF **Ward Miller** was the culprit in breaking up two no-hit bids by St. Louis righthander Bob Harmon. On June 5, Miller doubled in the 8th inning to break up Harmon's no-hit game in a 2-0 Cardinal win.

- Brooklyn's **John Hummell** feasted on Cincinnati pitching. In a four-game series with the Reds, June 29-July 2, Hummell played in three games and was **11-13, .846, with 5 RBIs**, including a homer. Later, in a four-game split against the Reds, Aug. 15-18, Hummell was **8-16, .500, with seven runs** in a four-game split.

- Dodgers 3b **Red Smith had a 12-game hitting streak May 21-June 1**, going 19-55, .345 with 12 RBIs, 13 runs, and 8 BB helping the Dodgers to a 7-5 run. During his hit streak Smith went 8-13 in a three game series against the Cardinals. Later in the season, on July 13, **Smith hit three triples in one game**, driving in four runs, in a 10-4 loss to Pittsburgh.

- New York's **Christy Mathewson** and Pittsburgh's **Claude Hendrix** both excelled on the mound and at the plate. Mathewson hit .358 with 44 hits, scoring 16 runs and driving in 17 runs, while adding 12 BB. Hendrix hit .256, driving in 14 runs, scoring 14 times, while hitting five doubles, four triples and a home run.

- Pittsburgh LF **Max Carey had two six-hit games**. On June 20, Carey went 6-7 with a pair of triples, a double, and five RBI in a 23-1 win over Cincinnati. On July 14, Carey was 6-6, all singles, in a 10-4 win over Brooklyn.

- St. Louis LF **Lee Magee** was 10-18, .556 with nine singles and a double in a four-game series against the Giants June 25-28, but the Cards were able to win the series opener, 6-3

- Pittsburgh's **Mike Donlin hit .450 in a four-game series against Brooklyn July 11-14**, driving in six runs, while hitting a double and a pair of triples as the Bucs won three of four.
 - Pirates SS **Honus Wagner was a one-man gang at Chicago** as Pittsburgh took three of four from June 16-19. Wagner was 12-18, .667 with five doubles, a home run and seven RBI.
 - Pittsburgh 1b **Dots Miller drove in eight runs in a four-game series** against Philadelphia Aug. 15-18.
 - Boston reserve **SS Harry Spratt was 9-17, .529**, with a pair of homers and seven RBIs, but it didn't seem to help as the Braves lost three of four to the Cubs.
 - MVP **Owen Wilson, Pittsburgh, was 11-17, .647 with three HR and 12 RBI** as the Pirates won three of four from Boston July 19-22. Wilson exploded for **an 11-16, .688 series against St. Louis**, driving in four runs and hitting three triples as the Bucs took three of four from the Cards in their stretch drive September 14-17
- Wilson hit home runs in back-to-back games May 31 (second game) and June 1**, with a 3R homer off St. Louis lefty Joe Willis and, the following game, a three-run homer, with five RBI, against Card reliever Rube Geyer.
- Giants leadoff man **Fred Snodgrass was 7-19, .529** in a four-game New York sweep of Boston June 3-6.
 - **Boston's Ed McDonald had three leadoff home runs** in the 1912 season.
 - New York 2b **Larry Doyle was grooved against Chicago's Jimmy Lavender**, hitting a two-run HR off the Chicago righty in a 3-2 Giants win on May 8 and hitting two more off Lavender on Sept. 2 in a 5-3 Giants win.
 - Giants C **Chief Meyers had a potent bat against Chicago June 30-July 2, going 11-15, .733** with two home runs and eight RBIs as New York won three of four. Meyers reeled off a 15-game game hitting streak (insert) The streak ended July 6, going 0-4 as the Giants lost to Pittsburgh's Marty O'Toole 4-1.
 - Cardinal 1b **Ed Konetchy was 11-22, .500 with five RBIs** as St. Louis won three of four against the last-place Braves Sept. 2-4.
 - Philadelphia LF **Sherry Magee was 7-13, .537**, with three walks against Chicago July 6-9.
 - For most of the season, Phillies OF **Gavvy Cravath** was a disappointment, but Cravath came alive in a four-game series **against the Dodgers Aug 2-4, going 11-18, .611, with nine RBIs**. The spurt raised his average, at that time, to .219.
 - Phils 2b **Otto Knabe hit two-game winning hits in in one week**, May 29-June 3. On May 29th, Knabe hit an RBI single in the 10th to beat Chicago 7-6. On June 3, he hit a tw-run single in the ninth to knock off Boston 9-8.
 - Pittsburgh's **Owen Wilson and Tommy Leach both hit three-run home runs** off Brooklyn's Earl Yingling, in an 11-4 win over the Dodgers.
 - Boston 3b **Ed McDonald started the season 1-24 before snapping the slump with a 5-6 game**, including a pair of homers and three RBIs in a come-from-behind Braves 9-8 against Brooklyn.
 - **Chicago's Frank Schulte, Vic Saier, and Heinie Zimmerman hit three consecutive home runs** off Philadelphia's George Chalmers on Aug. 26. The Cubs Ed Ruelbach went on to shut out the Phillies 4-0.
 - Boston's **Hank Gowdy and Harry Spratt both hit pinch-hit home runs** in an 8-7, 11-inning loss to Pittsburgh. Spratt's homer, a two-run shot, came off Claude Hendrix. Gowdy hit his pinch-hit HR off Bob Ferry.
 - Boston got the better end of a mid-season trade that send 1911 NL replay batting champ Doc Miller to the Phils for OF John Titus. Doc Miller hit .243 for the Braves while **Titus , who hit .276 for Philadelphia, hit .376 for the Braves, driving in 76 runs for his new team.**

Doc Miller was amazingly consistent for both teams, going 52-214, .243 for Boston and an identical 52-214, .243 with the Phillies. Miller hit eight doubles for Boston and 12 doubles for the Phils, driving in 32 runs for Boston and 26 runs for the Phillies.

- **The Phillies got the season off to an exciting start, executing a triple steal on Opening Day, April 11**, in a 5-3 win over Boston. 3b Hans Lobert stole home on the front end of the triple steal, which resulted after Fred Luderus failed to make contact while attempting a sacrifice with the bases loaded.
- **Pittsburgh had seven extra-base hits** in a 12-7 win over St. Louis on April 13
- **Brooklyn left 12 men on base in a 2-0 loss to New York's Jeff Tesreau** on June 1. Tesreau walked nine, yielding only four singles to Brooklyn, but the Dodgers could not push a run across. Ten days later on June 10, **Brooklyn left 18 runners on base**, but defeated Boston 8-4, while notching 19 hits.
- **Cincinnati had 12 men left on base** in a 7-3 loss to St. Louis on Aug. 7.

- **Philadelphia left 14 baserunners stranded in a 6-3 loss to Chicago** on July 6. Despite 14 hits, the Phils could not hit Chicago starter Ed Ruelbach and reliever Mordecai Brown when it mattered.

1912 National League Pitching Notes

Christy Mathewson's outstanding season was the difference in the pennant race

The extraordinary season enjoyed by **Christy Mathewson** (32-6, 2.00) was the primary reason the Giants won the 1912 pennant.

Mathewson reeled off nine straight wins to start the season before losing to the Pirates Marty O' Toole 5-0, on May 24. He then went on to win his next 12 in a row before the Pirates once again ended his streak on July 25. After improving his record to 29-3 by Aug. 30, Mathew finally stumbled, losing three straight, but he won his final three starts down the stretch to hold off the charging Pirates and secure the pennant for New York.

Some of Mathew's highlights:

- Nine straight wins to open the season (Apr. 12-May 25)
 - Sixteen straight wins (June 4-July 21) following his first defeat
 - Five shutouts, including three-hit shutout wins over St. Louis, Brooklyn, Pittsburgh
 - Pinpoint control, walking only 22 batters in 310 innings
- Brooklyn's **Nap Rucker** (25-9, 2.01), hampered by an inconsistent Dodger offense and a poor defense, nevertheless had an outstanding season. After losing four of his first five decisions, Rucker went 24-5 for the rest of the year. Over the final two months of the campaign, Rucker was 10-1 and recorded three saves, lifting Brooklyn into fourth place. Rucker led the National League in shutouts with six.
 - Pittsburgh's trio of 20-game winners, **Howie Camnitz**, **Claude Hendrix** and **Marty O'Toole**, almost pitched the Pirates to the 1912 pennant. After closing a big gap to pull within one game of the Giants on Sept. 13, the Pirates went 7-5 the rest of the way, but the Giants were 9-3.
 - Boston's **Hub Perdue** (15-13, 4.37) and fellow hurler **Walt Dickson** (10-13, 3.59) became the Braves first pitchers to win ten or more games over the past two seasons.
 - Philadelphia's **Earl Moore reeled off three shutouts in a row**, starting with a 2-0 blanking of Pittsburgh, on seven singles on July 17. Moore then held St. Louis to only three hits, all singles, in a 3-0 shutout on July 21. Five days later, on July 26, Moore shut out Chicago 3-0, allowing only three singles and a double, extending a **scoreless streak to 33 consecutive innings**. The scoreless streak ended in the first inning of a July 31 loss to Boston 5-4, with both runs resulting from first-inning errors by 3b Jack Boyle and LF Sherry Magee. **Moore later no-hit St. Louis on Aug 21.**
 - Chicago's aging veteran Ed Ruelbach was a surprising 13-6, 3.31. **Reulbach fired two straight shutouts in August**, blanking the Giants 2-0 on six hits on Aug 17 and following up nine days later with a 3-0 shutout over Philadelphia. Earlier in the season, on June 8, Ruelbach beat Pittsburgh's Claude Hendrix 1-0, allowing two hits.



- New York's **Red Ames (left) threw four shutouts in eight starts from June 19-July 22**. Ames blanked Philadelphia 3-0 on two hits on June 19. After a relief appearance and a 7-4 win over St. Louis, Ames outdueled Chicago's Jimmy Lavender to win 5-0, allowing only five hits. After winning two of his next three starts, Ames threw back-to-back shutouts, blanking Cincinnati 3-0, walking six, but allowing only three hits, and then throwing a four-hitter (three of the hits by Honus Wagner) to whitewash Pittsburgh 4-0.
- Giant righty **Jeff Tesreau reeled off six wins in a row to start the season** and improved to 13-2 by June 28, before losing to Chicago 7-5 on July 1 and, despite only giving up three hits in eight innings, losing to Cincinnati's Bert Humphries 4-0 on July 5.
- Giants lefty **Rube Marquard threw three consecutive shutouts in late May**.

Marquard started with a 1-0 one-hitter over the Cardinals, giving up only a singled by opposing pitcher Rube Geyer. Next, Marquard blanked Cincinnati on four hits 6-0 and then made it three shutouts in a row, beating Pittsburgh 6-0, giving up only a pair of singles. Marquard's streak of 27 consecutive scoreless innings came to an abrupt end on June 3, when Boston's Vin Campbell hit a two-run HR in the first inning of a 9-3 Giants win.

• Boston's **Ed Donnelly** threw shutouts in two consecutive starts for the pitching-poor Braves. Donnelly blanked Cincinnati 3-0 on two hits on July 9. On July 15, his next start, he shut out St. Louis 5-0 on five hits.

• Phillies righthander **Grover Cleveland Alexander** threw consecutive shutouts, shutting out St. Louis 5-0 on five hits on May 12 and, four days later, whitewashing Chicago 3-0 on seven hits.

• Brooklyn lefty **Earl Yingling** started out with four wins in six decisions, but then **lost 10 in a row** from June 3-Aug 11. Yingling then won two straight, with excellent outings against Cincinnati (4-1, 8 hits, one run) and Chicago (13-0, four hits).

• Cub righthander **Lew Richie** (right) opened the 1912 season with back-to-back shutouts, both on the road. On April 13, Richie threw a one-hitter at Cincinnati to beat George Suggs 1-0. In his next start, on Apr 17, Richie beat St. Louis 5-0, allowing only three singles. In his third start of the season, the scoreless streak ended quickly, with Cincinnati knocking Richie out of the game in the third, beating him 16-6.

1912 National League individual pitching records against opponents

Cy Young winner **Christy Mathewson** had a mediocre 3-4 record against Pittsburgh and a 4-1 record (combined 7-5, 3.37) against the Cubs, the only two other teams that posed any threat to the Giants.

Against the Bottom Six, however, Mathewson was absolutely devastating, going 25-1, 1.36, with four shutouts. Mathewson's only loss against the Little Five occurred on August 2, against last place Boston, who beat the Giants righty 4-2, with all four Braves runs coming with two out in the first inning. Combined against the tail-enders, Mathewson was 15-0 against Brooklyn, Philadelphia and St. Louis 4-0 against Cincinnati, and 5-1 against the Braves.


Three pitchers each won four games against first-place New York. Pittsburgh's **Marty O'Toole** and **Howie Camnitz** were each 4-2 against the Giants. Veteran Chicago righthander **Ed Ruelbach** was 4-1 against the pennant winners.

The most successful pitcher against a single team was Pittsburgh's **Claude Hendrix**, who was 6-0, 1.17, including a pair of shutouts vs. the sixth-place Phillies.

Besides Mathewson, other pitchers with five wins against individual teams included Brooklyn southpaw **Nap Rucker** who was 5-0 against Cincinnati and 5-1 against St. Louis, Camnitz, who was 5-1, 1.89 against Cincinnati, Pittsburgh's **Babe Adams**, who was 5-1 (including a relief win) against the Cubs, Cardinal lefty **Slim Sallee**, who was 5-0 against Boston, but 0-5 against New York, and Giants righthander **Jeff Tesreau**, who was 5-1 against the Cardinals.

Boston's **Otto Hess** was the only six-time loser against an individual team, going 0-6 against the Pirates. Cincinnati's hard-luck righty **Art Fromme** was 0-5 against both St. Louis and Chicago.

Besides Sallee, five-time losers against individual teams included NL losses leader **Lefty Tyler**, Boston (0-5 against New York and 1-5 against St. Louis), Cardinal righthander **Bob Harmon** (0-5 v. New York), Cincinnati's **Bert Humphries** (0-5 v. Brooklyn), Phillies righthander **Tom Seaton** (0-5 v. New York), and Brooklyn's **Elmer Knetzer** (0-5 against the Pirates)

Second place Pittsburgh (41-21, -5 games) snapped a two-game losing streak while handing cellar-dwelling Cincinnati (18-44, -28 games) their fifth loss in a row. The Pirates totaled 32 runs and 32 hits, their largest offensive output of the season, keeping them within five games of the league-leading New York Giants.

Dodgers take wild back-and-forth extra inning battle

Brooklyn (42-63, -37 games) snapped out a slump that saw them lose six of the seven previous games, scoring twice in the bottom of the 10th inning to topple Boston 15-14 in a free-swinging contest that moved the Dodgers into sixth place past the Braves (41-64, -38 games). Both teams combined for 29 runs and 45 hits while swapping the lead three times.

Boston's leadoff man Ed McDonald wasted no time getting things started, homering off Dodgers starter Maury Kent and, later in the inning, Jay Kirke singled home hot-hitting John Titus, who had tripled, giving Boston a 2-0 lead. Braves 1b Ben Houser increased the lead to 5-0 with a three-run HR in the third, but Brooklyn's John Hummell drove in two runs to cut the Boston lead to 5-2. Brooklyn hit Boston starter Walt Dickson for three more runs on an RBI double by Ed Phelps, a bases-loaded walk to Herbie Moran, and an RBI single by Red Smith, to make it 6-5 in favor of Boston.

After Boston increased the lead with a run in the sixth, Phelps got aboard via an error by Boston's Art Devlin and pinch-hitter Zack Wheat followed with a double, driving Dickson from the mound. With Buster Brown, on in relief for Boston, Jake Daubert drove in another run to put Brooklyn ahead 8-7. In the seventh, the Dodgers totaled six hits to score four more runs, putting themselves ahead 13-8

With the game seemingly out of reach going into the ninth, Boston jumped on Dodgers reliever Ed Stack for three straight hits, including an RBI double by Johnny Kling. Stack then gave up an RBI pinch-hit single to Hank Gowdy and then walked McDonald. Brooklyn, taking no chances, went to their ace, Nap Rucker, in a relief role, but Boston's Vin Campbell belted a three-run homer off Rucker to tie the game at 13 apiece and send it into extra innings.

The Braves regained the lead 14-13 in the top of the 10th after Art Devlin singled off Rucker, moved to third on an error by Dodgers SS Bob Fisher, and scored on an pinch-hit single by obscure reserve C. Gil Whitehouse.

The Dodgers, however, rebounded in the 10th, starting with a leadoff single by Wheat. After Braves reliever Bill McTigue entered the game, Boston's fifth pitcher of the day, Wheat scored on a sac fly by Red Smith, tying the game. Jake Daubert then delivered a two-out single and drove in Hummell to win the lengthy contest 15-14 for Brooklyn.

Boston batters slugged four home runs in the contest. Brooklyn's John Hummell and Jake Daubert each had four hits and three RBIs. Nap Rucker, who gave up the three-run shot to Campbell, emerged as the winner while Bill McTigue took the loss for the Braves.

Cincinnati 10, Philadelphia 9 27 innings

Reds win grueling marathon on Eddie Grant squeeze to drive in run in 27th inning; game featured great long relief by Phillies Happy Finneran, Reds Bert Humphries

Cellar-dwelling Cincinnati (43-69) prevailed 10-9 over fourth-place Philadelphia (51-63) in a brutal 27-inning marathon that saw both teams come from behind four times each. The extended game finally ended in the bottom of the 27th when Reds 3b Eddie Grant squeezed home 1b Dick Hoblitzell, who had earlier doubled and moved to third.

The game started out as a slugfest with starters Toots Shultz for the Phillies and Art Fromme of Cincinnati struggling. Philadelphia took a 1-0 lead in the first only to see Cincinnati tally three times in the bottom of the frame. In the second, Philadelphia got to Fromme for four runs, including a two-run triple by Cozy Dolan, in his first game as a Phillie. The Reds countered with runs in the bottom of the second and third to pull to tie the game at 5-5 and then drove Shultz from the game with two runs in the fifth by Armando Marsans and Bob Bescher to take a 7-5 lead. Philadelphia tied the game at seven apiece in the seventh on an RBI single by Gavvy Cravath, followed by an RBI double by 1b Fred Luderus.

The game remained deadlocked at seven each for the next 10 innings, as Phillie newcomer Happy Finneran and Reds reliever Bert Humphries traded zeroes, with both hurlers pitching spectacular relief. Finneran went 17 1/3 innings, allowing only six hits and a lone run and Humphries blanked the Phillies for 10 1/3 innings.

In the top of the 18th, Luderus greeted Rube Benton, on in relief with only a day's rest, with a solo home run to put the Phils on top 8-7. The Reds, however, were able to tie the game in the bottom of the 18th when the league's leading base stealer, Bob Bescher, singled, stole second and third and scored on an RBI single by Hoblitzell. Benton settled down after Luderus home run and went nine innings, fanning nine, and giving up only one other run when Phillie SS Mickey Doolan, aboard via an error by Reds SS Jimmy Edmond, scored on a squeeze by leadoff man Dode Paskert, putting the Phils in front 9-8. The Reds, however, finally got to Finneran, with Dick Egan singling in Hoblitzell to tie the game at nine .

In the bottom of the 27th, with one out, Hoblitzell doubled and after moving to third on an infield hit by Mike Mitchell, scored on a squeeze by Eddie Grant to end the battle and give the Reds a hard-fought 10-9 victory.

Both teams had opportunities to score in extra innings, but could not get their base runners to home. Philadelphia left 15 runners on base while Cincinnati had 22 left on base in the prolonged game.

Phillies Earl Moore throws no-hitter at Cardinals

Philadelphia righthander Earl Moore fired the first no-hitter of the 1912 NL season, to give the fourth-place Phillies (54-67) their third straight win over fifth-place St. Louis (52-69). Moore's pitching gem was the second straight Phillies shutout over the Cards. It followed a 1-0 shutout by teammate Ad Brennan the game before, on Aug. 20, and stretched a Cardinals scoreless string to 19 consecutive innings.

The Cards had plenty of base runners. Moore walked five and the Phillies committed four errors. St. Louis threatened in the seventh inning when Ed Konetchy walked to lead off the inning, but was thrown out at third when he tried to advance after Steve Evans got aboard via an error by Phillies RF Doc Miller. With two out, Cardinal CF Frank Gilhooley walked, moving Evans to second, but a great play by Philadelphia 3b Hans Lobert resulted in a force play to retire the next hitter, rookie C Pancho Snyder.

The Phils scored twice in the fourth inning on RBI singles by Fred Luderus and Otto Knabe and then broke the game open with five runs in the seventh, including a two-run single by Luderus and another RBI single by Knabe.

Moore struck out seven and, at bat, had two hits.

Pittsburgh, 15 games behind New York on August 10, closed to within a single game of New York with an exciting back-and-forth one-run victory over the Giants. With New York's Christy Mathewson on in relief, Pirates C George Gibson delivered a eighth-inning RBI single to give the Pirates a 6-5 win and a sweep of a four-game series against the Giants.

With Leon Ames on the hill for New York, the Pirates scored in the top of the first on a groundout RBI by Honus Wagner, scoring Bobby Byrne, who had walked. The Giants immediately responded with a pair of runs in the bottom of the inning off Pirate starter Hank Robinson.

Pittsburgh pushed over three runs in the fourth with Dots Miller scoring Wagner on a sac f, followed by a two-run homer by C Billy Kelly, his first home run of the season. In the sixth, Pittsburgh added another run when Wager tripled and scored on an error by Giants RF Red Murray, increasing the Bucs lead to 5-1. Again, the Giants rebounded, with three extra base hits and a single to score three runs in the bottom of the sixth to knock out Robinson tie the game at five apiece

New York pulled out all the stops, bringing in Mathewson in relief in the eighth. After retiring the first two batters, Butler tripled and Gibson, who had come into the game in the seventh, singled to drive in Butler to put the Pirates ahead 6-5. Wilburn Cooper, who had entered the game in relief in the bottom of the seventh, held the Giants hitless over the final three innings and earned the win.

Mathewson, who has had difficulty getting his 30th win, lost for the third straight time.

New York 8, Boston 3**Giants finally clinch pennant; win NL crown for second straight season**

The New York Giants (103-50) finally clinched the 1912 NL title with an 8-3 win over Boston (56-97), behind lefty Hooks Wiltse and Red Ames, who combined to hold Boston to 10 hits and three runs.

Facing Boston righthander Walt Dickson, the Giants jumped out to a 3-0 lead after three innings on RBI singles by Red Murray and Fred Merkle and a groundout RBI by Beals Becker. Boston tightened the game with two runs in the bottom of the third when John Titus singled home Ed McDonald and Bill Sweeney scored on a sac fly.

The Giants increased the lead to 4-2 after Buck Herzog tripled and scored in the sixth, but Boston rallied, with one out, with a single by Vin Campbell, followed by a double by Bill Sweeney. Red Ames came on in relief for New York, giving up a sac fly by Titus, scoring Vin Campbell, and hitting George Jackson, before fanning Art Devlin to end the uprising. In the top of the ninth, the Giants blew the game open against Lefty Tyler, who gave up three runs in relief before giving way to Bill McTigue, who gave up another run to put the New Yorkers in front 8-3.

Boston LF and SS Rabbit Maranville both were injured in a collision in the sixth while chasing Murraray's RBI single and had to leave the game. After the game, the Boston front office confirmed that both were out for the final game of the season.

Even though Pittsburgh beat Cincinnati 11-3, the Giants maintained a two game lead over the Pirates, clinching the title with only one game remaining for both teams. The Giants experienced a much closer finish than one would have anticipated when they cruised to a 15-game lead by early August, only to see their lead shrink to only one game on September 12.

Cincinnati 5, Pittsburgh 3 (11 innings)**Pirates tie game in ninth, but Reds push over two runs in overtime to close the 1912 season with a win**

The Cincinnati Reds (65-89, -39 games) finished their season with a tough 11-inning win over NL runner-up Pittsburgh (101-53, -3 games) to give righty George Suggs his seventh straight win and 22nd victory of the season.

The Reds took an early 2-0 lead in the first on a triple by Jimmy Edmond, followed by a pair of walks and a two-run single by 2b Dick Egan. Pittsburgh's Max Carey drove in Tommy Byrne in the third to make it 2-1 in favor of Cincinnati

The Reds added a run on a sac fly by Mike Mitchell in the fifth to increase their lead to 3-1. In the bottom of the ninth, however, the Pirates Owen Wilson doubled and Art Butler then tagged Suggs for a two-run homer, his first of the season, to tie the game.

In the top of the 11th, with reliever Bob Ferry pitching for Pittsburgh, Larry McLean led off the inning for Cincinnati with a single. Tommy Clarke, pinch-hitting for Suggs, followed with a single, but disaster struck the Reds when Andy Kyle, pinch-running for the slow-moving McLean, was thrown out at home by a great throw by RF Ed Mensor. Reds LF Bob Bescher, however, followed with a double and Jim Edmond squeezed Clarke home to put the Reds ahead. Armando Marsans then singled Bescher home with an insurance run.

Reliever Ralph Works, obtained by the Reds earlier in September from Detroit, put the Pirates away in order in the bottom of the 11th to earn his second save for Cincinnati.

The loss dropped Pittsburgh, who just missed overtaking New York, three games behind the Giants to finish the season. The Reds clinched sixth place with the victory, but overall it was a disappointing season for Cincinnati, who had aspirations of finishing in the first division.
