# Brooklyn surprises in 1914 National League replay 

Dodgers edge Cardinals by two games in hard-fought race

## Introduction 1914 NL Replay

The 1914 National League replay was my second full season replay within the 1914 season, following a 1914 Federal League replay that concluded in the fall of 2019.

In real life, the 1914 Boston Braves accomplished a miracle come-from-behind second half that saw them in last place on July 4, but by the season's end, pennant winners, well ahead of the second-place New York Giants.

In my 1914 NL replay, the Braves ran out of miracles and finished five games behind the surprising Brooklyn Dodgers, fifth-place finishers in real life, who won the NL title by two games over the St. Louis Cardinals, third place finishers in real life. The 1914 replay pennant race was a free-for-all that involved five teams with the Dodgers clinching the pennant on the next-to-the-last day of the season.

The NL replay pennant race was considerably more competitive than the real-life pennant race with the Braves simply unable to overcome a lack of starting pitching depth and any semblance of a bullpen and the Dodgers able to rely on stronger than expected pitching and an exceptional performance by MVP Zack Wheat.

St. Louis, bolstered by the presence of former Pirates Owen Wilson and Dots Miller and dramatic improvement by P Bill Doak, were in the pennant fight to the very end. Pittsburgh, seventh-place finishers in real life, had deep, exceptional pitching and remained contenders until the last two weeks of the season, finishing at 79-75, in fourth place. The Giants, expected to contend, started strong, but began to backslide in August, eventually landing in fifth place at 77-77 as the season came to an end. Chicago made a strong bid to get into the race, behind an exceptional August by P Hippo Vaughn, but the Cubs stumbled to a 10-14 September finish to finish in sixth place at 75-79.

## Preparation for the replay required three weeks

The prep time for the 1914 NL replay was greatly reduced by utilizing templates and formats previously employed in past replays.

Prior to embarking on the replay, I entered, in pencil, the actual starting lineups and pitching rotations for each game for the entire NL season, a process that took about a week, but proved to be a huge time-saver as the replay unfolded. Naturally, the results changed from real life as injuries occurred. Generally, however, the pennant race was considerably more competitive than the real-life pennant race. The real-life winner, the 1914 Miracle Braves, were simply unable to mount a consistent offense and Brooklyn, who finished fifth in real-life, were able to capitalize on stronger than expected pitching and a strong performance by Zack Wheat to win the '14 NL title.

BaseballReference.com served as the primary information source and was used to find the pitching order and starting lineups for the 1914 NL season. The online site was also called upon for specific information on trades and player transactions, which was employed at appropriate "dates" in the replay. For the 1914 season, in particular, this was particularly helpful as several players jumped from the NL to the Federal League and BaseballReference.com clearly identified when the jumps occurred.

The replay got underway on Wednesday, October 23, at 12:55 p.m. with Carole, assuming her traditional role as Inaugural Dice-Roller, rolling a 52-27 for Boston SS Rabbit Maranville, who was fanned by Phillies ace Grover Cleveland Alexander The replay concluded, in on Monday, March 23, at 10:10 a.m., with Carole capping the replay with a pair of rolls, the first one resulting in the Giants Jim Thorpe reaching base on an error by Boston 3b Red Smith and the final roll resulting in Giants SS Art Fletcher popping out to Braves pitcher Dick Crutcher.

The National League replay required 153 days (five months and five days) to complete.

## 1914 NL replay background and guidelines

- The 1914 Federal League replay launched my fourth complete season of year-by-year replays from the Deadball Era starting with 1911.
- The MG symbols governed the use of players, per APBA Master Game rules. The 1914 Fed League MG symbols used splits from both sides of the plate, plus $Q$ factors, which added to the realism of the replay.
- I created a number of XC cards using Steve's Computer Card. These cards reflected the stats for players who saw minimal playing time. Their performance was reasonably realistic and did not have any significant influence on the final results of the replay
- I utilized APBA's League Error factor, which was +3 for the 1914 season. The Error Factor significantly increased the number of errors in the replay.
- I used an Error Randomizer originally created for my face-to-face league (OAPBA), primarily to more accurately reflect outfielder error totals. The Randomizer did seem to tamp down OF errors, but had virtually no impact on a high number of overall C errors.
- I used a 154-game schedule developed from a numerical head-to-head formula as the foundation. The playing schedule was of my own making, in order to accurately maintain the daily standings in an organized, manageable manner. The schedule spanned "schedule dates" from April 11 through September 26. Off days were built into the schedule as were three double-headers traditionally conducted on specific holidays (Memorial Day, July 4 and Labor Day).

To speed the replay along, all teams initially played one another in home-and-away three-game series, followed by two separate rounds of home-and-away four-game series. I incorporated the rhythmic East and West road trips into the schedule, which gave the schedule more realistic feel.

- The replay was played from the 2010 version of Master Game boards. Other than the use of the Error Randomizer, games were played solely within APBA rules.
- Trades, roster changes and player debuts were conducted on the same or approximate date as real life, adjusted by approximately 14 days, particularly near the end of the schedule. The information was obtained via the transactions listed on BaseballReference.com and related Web searches.
- To the extent possible, position players were limited to their real-life games played and total plate appearances and at bats, using a combination of all three defining factors to prevent overusage. Overall, the governing guideline for player usage was common sense.

Rather than rely on at-bats as the primary governing benchmark for regulating overuse of position players, I relied on total plate appearances. Further, to help in governing player usage, I utilized the actual batting orders in the order of games played, available through BaseballReference.com. This proved to be a real boon in terms of managing player usage. There were, of course, some minor discrepancies caused by injuries. All in all, the combination of plate appearances, actual batting orders and movement of players on or about transaction dates served to provide a very realistic presentation for each team.

Starting pitchers were utilized on the same dates as real life starts and restricted to the same number of starts as real life (with a couple of minor exceptions, which moved a starting pitcher's start up or down in the schedule) to accommodate the actual playing dates. Relief appearances were used with
the same frequency as real life, differing only if there were blowouts or extra-inning games) that required extended use of pitchers.

## Personal notes

The replay got underway in the middle of the 2019 football season. Throughout the replay, I had the MLB playoffs on in the background on the radio and, after the baseball season ended, turned to college football, with the Florida Gators and West Virginia Mountaineers on TV and SEC football on in the background on the radio or television.

I was able to play an average of four games a day, a result of penciling in all the starting lineups before the replay got underway.

The replay concluded as the coronavirus pandemic began to sweep over the nation in late February. I took advantage of the stay-at-home policies to speed through the final month-and-a-half of the replay in a matter of three weeks. The annual RydMe Cup event, played with former colleagues from Disney and Anheuser Busch scheduled for March 23-26 at Amelia Island, was canceled in late February (coronavirus fears), which allowed more time to finish off the replay in a short amount of time.

Granddaughter Kate continued to excel in sixth grade at Lake Highland Prep. Kate appeared as a nun in The Sound of Music and continued to improve on her artistic talents, painting an original scene for our 2019 Christmas card and providing us with a great painting of an Arctic hare that we proudly put on display in our condominium's downstairs living area.

My golf handicap flattened out at 25, with right shoulder problems (arthritis, torn rotator cuff, torn biceps) limiting my ability to hit tee shots very far. My tee shots, however, were dead straight (for the most part) and my short game continued to be reliable. Fairway woods...a different story, lacking the necessary distance to reach greens and, sometimes, without great direction.

## 1914 National League pennant race Dodgers prevail in rough-and-tumble battle that lasted entire season.

The 1914 National League replay offered an exciting pennant chase that ended with surprising Brooklyn, fifth-place finishers in real life, eking out a two-game margin over emerging St. Louis, clinching the pennant only on the final day of play.

For the majority of the season, the pennant race was a six-team battle that did not sort itself out until the final eleven days of the season, when Brooklyn and St. Louis narrowed the field to one another. With two games remaining and both teams deadlocked, Brooklyn prevailed, winning their final two contests, both over Philadelphia, while the Cards lost their final two games to Chicago.

The Miracle 1914 Boston Braves, the real-life pennant-winner, failed to re-create their real-life magic, finishing third by five games. The Pittsburgh Pirates, real-life seventh-place finishers in 1914, overcame offensive shortcomings and rode a stalwart pitching staff to a fourth-place finish.

The New York Giants, who won the past three NL replays (1911, 1912, 1913), suffered through a dismal September to fall into fifth place at 77-77, .500. The Chicago Cubs remained in the fray until Labor Day (Sept. 3), but lost twelve of their final 20 games to drift into sixth place.

Only Philadelphia (71-83) and Cincinnati (63-91) were totally out of the race for the entire season.

## Dodgers and Cubs get off to quick starts; led league at end of April

Brooklyn served early notice that they might be a force to be reckoned with, sweeping a pair of three-game road series over New York and Philadelphia, to kick off the 1914 season. In the West, Chicago also got off to a good beginning, winning six of their first nine games.

After a three-game sweep over Cincinnati, the Cubs improved to 9-3 by April 24, to lead Brooklyn by one game. By month's end, the Dodgers improved to 12-6 to hold a one-game lead over the Cubs and two-game edge over New York and Pittsburgh. Cincinnati (7-11) and Philadelphia (6-12), hampered by a seven-game losing streak Apr 13-20, were the only two teams that appeared to be non-contenders.

## Pennant chase turns into free-for-all by Memorial Day; seven teams in contention

Seven teams found themselves within four games of first place by May 14 with only last-place Philadelphia seemingly out of the race.

St. Louis moved into contention in early May, winning eight of their first 10. The Dodgers, meanwhile, won seven of their first 12 games in the month.

By May 14, Brooklyn and St. Louis were tied for the lead at 17-13 with Chicago and Cincinnati only a game behind. The Giants, and Boston, who won six of nine to start the month, were two games back and Pittsburgh had crept to within three games of the lead.

Brooklyn continued to hang tough for the remainder of the month, winning nine of 16 , finishing the month at 26-20 on Memorial Day (May 31), a single game ahead of St. Louis, who went 17-11 for May.

Brooklyn and St. Louis had plenty of other competition for the top spot with only seven games separating the first-place Dodgers from the last-place Phillies. New York (24-22) was in third, two games behind, while persistent Cincinnati (23-23) and Chicago were tied for fourth place, only three games out of the lead. Boston and Pittsburgh, both 22-24, also remained in touch with the leaders.

## Giants take over the lead as season moves to halfway point in June

Brooklyn dropped six of nine as June got underway and St. Louis, who won seven of 10 to start the month, seized the opportunity to move into a tie for the top spot on June 7. The next day, however, the Dodgers and Cards were joined in the top spot by John McGraw's Giants, who won seven of nine as June got underway.

St. Louis and Brooklyn continued to jockey for the lead throughout the middle of the month, with Brooklyn winning three of four from New York, dropping the Giants back to three games behind by June 18.

The Pirates, meanwhile, entered the chase by wrapping up a six-game win streak on June 4 before dropping a 2-0 shutout to the Cubs Hippo Vaughn (right). The Bucs then won eight of their next 11 to move into a second-place tie tie with New York by June 17, three games behind St. Louis and a game ahead of Brooklyn. By this date, Boston and Chicago, both with 30-33 records, had fallen seven games behind and appeared to be fading.

Beginning June 18, the Giants began to surge, winning nine of their next 12 games to take over first place on June 27.


By month's end, the Giants held a one-game lead over the Cards, only two games ahead of Pittsburgh and three games ahead of Brooklyn. Boston, at 36-38, was six games behind, and Chicago, 34-40, eight games in back of the Giants, both continuing to struggle to make up any ground.

Cincinnati (32-42), who was at $16-16, .500$, as late as May 17, suffered the loss of pitchers Chief Johnson and Dave Davenport, along with OF Armando Marsans, to the Federal League, launching the Reds into a 9-19 free fall for the month, dropping them into a tie for seventh place with the Phillies, with both teams 10 games out of first place.

## Race narrows to four team battle by July 31; Boston and Chicago struggle to keep up

The front-running Giants got off to a poor start in July, splitting with the suddenly depleted Reds and then losing three of four at Pittsburgh, falling out of first place on July 5.

Pittsburgh took advantage of the Giants woes, reeling off 11 wins in 17 games at the start of July to vault into a three-way tie for first with St. Louis and New York by July 14. The Pirates and seized first place by themselves on July 15. Their lead was short-lived, however, as Brooklyn, New York, and the Cards all regained their footing over the next five days and by July 20, the standings evolved into a four-way deadlock for the lead:

Brooklyn, riding a win streak that had started on July 15, took over sole possession of first on July 24. The Brooks were able to cling to the lead by month's end, but only by a single game in front of the Giants and Pittsburgh, with only St. Louis two games out.

Cincinnati, who had lost two more players to the Federal League just before July, fell into a 2-14 slump that began on July 1 and tumbled into the cellar, where they resided the remainder of the season. The Phillies, meanwhile, enjoyed a winning month, going 15-13 for July, jumping ahead of the slumping Reds and settling into seventh place on June 14, where they finished the season.

## Dodgers builds decent lead, but gives it all back with losing streak. Pirates seize lead by end of August.

Even after kicking off August with a lackluster 4-5 start, Brooklyn continued to remain in first place by two games over Pittsburgh and New York by Aug. 8. The Dodgers then headed to Pittsburgh, where they won three of four and then swept four from the struggling Reds, moving them four games ahead of Pittsburgh by Aug 18.

Just when it appeared Brooklyn might be poised run away with in the race, the bottom dropped out as they lost nine in a row, starting with a 2-1 error-plagued loss to Chicago's Larry Cheney, and suffering back-toback sweeps at St. Louis and, even worse, losing four in a row to contending Pittsburgh. The four-game sweep enabled the Pirates to tie the Dodgers for the lead on Aug 30 and, behind a 5-0 one-hitter by George McQuillan the next day, Pittsburgh moved into the lead by one game over Brooklyn on the final day of August.

Remaining within striking distance were New York and St. Louis, both tied at 68-62, two games behind. Quietly moving up in the standings were Boston, four games out, and Chicago, only five games behind with 24 games left on the schedule.

## Dodgers regain footing; win seven of eight to start September, finish with 9-3 rush to capture crown

Appearing that they were about to fall completely apart, the Dodgers found relief in the form of the last-place Reds. Brooklyn won three of four, at home to pull back into a tie with the Pirates by Labor Day, Sept. 3. Brooklyn next hosted the Cubs at home, sweeping the Bruins to increase their lead, by Sept. 7, to two games over Pittsburgh and four games over the Cardinals.

On Sept. 8, behind by four games and with the season's end drawing closer, St. Louis traveled to Ebbets Field for a four-game series that would likely settle the pennant race. Every game in the series turned into a grueling battle, with the Cards coming out on top, winning the first three games in a row, all in extra-innings:

Sept 8 St. Louis 4, Brooklyn 3 (13 innings) Cards Owen Wilson threw out tying run at home in bottom 13th Sept 9 St. Louis 6, Brooklyn (10 innings) Cards scored on WP, Ivey Wingo RBI double in top of 10th Sept 10 St. Louis 5, Brooklyn 4 (17 innings) Owen Wilson sac fly scored Dots Miller, aboard via error in 17th Sept 11 Brooklyn 3, St. Louis 2 Zack Wheat 2R double in $8^{\text {th }}$ beat great effort by Hub Perdue

The series win left St. Louis two games behind the Dodgers with nine games remaining, all against opponents from the West, while Brooklyn's nine remaining games included six at home, all against Eastern opponents.

Adding more drama to the pennant race, the Boston Braves, who won nine of 12 to start September, had crept to within two games of the lead and had an upcoming four-game series against the Dodgers remaining.

New York split with the Cubs to start the month, but then had a disastrous home series in the Polo Grounds, losing three of four to last-place Cincinnati, falling five games behind by Sept. 7, all but ending their prospects for a last-moment sprint to the pennant.

Facing their Eastern opponents, the Dodgers did precisely what they needed to do, first knocking New York out of the race by winning three of four, Sept. 14-17 and then taking the first three games a four-game series at Boston, dropping the Braves five games behind by Sept. 21 and eliminating them from the race.

In the West, the Cardinals also took care of business. They first kayoed Pittsburgh, giving up only five runs in four games in a sweep over Pittsburgh Sept. 14-17. After losing an 11-inning battle to Cincinnati 5-4 on Sept. 18, St. Louis won their next five in a row, three over the Reds and the first two games of a home series against the Cubs, tying the Cards and Dodgers for first place with only two games left in the season.

On Sept. 25, the Dodgers beat Philadelphia 4-3 on a dramatic home run by Casey Stengel (right) in the top of the $10^{\text {th }}$ inning . At the same time, St. Louis ace Bill Doak gave up two runs in the top of the $8^{\text {th }}$ inning to lose 2-1 to Cub starter George McConnell, in McConnell's only start of the season.

Brooklyn's victory, combined with the Cardinal loss gave the Brooks a onegame lead with one game left. The only hope for the Cards was a Brooklyn loss to the Phillies and a Cardinal victory over Chicago , on the season's final day, Sept. 26.


With the pennant on the line in the season's final game, the Dodgers scored three unearned runs in the second off Philly's Stan Baumgartner, and then added four more runs in the fourth, on five straight singles, to give Ed Reulbach all the support he needed as Brooklyn won 9-3.

Needing a win in their final game, combined with a Dodger loss, St. Louis fell short, losing to Chicago in a grueling 11-inning contest 7-6. The Cubs scored three runs via two Cardinal errors early in the game. The, Cards gamely fought back to take a 6-4 lead in the eighth, only to see their lead evaporate when the Cubs pushed over two runs in the ninth off Slim Sallee, on in relief. In the 11th, Chicago's Frank Schulte ended the Cards hopes....and the pennant race, with an RBI single off Sallee, clinching the 1914 NL pennant for the Dodgers.

Down the stretch, the combination of Zack Wheat's hitting and Jeff Pfeffer's pitching was the difference between Brooklyn and the other contenders. Wheat hit. 358 for the final month of the season while Pfeffer was 6-1 in September, allowing only six runs in his six wins.

## Team by team recap

First place: Brooklyn Dodgers, 86-68, .558, + 2 games
The Dodgers were at the top, or near the top, of the standings throughout the 1914 season, in contrast to their real-life fifth-place finish in 1914. Brooklyn's offense was the most productive in the league while their pitching depth was far greater everyone else but Pittsburgh.


The Dodgers pitching was led by dependable Jeff Pfeffer (24-10, 1.41), who was backed up by Ed Reulbach (18-11, 2.78), Pat Ragan (14-14, 2.74, and surprising Raleigh Aitchison (12-4, 2.09). Frank Allen (10-11, 3.03) chipped in some quality starts and also earned two saves in 12 relief appearances.

Brooklyn led the league in hitting with a team .260 batting average. The offense was led by MVP Zack Wheat (.341, 14 HR, 102 RBIs), with solid support from 1b Jake Daubert (.307, 56 RBIs), CF Jack Dalton (.296, . 367 OBP), and RF Casey Stengel (.254, 10 triples). Veteran 2b George Cutshaw only hit .245, but drove in 69 runs.

3b Red Smith hit . 289 and driving in 47 runs before being traded to Boston in late July. Off the bench, John Hummel (.269) and OF Myers (.288, 36 RBIs) both provided solid backup.

Second place: St. Louis Cardinals, .545, - 2 games
The Cardinals were doormats for the NL in the 1913 replay, but came into their own in 1914, falling only two games short of the pennant while remaining in contention throughout the entire season.

The maturation of P Bill Doak (22-10, 1.59) and the acquisition former Pirates, 1b-SS Dots Miller (.259, 76 RBIs), RF Chief Wilson (.222, 74 RBIs) made a huge difference in the Cardinals performance.

Doak was terrific all season long while righty Pol Perritt (19-10, 2.11) and veteran southpaw Slim Sallee (17-12, 2.25) gave the Cardinals a reliable core of starters. Dan Griner (11-8, 2.77) was productive as a part-time starter and long reliever.

The St. Louis offense was not overwhelming and reliant on speed and timely hitting. 2b Miller Huggins led with the league with 114 BB. OF Lee Magee (.260) and LF Cozy Dolan (.249, 52 RBIs, 15 SB) delivered some timely hits. Catchers Pancho Snyder (.283, 45 RBIs) and Ivy Wingo (.300, 30 RBIs in a part time role) provided needed offense from the number eight slot in the batting order.


The trio of Dolan, Magee, and Wilson gave the Cardinals a solid defensive outfield while Huggins and Dots Miller, who shuttled between 1 b and SS, anchored a reliable infield.

## Third place: Boston Braves 81-73, .526, -5 games

The Braves failed to replicate their amazing 1914 pennant, primarily because of the inconsistency of their starters beyond their superb duo of Bill James (24-11, 1.74) and Dick Rudolph (23-11, 1.90). George (Lefty) Tyler (15-16, 2.69) was off-and-on all season long. Dick Crutcher (5-12, 4.36), and 35-year old Otto Hess (2-7 5.16) were totaly ineffective and the Braves lacked anything that resembled an effective relief pitcher. Hub

Perdue (3-6, 1.91 in the early season) was traded to St. Louis, just in time, as it turned out, putting up horrible numbers with the Cardinals.


Boston hit 251 as a team, but the Braves suffered from a lack of power. LF Joe Connolly played primarily against righthanders and hit .342 to lead the league in batting. 2 b Johnny Evers hit . 279 (. 371 OBP, 82 BB ) and made only eight errors at 2 b and 1 b Butch Schmidt (.268, 73 RBIs) hit well and Red Smith, after coming over from Brooklyn, hit.273. Utilityman Possum Whitted (.297) and OF Ted Cather (.304), obtained from the Cards for Perdue, hit well, but only totaled 22 extra base hits between them.

Defensively, the Braves had some outfield challenges, particularly when they had to play Les Mann and Herbie Moran together in the outfield, where they comined for 22 errors. The infield, led by SS Rabbit Maranville (.226, 24
errors) and All-Star C Hank Gowdy (.240, 49 RBIs) proved better than average.

## Fourth place: Pittsburgh Pirates 79-75, .513,-7 games

Pittsburgh's, hard-working pitching staff led the National League with a 2.42 ERA and kept the Pirates in contention until the last two weeks of 1914. The Buc pitching corps led the NL with fifteen shutouts.

The Pittsburgh defense wasthe best in the National League, committing 145 errors. The defense was particularly strong when 3b Mike Mowrey (.272, 34 RBIs) was in the lineup in the first half of the season. Mowrey however, was lost to injury halfway through the season. Defensive specialist Alex McCarthy took over at third, but McCarthy was unable to generate any offense, hitting a poor .121 in 67 games.

McCarthy's hitting woes typified the rest of the offense, the worst in the NL (. 223 BA, .289 OBP). Their inability to hit was compounded by a total lack any power, as reflected in the team's 290 slugging average. The Pirates scored a meager 499 runs for 1914, the only NL team to fail to reach 500 runs.

The threesome of Wilbur Cooper (18-14, 1.98, seven shutouts), Babe Adams (17-19, 2.07, six shutouts) and Bob Harmon (15-13, 2.26), obtained from the Cardinals in the off-season) was bolstered by George McQuillan (12-12, 2.08, five saves) and All-Star reliever Joe Conzelman (7-4, 2.66, three saves), both of whom pitched in for long relief appearances, as well as spot starts.

The Pirates leading hitter was 2b-0F Jim Viox (.253, 63 BB, 43 RBIs). Fortyyear old Honus Wagner hit only .227, but drove in 60 runs to lead NL shortstops and the crafty old-timer also stole 27 bases. 1b Ed Konetchy and LF Max Carey both hit .244, with Konetchy driving in a team-leading 64 runs, and Carey racing for 40 SB , second in the NL.

## Fifth place: New York Giants 77-77, .500, -9 games



After winning three straight pennants, time and age caught up with New York. The Giants stayed close to the lead until mid-September, but lost eight of their final 12 games drop to fifth place, finishing at .500 for the campaign.

The Giants, as a team, hit .258 , second-best in the league, but not a single regular player reached .300 . The offensive leader of the Giants was All-Star OF George Burns (.287, . 393 OBP, 32 doubles, 74 RBIs, 103 BB and league-leading 46 SB ).

Beyond Burns, no Giant batter lit up the scoreboard, with virtually no power among the other regulars. 2b Larry Doyle (.273, . 331 OBP), but had only 21 extra base hits. C Chief Meyers (.269) had only 12 extra base hits. LF Bob Bescher (.277, .337) stole 28 bases, but was caught stealing an astounding 35 times. Off the bench, OF Dave Robertson (.308, . 347 OBP) drove in 33 runs.

Long time Giants great Christy Mathewson got off to a fine 14-3 start, but fell apart from July through the end of the season, losing ten of his last 14 decisions to finish at 18-13. Particularly troubling was Mathewson's inability to keep the ball in ballpark, giving up a league-leading 19 home runs, 12 of them over the second half.


The most effective Giants starter was Al Demaree 16-12, 2.62 ), who notched five shutouts, including a trio 1-0 victories: v. Chicago on June 30, v. Brooklyn on July 27 and v. Boston, a 10-inning 1-0 four-hitter on Sept 24.

Jeff Tesreau lost eight of his first 10 starts and never really recovered, finishing the season at 18-22, 2.35, despite tossing eight shutouts. Tesreau wrestled with control problems all season long, walking a league-leading 167 batters while starting 40 games, tops in the NL. His 22 losses were the most in the league.

Rube Marquard, who served as a Giants mainstay for the three previous pennantwinning seasons, slumped to $11-17,3.67$.

Art Fromme (8-6, 2.57) and Hooks Wiltse (3-1, 2.58) saw plenty of action out of the bullpen and delivered solid results.

## Sixth place: Chicago Cubs, 75-79, .487,-11 games

The Cubs offense in 1914 was comprised of the one-two punch of Heinie Zimmerman (.306, 92 RBIs, 35 doubles, 13 triples, 7 HR) and Tommy Leach (.290, .369 OBP, 9 HR). After Zimmerman and Leach, nobody else in the Cub lineup represented much of a batting threat, a primary reason the Cubs tumbled to sixth place. The six other regulars besides Zimmerman and Leach combined to hit only .211, limiting Zimmerman's ability to drive in even more runs and Leach's ability to score more often from his leadoff slot.

Lefty Hippo Vaughn (24-14, 1.73) won his 20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ game on Aug. 28, but went 1-5 to finish the season. Vaughn threw eight shutouts, including three shutouts in a four-game stretch from Aug 4-Aug 14. After a 13inning long relief job on Aug 20, Vaughn won his next two starts, but then fell into his season-ending slump. Vaughn fanned 202 batters, second in the NL.

Larry Cheney (17-17, 3.09) was inconsistent all season long and often struggled with his control, walking 143 batters. Jimmy Lavender (14-8, 3.72 ) also battled to find the plate, walking 114. Bert Humphries (14-8, 2.39) was a pleasant surprise and Zip Zabel (4-6, 2.72) proved to be effective coming out of the bullpen.


## Seventh place: Philadelphia Phillies, 71-83, .461-15 games

Philadelphia never really got going in the 1914 replay, losing seven straight, including four shutout losses, after winning their first two games of the season against Boston. The Phils had to rely on starters Grover Cleveland Alexander and Erskine Meyer and a high-powered offense (for the Deadball Era) to overcome a leaky defense, and injuries to hard-hitting 1 b Fred Luderus that cost him a third of the season.

The porous Phillies defense committed 192 errors, the second most in the league, leading to 138 unearned runs, which padded pressure on the offense to simply try and outslug their opponents.


The offense featured HR leader Gavvy Cravath (.284, . 271 OBP, 17 HR, 75 RBIs), LF Sherry Magee (.290, 82 RBIs), Luderus (.263, 14 HR, 58 RBIs in 109 games), OF Beals Becker (.309, 21 doubles, 46 RBIs), along with speedy 3b Hans Lobert (.261, 49 BB, 21 SB). The team hit a league-best 196 doubles and 62 HRs, which provided plenty of entertainment throughout the 1914 replay.

Alexander (25-13, 2.05, 25 CG, nine shutouts 244 strikeouts) was superb through the entire season. Mayer 21-11, 3.35) was a surprise, relying on sheer determination to win many of his games. Once past Alex and Mayer, the quality
of pitching dropped marketly with Ben Tincup (8-13, 2.68), Rube Marshall (3-14, 5.21) and Eppa Rixey (5-9, 5.44) rounded out the starting five.

## Eighth place: Cincinnati Reds 63-91, .409, -23 games

Cincinnati's strange journey to the cellar was a direct result of players jumping to the Federal League.
The Reds got off to a slow start in April, starting with the loss of frontline P Chief Johnson, who jumped to the Fed's City Packers after only one start with the Reds. Despite Johnson's abrupt departure, Cincinnati began a slow rise in the standings, evening their record at 11-11, . 500 on May 5 and then moving to within a game of the NL lead on May 14, with a 16-14 mark. They hovered around .500 for the remainder of the month and by Memorial Day they clawed their way back to .500 at 23-23.

On June 2, OF Armando Marsans (.327, . 389 OBP) became the second Cincy regular to jump, joining the St. Louis Terriers. Ten days later, starter Dave Davenport j(3-4, 3.00) joined Marsans in St. Louis. The disruption made an immediate impact on the Reds and on June 4, they dropped into seventh place, just ahead of the slumping Phillies.

At the beginning of July, two more Reds players bailed for the Federal League; IF Johnny Rawlings (. 309 in limited action) to Kansas City and CF Johnny Bates, who (.239), who joined the Baltimore Terrapins. Despite the roster disruptions, the Reds soldiered on in seventh until July 16, when the Phillies finally passed them in the standings, dropping Cincinnati into the cellar. After settling into the bottom slot, the Reds went 23-40, .365 for the remainder of the season, ending the "lost season", 23 games behind
 Brooklyn

Cincinnati's top two pitchers performed surprisingly well with Red Ames going 18-18, 3.54 and Rube Benton going 16-16, 3.73. Righty Phil Douglas slogged to a 7-20, 3.28 record while Pete Schneider, replacing Davenport, went 6-7, 3.58. The fifth starter, Earl Yingling, had a miserable campaign (4-18, 4.21).

Offensively, the Reds could not generate much firepower. As a team, the Reds hit only 20 home runs and ranked seventh in the league in batting with a watery .234 BA. 1b Dick Hoblitzell (.305, . 370 OBP) was off to a fine start, but was dealt to Boston in early July. Only 2b Heinie Groh (.278, . 385 OBP), SS Buck Herzog (.257) and C Tommy Clarke (.250) represented much of a batting threat. OF Red Killifer, a late season call-up, hit . 282 with a 378 OBP in 43 games.

## Top All-Star honors go to Dodgers Zack Wheat, Phillies Grover Cleveland Alexander

## Wheat named NL MVP; Alexander wins Cy Young award

Brooklyn LF Zack Wheat, who led the Dodgers to the 1914 NL replay title, and Phillies ace Grover Cleveland Alexander, who led the NL in wins, despite pitching for the league's seventh place team, headlined the 1914 NL replay All-Star team. Wheat was the NL MVP and Alexander earned Cy Young honors.

Wheat's Brooklyn teammate 1b Jake Daubert (.307, 10 HR, 60 RBIs) totaled 166 hits and led the league in runs scored with 91 and was the best defensive 1b in the NL. The Dodgers pitching ace, Jeff Pfeffer (24-10, 1.41), was a close second to Alexander for Cy Young award consideration.

The lone member of the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals to make the All-Star team was Bill Doak (22-10, 1.59, 145 Ks ), who fired a no-hitter, and whose superb pitching kept the Cards in the race all season long.

Four members of the Boston Braves earned All-Star honors. righties Bill James and Dick Rudolph, who combined for 47 wins, more than half of Boston's total of 81 victories, were selected among the five starting pitchers. C Hank Gowdy (.240, 49 RBIs, 50 BB ) was the best of a mediocre group of NL catchers and 2 b Johnny Evers (.279, 151 hits, 82 BB ) whose outstanding defense and timely hitting came close to lifting the Braves to the pennant.

Forty-year old Pirate SS Honus Wagner (.227, 16 doubles, 10 triples) captured All-Star honors, primarily for his defense and because he drove in 60 runs, more than any other SS in the league. Bucs reliever Joe Conzelman (7$4, .266$, three saves), who consistently deliver several outstanding long-relief performances for the fourth-place Pirates, was named the All-Star reliever.

Cubs 3b Heinie Zimmerman (.306, . 342 OBP, 183 hits) was the main offensive threat in the fifth-place Cubs batting order, leading the league with 35 doubles and driving in 92 runs.

Rounding out the All-Star outfield were New York Giants LF-CF George Burns, who led the league with 46 SB and was the Giants primary offensive force and slugging Phillies RF Gavvy Cravath (.283, $19 \mathrm{HR}, 75$ ), who led the NL in homers and whose power numbers ranked high, despite suffering injuries on two different occasions.

## Zack Wheat's strong September earns MVP honors for Dodgers LF

Brooklyn LF Zack Wheat came into his own in 1914, driving the Dodgers down the stretch to the 1914 replay pennant. Wheat hit .341, finishing runner-up in the batting race by one point to Boston's Joe Connolly, led the league in RBIs for the second straight season with 102 runs batted in (note: tied with Gavvy Cravath, Phila in 1913), base hits (184), total bases (284) and tied with Boston's Joe Connolly for the top spot in slugging (.517).


What really distinguished Wheat was his strong showing from midAugust through the end of the season, despite an injury that cost him five games from Sept. 18-23. With Brooklyn dueling with St. Louis going into their final series of the year, Wheat went $9-15, .529$, leading the Dodgers to three out of four wins and preserving their slim lead over the Cardinals.

## Boston's Joe Connolly won 1914 batting crown by single point over Wheat

Braves LF Joe Connolly, platooned against righties for most of the season, hit . 342 to win the NL batting title by a single point over Wheat (.341) in a tight batting race battle that continued through the final game of the season.


With the onset of September, Connolly (left) led the NL with a .344 batting average while Wheat ranked second at .337. Connolly raised his average to .351 by September 11, but began to tail off as Boston faltered in their bid to catch Brooklyn down the stretch, going 10-38, . 263 over the next 11 games.

Entering the final game of the season, Connolly was hitting .343, two points ahead of Wheat, who had batted at a furious pace in September, raising his average to .341 by Sept. 25, with one game left in the season.

With the pennant on the line on the season's final day, Sept. 26, Wheat went 2-5 with three RBIs against the Phils to finish the season at .341. Connolly, meanwhile, did not enter Boston's final game until the seventh inning, as a pinch hitter in a 5-3 win over New York, drawing a base on balls and then flying out on his final at bat to finish at .342 , one point better than Wheat.

Down the stretch, Wheat's hard-hitting September was a major factor in Brooklyn's ability to hold its NL lead. Wheat was 24-67, . 358 in the season's final month. Connolly, meanwhile, continued to hit well, going 2472, .333. Connolly's output was just enough to edge Wheat for the batting title, but short of what the Braves needed to catch the front-running Dodgers.

## Owen Wilson defensive abilities helped shape St. Louis into a contender



RF Owen (Chief) Wilson, obtained by St. Louis in the off-season in a multiplayer, made a huge contribution to the Cards defense and was one of the key reasons St. Louis emerged as a contender for the 1914 NL replay title.

Before the start of the 1914 season Wilson, along with 1b Dots Miller, OF Cozy Dolan SS Art Butler, and P Art Robinson, was dealt to the Cards in exchange for P Bob Harmon, 1b Ed Konetchy, and 3b Mike Mowrey. The trade worked out for both teams, with St. Louis contending until the final game of the season and the Pirates overperforming and finishing in fourth place. The player who made the most difference, however, was Wilson, who patrolled right field for the Cards with the same defensive prowess that earned him MVP honors in a previous 1912 replay.

Wilson's offensive output receded considerably in 1914, hitting only .222, but he had a knack of delivering timely hits with 45 extra base hits and 74 RBIs, tying him with New York's George Burns for seventh in the league in runs batted in.

It was Wilson's defense, however, that made him special, Although Wilson had lost some range in the outfield, his cannon-like right arm ( 38 arm ) remained powerful and was a deterrent for baserunners who wanted to be more ambitious on the basepaths. For the season, Wilson threw out 13 opposing baserunners, twice throwing out two baserunners in the same game

Some of Wilson's defensive highlights from 1914:
July 17 Threw out two Phillies baserunners at third base in a 3-1 Cardinal win.
Aug 6 Threw out two Cincinnati baserunners in a 5-2 loss to the Reds.
Sept 8 Threw out Jake Daubert with would-be tying run at home in the bottom of the 13th to preserve a 4-3 Cardinal win at Brooklyn.
Sept 10 Threw out Dodger Zack Wheat at home in the bottom of the $10^{\text {th }}$ in a 5-4, 17-inning win at Brooklyn.

## Giants George Burns became New York's offensive mainstay

New York outfielder George Burns emerged as the Giants offensive leader in 1914, topping the NL in stolen bases with 46 swipes and ranking third in the league with a . 393 OBP. He was a consistent hitter for the first five months of the season, recording four hitting streaks of 10 or more games. Burns entered September hitting .304, with an outside chance at the batting title, but tired during the season's final month, going 14$78, .179$ for the month, but finishing 1914 at a respectable .287 .

Burns proved valuable on defense for New York, playing all three outfield positions LF while demonstrating a strong throwing arm, totaling 11 outfield assists.


## Heinie Zimmerman, Tommy Leach constituted most of Chicago's offense



Chicago's all-star 3b Heinie Zimmerman, who led the NL in slugging in 1912 and 1913 replays, again enjoyed a solid campaign, finishing second in RBIs (92), second in doubles (35), third in triples (13) and fifth in slugging (.443). Zimmerman also ranked second in the league with 265 total bases. His only shortcoming was on defense, where he committed 18 errors at third base.

Zimmerman had an outside shot to climb into the batting race as the 1914 season wound down, entering September hitting .312, but fell short, hitting 269 over the final month to finish with a .306 batting average.


Tommy Leach, who patrolled CF for the Cubs, excelled while serving as Chicago's leadoff man. He batted 290, with an OBP of 369 , ranked third in the NL in base hits (175), fourth in runs scored (81) and third in bases on balls (82). Leach was also a clever baserunner, swiping 22 bases (seventh in the NL) while being caught only five times.

For a leadoff hitter, Leach showed surprising power with nine home runs, four of them leadoff homers to start a game. On June 25, he hit a pair of homers against Boston, both solo shots, with the first off Braves lefty Otto Hess and the second off George (Lefty) Tyler.

## Redbirds Miller Huggins excelled at getting on base

Miniscule St. Louis 2b Miller Huggins maintained his reputation as an outstanding leadoff hitter, leading the NL in bases on balls (114) and ranking fifth in the league in OBP (.374). Huggins only hit .243 for the season and led the league in strikeouts (79), but got on base often enough to score 79 runs, tied for sixth in the league. Huggins led the 1913 NL replay with a .409 OBP and had a .395 OBP in the 1912 replay.

On defense, Huggins teamed with Dots Miller, who alternated between 1b and SS, to bolster the infield and help turn the Cards into a contending team.


## Phils Gavvy Cravath won HR title with 17 round-trippers



Philadelphia RF Gavvy Cravath was the league's leading HR hitter in the 1914 replay. Cravath amassed 12 home runs over the first three months of the season. From July 12 through the end of the season, Cravath hit only five more homers, hampered by three different injuries, two resulting from collisions with CF Dode Paskert and 2b Bobby Byrne and one with the RF wall that cost him playing time.

After getting over the injuries, Cravath showed he was well with a pair of home runs on Aug. 31, both off Cincinnati's Charley (King) Lear in a 6-0 Phillies victory. Four days later, he hit a solo shot off St. Louis lefty Slim Sallee to beat the Cards 7-6 in 15 innings.

## Jack Dalton's offensive consistency augmented Brooklyn's offense

An unexpected surprise for pennant-winning Brooklyn was OF Jack Dalton, who effectively filled in for injured Zack Wheat, and wound up hitting .296, sixth in the NL. Dalton recorded only 14 extra-base hits in his total of 136 base hits, but his hitting was consistent and included a 13-game hitting streak in June and an 11-game hitting streak in July. During Brooklyn's final week of their pennant run, Dalton hit a sac fly to beat NY 3-2 in 13 innings on Sept. 17, hit a pair of triples and drove in two runs against Boston in a 6-0 win three games later, and capped his season-ending spree with three RBIs in a 9-3 win over the Phillies on
 the final game of the season on Sept. 26.

## Versatile Sherry Magee had solid year at plate while plugging holes in Phils lineup



Philadelphia LF-SS Sherry Magee wound up third in the NL with 82 RBIs and hit nine home runs, teaming with HR king Gavvy Cravath (17 home runs) and 1b Fred Luderus (14 homers) to put the Phillies at the top of the team home run count in 1914. Magee was a versatile player, moving to shortstop for part of the season to offset the lack of offense provided by Dummy Murphy, who was released, and mid-season acquisition Jack Martin, who hit only .174. He also filled in at 1 b when Fred Luderus missed considerable action due to injury in mid-season. Magee rapped out 167 hits, fourth in the NL, 34 doubles, third in the league, and ranked seventh in batting (.290).

## Dots Miller bolstered Cards infield at 1b and SS

Dots Miller, who came over to St. Louis in the big Cardinal-Pirate transaction, played an instrumental role in the Cards rise in the standings.

Miller provided solid offense (.259, 76 RBIs, 154 base hits and tied for the league lead in sac flies (12). Miller only missed two games all season long, starting the season at 1b and winding up at SS, where he took over from Art Butler, who had been counted on to take over from his predecessor Charlie O'Leary, hit only .211.

## Dodgers 1b Jake Daubert delivered another solid season



Slick-fielding 1b Jake Daubert reeled off another productive season in 1914, batting .307. fourth in the league, ranking tenth in OBP at .359. and, hitting ahead of MVP Zack Wheat, scored 91 runs to lead the league. Daubert got off to a quick start and hit in 13 straight games from April 13-May 10, but was slowed by injury later in the season after a collision with C Lew McCarty.

Daubert did not exhibit great power, ending the season with 10 home runs and 166 hits, but he played great defense, committing only seven errors all season. He le

## Beals Becker hit well, played in all three OF positions for Phillies



Philadelphia's Beals Becker was a man in motion for the offensive-minded Phils, with playing time at all three outfield spots. The constant defensive switching, however, had no effect onhis hitting skills.

Becker finished third in NL batting (.309) and was eighth in base hits (158) and tied for tenth in total bases (210). He also finished seventh in slugging with a .410 slugging average.

## Doubles leader Red Smith started season with Brooklyn, finished with Boston

Braves third baseman Red Smith was obtained from Brooklyn in mid-season after the Dodgers tired of his disagreeable manner in the Dodgers clubhouse. Outside the clubhouse, Smith performed well, leading led the NL with 39 doubles and rankeing ninth in slugging (.398).

His total of 77 RBIs ranked fourth in the NL and he was seventh in base hits with 167. Before they traded him to Boston, Brooklyn seemed to get the most out of Smith, who hit .289 with 47 RBIs prior to his departure from the Dodgers on August 1. With Boston, Smith hit a respectable .273 and drove in 30 runs, but it wasn't enough to lift
 the Braves into first place.

## Outstanding NL pitchers

The 1914 NL replay produced six pitchers with 20 or more wins, three fewer than the 1913 replay.
The only pitcher from the NL 1913 replay group of ten 20-game winners who returned to the 20 -win circle was Grover Cleveland Alexander, who won the 1914 Cy Young award with a 25-13 records, the most wins in the NL. Joining Alexander were Brooklyn's Jeff Pfeffer, Boston's duo of Bill James and Dick Rudolph, rising star Bill Doak of St. Louis and surprising Phillies righthander Erskine Mayer.

## Phils' Grover Cleveland Alexander's Cy Young season included nine shutouts, no-hitter



The slow start of Phillies righthander Pete Alexander's 1914 season only gave a faint hint that the tough righthander would go on to win the Cy Young award.

Through May 25, Alexander was 5-5, 2.34 for the Phillies, who had settled into the cellar by four games. For the rest of 1914, however, Alexander was the best pitcher in the National League, going 20-8, 1.94 for a team that eventually finished in seventh place and possessed the second-worst defense in the league.

Starting May 29, Alex won seven of his next eight stars before losing
5-0 to St. Louis after giving up four runs in the first inning. Alexander then won his next two starts, including a 3-0 win at Chicago before a loss to Pittsburgh 3-1, giving up 12 hits, all singles. He rebounded with back-to-back shutouts against St. Louis and Chicago and then polished off Boston twice in a four-game series in late July to improve to 18-8. After losing five of his next eight starts, allowing 19 runs in the eight games, Alex finished the campaign with a flourish, no-hitting Chicago 2-0 on Sept. 10 and throwing back-to-back shutouts against New York and Brooklyn to conclude the ' 14 season at 25-13.

Indicative of Alexander's season was his 10-5 record against the top three teams in the league, including three wins over first-place Brooklyn and six wins against third-place Boston.

## Boston's duo Bill James and Dick Rudolph fell just short of leading Braves to 1914 pennant



In a preview of "Spahn and Sain and pray for rain," Braves righthanders Bill James (24-11, 1.74) and Dick Rudolph (23-11, 1.90) served as what was essentially a two-man pitching staff for third-place Boston. Time after time, the two pitchers would win back-to-back starts only to see their second-line pitchers give the wins back with lackluster performances.

Starting June 24, Rudoph went on a roll, winning 10 games in a row, including four straight shutout starts, blanking Cincinnati twice, St. Louis 8-0 on July 14 and a tough 1-0 win against the Phils Erskine Mayer on July 27. Even after Rudolph's streak ended, he cooled off, winning six of his final 11 starts.

James got off to a 6-2 start with back-to-back shutout wins over Cincinnati and Chicago on May 14 and May 17. He was at his best, however, down the stretch, taking over from Rudolph's decline with eight wins in a row before setbacks in his final two starts of the season, ending with a critical 6-0 loss to Brooklyn on Sept. 21, giving up a pair of run-producing triples to Dodger CF Jack Dalton.

## Brooklyn ace Jeff Pfeffer led Dodgers to crown with 24-10 record, league-best 1.41 ERA



Righty Jeff Pfeffer came within an eyelash of the Cy Young award, winning 24 games while posting a 1.41 ERA for the pennant-winning Dodgers. In September, Pfeffer won five games, allowing only five runs in the wins, to lift the Dodgers to the crown, including a 3-1 two-hitter over New York on Sept. 14 and a 3-2, 13-inning complete game win over the Giants three days later. On September 20, Pfeffer cooled off surging Boston with a 6-0 shutout victory, allowing only a pair of singles.

## Hippo Vaughn great season petered out at season's end



Chicago southpaw Hippo Vaughn his 20th game on August 28 and he seemed to be headed toward a Cy Young season. Vaughn's fortunes, however, abruptly turned around in September, losing five of his last six starts to finish the season at 21-14.

Even with the dismal finish, it was an outstanding year for Vaughn, who threw eight shutouts including three shutouts in four starts in August, followed by a heartbreaking 1-0 loss to New York, with the only run resulting a throwing error by Vaughn.

Vaughn's fine performance was particularly noteworthy because his offensive support was lacking the Cub defense was inconsistent throughout the season.

## Bill Doak blooms as ace of the staff for runner-up Cardinals

Expectations for 1914 were low for St. Louis righthander Bill Doak, who went 2-8, 4.74 in a 1913 replay. Doak, however, confounded the prognosticators, delivering a memorable season that lifted the Cards to within two games of the NL pennant. For the campaign, he finished 22-9, 1.59, ranking second in ERA to Brooklyn's Jeff Pfeffer.

Doak started the campaign with a four-game win streak that peaked on May 12, when he threw a no-hitter against Brooklyn 5-0. After losing two of his next three starts, Doak reeled off another four-game win streak from June 2-June 17. He lost his next two outings, but starting July 1, again captured four straight wins, before encountering a rough patch, losing five of six starts from July 18-Aug 15, the last four losses all in a row.

Starting Aug. 19, with the NL pennant on the line, Doak ran off eight consecutive
 wins before struggling in his last start, a no-decision in a critical 7-6, 11-inning loss to the Cubs on Sept. 25, the next-to-last day of the season, dropping the Cards one game behind Brooklyn.

Erskine Mayer came of nowhere to become a 21-game winner for Phillies
Righty Erskine Mayer showed mild promise after the 1913 replay, when he went 7-7, 2.87 in limited action. But Mayer, like the Cardinals Bill Doak, blossomed in the 1914 replay, going 21-11, 3.24.

While his numbers were not as gaudy as the other five 20-game winners in the 1914 replay, Mayer demonstrated considerable toughness, giving up three or four runs in most starts, but outlasting the opposition throwing 20 complete games. Mayer's most outstanding performance came on June 11, when he beat Boston 10-0, allowing only a sixth-inning single by OF Les Mann.


## Pol Perritt finished 19-10, excelling in both starting and relief roles for St. Louis



Lanky Pol Perritt got off to a blazing start in the 1914 replay, going 12-5 through July 12, when he fell into a slump, losing four in a row before rebounding with a 3-0 shutout over New York. After winning three of his next four starts to improve to 16-10, Perritt was called on for relief help for three weeks before returning to starting duties, a move that cost him a 20 -win season.

Perritt was on the losing end of two narrow losses in mid-July, dropping a 1-0 decision to Dodger ace Jeff Pfeffer via an unearned run and a 1-0 loss to Boston when Rabbit Maranville squeezed home the Braves winning run in the bottom of the ninth.

## Wilbur Cooper's pitching kept Pirates in race until mid-September

Pittsburgh was a surprise contender in the 1914 replay, thanks in large part to the excellent pitching by Wilbur Cooper. The Pirate lefty got off to a fast start and by July 12, thanks to a 13-5 start by Cooper, the Pirates were into a tie Brooklyn for the league lead,

The southpaw slumped, however, for the remainder of July and early August, but then rebounded in spectacular fashion. Over a four-game stretch beginning Aug 17, he threw back-to-back shutouts against the Phillies and Giants, beat the Phils a second time with a 2-1 five-hitter, and then tossed a 5-0 four-hit shutout against Boston, improving to $18-11$ as the season entered its final three weeks. Unfortunately, Cooper did not win another game as the Pirates faded in early September. He, lost his last three decisions in a row to finish at 18-14, 1.98


Ed Reulbach regained form for Brooklyn; mid-season run 15-3 kept Dodgers on top


Coming off a lackluster 6-7 season in the 1913, during which he was traded by Chicago to Brooklyn, Ed Reulbach once again found his touch, resulting in huge dividends for the Dodgers in 1914. Reulbach went 18-11, 2.78, serving as the strong number two starter in the Brooklyn rotation, behind Jeff Pfeffer.

From April 28-July 24, Reulbach went 15-3, helping the team stay on top of the NL standings. He faded a bit near the end of the season, but saved one great start for his final outing of the season, on September 26, clinching the pennant for the Dodgers with a determined 9-3 win over Philadelphia


Dodger righthander Pat Ragan (14-14, 2.74) won four of five Sept. starts, including a critical 4-3 10-inning win at Philadelphia on Sept. 25.


Cardinal lefty Slim Sallee finished 17-12, 2.25 with six shutouts. Sallee faded down the stretch, going 0-3 in September, including a season-ending 7-6 11-inning relief loss to Chicago on the season's final day.


Speedy Pittsburgh LF Max Carey (left) tied for the league lead in triples (17) with Philadelphia's Sherry Magee. His 40 stolen bases were second to league leader George Burns, who stole 46 SB. Carey also led the NL in games played with 153.

## 1914 National League Team Totals

## Pennant-winning Dodgers offense outpaced contending rivals. Cardinals excelled with pitching.

The '14 National League offense, as a whole, slightly outpaced 1913 replay stats with the average team batting average up five points ( .242 v . .237 in 1913), runs scored per team ( 566 v .542 ) and base hits ( 1267 v .1221 ).

Oddly, the average team ERA declined slightly from 3.01 in 1913 to 2.97 in 1914, reflecting a downturn in extra base hits in the NL 1914 replay. Th NL's offensive numbers overall were below previous replays from 1912 and 1911.

Brooklyn led the NL in hitting (.260) and runs scored (627), and base hits. The Giants had the best team on-base percentage (.323). The Dodgers . 344 slugging percentage, augmented by a league-leading 71 triples, slightly better than Philadelphia (.341), even though the Phils hit a league-leading 62 home runs and 196 doubles.

Stolen bases were hard to come by. The speed-dependent Giants stole 157 bases, just over half of what they stole in 1913, and were caught stealing 130 times. The Giants also led the league in sacrifices with 59, a reflection on their dependence on speed and small ball.

Pitching continued to dominate in 1914 with run-starved Pittsburgh (2.42) leading the league in ERA and tying for the most shutouts (19), offsetting a singles-hitting offense that only hit .223 and could only muster a combined team total of 230 extra-base hits. St. Louis ( 2.56 ERA) had 83 complete games to pace the NL while Brooklyn had a respectable 2.64 ERA and 77 CG. The Cards handed out the fewest walks, allowing 413 bases on balls.

Cincinnati had the weakest pitching staff with a 3.68 ERA also led the league in home runs allowed (43). Chicago's pitchers handed out 530 walks, the most by any NL team in 1913 and 1914 replays.

Defensively, Cincinnati was woeful with their glovework, committing 214, the most for any NL team over the past two seasons and the second straight replay season they led the NL in errors committed.

## 1914 National League pinch hitting

National League pinch-hitters, as a whole, performed exceptionally well in the 1914 replay, averaging 245 per team.

Perhaps it was no coincidence that the three teams that led the National League in pinch-hitting were the top three finishers in the 1914 replay race, although not in the same exact order of finish. Two teams, Brooklyn (.308) and Boston (.306) led the league with team pinch-hitting batting averages over.300. St. Louis pinch-hitters batted 284 .

The top pinch-hitter in the league was Josh Devore, who split the season between Philadelphia and Boston. While with the Phillies, Devore was extraordinary, going 7-14 with a pair of doubles and two walks. As a Brave, Devore saw more playing time, but maintained his pinch-hitting hot streak, going 35. Combined, Devore was 10-19, . 523 with an on-base percentage of .583. Devore and

Chicago's Cy Williams tied for the most hits as a pinch-hitter with 10 base hits. Pittsburgh's Ham Hyatt, who had 43 at-bats as a pinch-hitter, led the league with pinch-hit RBIs with five.

## 1914 National League Batting Notes

## Season Joe Connolly edges Zack Wheat by a single point in furious race for NL batting title

Boston's Joe Connolly was the victor in a magnificent batting race battle that was not decided until the final game of the season. Connolly nosed out MVP Zack Wheat of Brooklyn by a single point, . 342 to .341 .

Connolly jumped into the NL batting lead almost immediately and remained atop the batting average race from mid-April through the entire season. As the season's end drew near, however, NL MVP Zack Wheat went on a batting tear that kept the Dodgers on top of the league standings.

On August 31, Connolly held narrow lead, hitting .344 with Wheat six points back at.338. With Boston frantically seeking to make a season-ending charge, Connolly went 14-33 from Sept 1-Sept 11 raising his league-leading
 BA to .351 , fifteen points better than Wheat's .336 .

Connolly then stumbled in a four-game series against the Phillies, going only 4-17 to drop to .346 . Wheat, meanwhile, went 3-11 in four games against New York, dropping him to .335 , eleven points behind Connolly.

In the fourth game against the Giants, Wheat singled in a run in his first at-bat. In the third inning, chasing a double by Giants 1b Fred Merkle, Wheat collided with SS Dick Egan and both were injured. Wheat was out of action for the next series, a critical with Boston Sept 18-22 and Egan out for the remainder of the year.

Boston lost the first three games against the Dodgers to fall out of the pennant race. Connolly went 3-12 in the series, his batting lead falling to .343 , eight points ahead of Wheat, with a only four games v. New York left.

Returning to action for the final series of the year, in a make-it or break-it series against the Phillies, Wheat went $7-12$ for the first three games, improving to .341 , only two points behind Connolly with one game remaining.

In the final game of the season, Connolly did not enter the game until the seventh inning, walking as a pinchhitter, and then flying out on his final at bat, ending the year at .342. Wheat went $0-2$ on his first two at-bats, against the Phils Stan Baumgartner, but hit a pair of singles in his final two at-bats, driving in three runs as the Dodgers wrapped up the pennant with a 9-3 win. Wheat finished at .341 , a single point in back of Connolly.

If Wheat had generated one more hit, over the final month, he would have won the batting crown by threethousandth of a point over Connolly, 3424 to 3421 . The September series-by-series breakout of the race between Connolly and Wheat:

## Zack Wheat's productive hitting leads Dodgers to pennant

NL MVP Zack Wheat may have fallen one point behind in the batting race, but he was the most dominant batsman in the NL and the leader of a Dodger offense that topped the league in batting.

Wheat finished second in OBP at .396, led the league with 102 RBIs and base hits (187), tied for second in triples (13), led the league in total bases (284) and tied with Joe Connolly for the league lead in slugging (.517). He ranked third in the NL in home runs with 14. He was a consistent hitter throughout the campaign, chalking up a hitting streak of 12 games and two hitting streaks of 11 games.

What also exhibited a flair for the dramatic. On June 20, he had a five-hit game, including a grand slam HR, in a 13-5 win over Philadelphia. On July 23, he hit a three-run pinch-hit HR to defeat St. Louis 4-3. On August 11, he squeezed home the winning run in a 1-0 won over the Pirates.

As the season neared its conclusion, Wheat had two terrific series. From Aug 18-
 21, he went 12-19, . 632 with three extra-base hits, including a HR, plus six RBIs in as the Dodgers split with Chicago.

In the 'Dodgers final series of the year and the pennant on the line, Wheat saved his best for last, going 9-17, . 529 to lead Brooklyn to three wins in four games over Philadelphia to clinch the pennant.

## Team batting notes

Chicago scored nine runs in the third inning in a 13-1 win over Cincinnati on Opening Day, April 11. Already ahead of Cincinnati's Rube Benton entering the third, the Cubs rattled off eight hits, highlighted by a Vic Saier three-run HR.

Boston buried the Phillies 18-0 on April 13, serving early notice that they might be a contender. The Braves totaled 21 hits attack on Apr 13. Phillies reliever Eddie Jacobs walked nine Braves while the Phillies could not reach Braves starter Hub Perdue, leaving 12 men on base.

Cincinnati pounded out a 17-5 blowout win over St. Louis on Apr 19 with ten of the runs unearned, the result of five Cardinal errors. The Reds scored 12 runs in the first three innings, nine of them off Card starter Casey Hageman. Four St. Louis pitchers combined to hand out 11 bases on balls. Cincy C Tommy Clarke led the attack with a 5-6 day with four RBIs.

Philadelphia left 11 men on base in a 6-5 loss to New York on Apr 24. The Phils piled up 13 hits off Rube Marquard and Hooks Wiltse, but couldn't push enough runs over and ended the game with Sherry Magee, the tying run, thrown out at home by Giants RF Fred Snodgrass.

Pittsburgh scored eight unearned runs in a 10-1 thrashing of Chicago on Apr 27. The Pirates tallied seven unearned runs in the fourth inning alone, in the lopsided win.

Chicago won a 2-1 win over St. Louis on Apr 30, totaling 12 singles and a double, but leaving 13 left on base as Jimmy Lavender threw a six-hitter to
 thwart the Cards.

A furious four-run rally in the ninth enabled Boston to tie the game and come away with a 7-6 victory in 11 innings in a remarkable come-from-behind win on Apr 28. In the ninth, the Braves got to Giants starter Al Demaree for three runs and reliever Ferdie Schupp gave up the tying run, resulting from an error by NY SS Art Fletcher, as the Brave tied the game. Boston won in the $11^{\text {th }}$ on an RBI single by Jim Murray, off Schupp, scoring P Dick Crutcher who had doubled.

Chicago captured a strange 4-3, 12-inning win over New York on May 5. Giants starter Jeff Tesreau walked 12 Cub batters, but managed to wriggle out of jam after jam throughout the game, with Chicago leaving eight LOB. The Cubs eventually got to Tesreau in the $12^{\text {th }}$ after he walked Tommy Leach and Vic Saier, followed by an RBI single by Cy Williams to end the game.

New York, bludgeoned Chicago 17-7 on May 6, the day after their odd 4-3, 12-inning loss to Chicago. The Giants scored six runs in the first, all unearned and totaled six doubles in the lopsided win, led by Fred Snodgrass (5-6, HR) and pitcher Art Fromme (4-6, 2 RBIs).

The Giants reeled off four straight hits in the $14^{\text {th }}$ for a 6-3 win over Pittsburgh on May 14. Both teams combined for 35 hits (New York with 19, PIttsburgh with 16), but neither team could manage to score many runs. Art Fromme (3-1) was the winner in relief.

New York overcame a 5-0 deficit for a 6-5 come-from-behind win v Chicago on May 21. The Giants poured over six runs in the final three innings with George Burns capping the comeback win with a two-run homer off Cubs reliever Zip Zabel in the bottom of the ninth.

Cincinnati blew an 8-2 lead, but rebounded for a 9-8, 21-hit win over Boston in 11 innings on May 27. Boston scored six runs in the final two innings of regulation play, including a game-tying 3 R home run by Joe Connolly in the $8^{\text {th }}$, but Cincy scored on an error by Braves CF Les Mann in the 11 th to regain the lead with obscure reliever Erv Kantlehner earning the win.

Pittsburgh reeled off seven straight hits in an 11-5, 12-inning win over Chicago on June 8 . With the game tied at five apiece in the top of the $12^{\text {th }}$, Honus Wagner singled and the next six batters also got base hits, all off reliever Eddie Stack, scoring six runs to give the Pirates the win. Earlier the Pirates had blown a 5-1 lead when the Cubs scored four in the ninth, including a three-run pinch-hit double by Heinie Zimmerman, tying the game.


Boston poured over eight runs in the fifth inning in a 13-2 triumph over Brooklyn on June 8. Leading 5-1, the Braves scored eight runs on eight hits in the fifth, including a two-run triple by Charlie Deal and a 2R HR by Larry Gilbert. Dodger lefty Nap Rucker absorbed most of the damage, giving up seven runs before giving way to Ed Reulbach, who gave up five of the eight runs in the fifth inning.

The Braves and Phillies combined for $\mathbf{3 0}$ hits in a 9-8 Boston win on June 13. The Braves overwhelmed Phily starte Eppa Rixey in the firt, scoring seven runs. The Phils, however, battled back to close to $9-8$ in the ninth, on a two-run HR by Dode Paskert, off Otto Hess, but Hess was able to retire the final batter for the save.

Phila's Bobby Byrne homered off Brooklyn's Frank Allen in the top of the $\mathbf{1 0}^{\text {th }}$ to lift the Phils to a 7-6, 10-inning win on June 19. Philadelphia built up a 3-0 lead, but the Dodgers tied the game in the seventh at 3-3. The Phils scored three times in the next two innings, but the Dodgers again rallied with three more runs in the ninth to tie the game at 6-6 before Byrne's HR ended the game in the $10^{\text {th. }}$.

Zack Wheat hit a grand slam and Brooklyn scored nine runs in the fifth as the Dodgers beat Phila 13-5 on June 20. With the Phils leading 5-3 in the fifth, the Dodgers exploded with four straight hits, then got two runners aboard via errors before Wheat put the game away with his grand slam.

Boston battered Chicago 14-4 behind a 21-hit attack on June 26. Joe Connolly and Butch Schmidt both drove in four runs for the Braves and Les Mann was 4-5 with three RBIs.

Cincinnati scored a combined 12 runs in two innings and totaled 21 hits in a 16-3 win against Philadelphia on June 23. In the second inning, the Reds ran off seven straight hits and seven runs off Phillies starter Rube Marshall. Winning pitcher Pete Schneider even got into it, going 3-5 with three runs and an RBI.

On June 25, two games later, the Reds pounded out 20 hits for a 13-3 rout of the Phillies.
On June 27, the Giants took over first place with a seven-run outburst in the $16{ }^{\text {th }}$ inning in a 9-2 win over Chicago. With the game tied at two apiece in extra innings, NY picked apart relievers Charlie Smith and George Pierce in the $16^{\text {th }}$ with six hits, a hit batsmen and Chicago contributed an error. NY recorded 20 hits in the win.

Brooklyn's offense piled up 20 hits in an11-4 win over Chicago on July 3. In the first game of a twin bill, the Dodger bats were red-hot, with 17 singles, a pair of doubles and a William Fischer triple, totaling 11 runs.

The Dodgers scored eight runs in the fourth inning in a 12-0 whitewash of St. Louis on July 6. The Cards pulled a triple play in the first to escape a jam, but they couldn't escape the Dodger bats the rest of the game as Brooklyn scored four runs in the next two inning and then put the game away with an eight-run outburst in the fourth. Dodger starter Frank Allen carried a no-hitter into the seventh before Zinn Beck singled to break it up.

Chicago erupted for eight runs in the top of the ninth for a 14-5 victory over Boston on July 9. The Cubs scored five off reliever Iron Davis and three more off Gene Cocreham, who walked three in the inning. Boston did not go away quietly, reeling off four consecutive pinch-hits in the bottom of the ninth to score four runs.

Brooklyn came from behind to score four runs in the bottom of the ninth in an exciting 8-7 win over Cincinnati on July 13. The Dodgers posted three runs off Reds starter Rube Benton and then scored one more run with three straight hits off Phil Douglas, on in relief for Cincy, with Zack Wheat delivering the game-winner.

The Pirates lost 4-0 to the Cards Slim Sallee on July 26, leaving 12 runners on base and squandering nine hits, three walks, and a baserunner aboard via an error, none of which scored.

Pittsburgh suffered a major offensive outage Aug 11-Aug 14, going 30 straight innings without scoring. Brooklyn's Jeff Pfeffer, Raleigh Aitchison, and Pat Ragan threw consecutive shutouts against Pitt in the final three games of a four-game series Aug 11-13. During the three shutout losses, the Pirates were 8-86, .093. The Pirates finally scored in the fourth inning of a 6-3 win over Phila on Aug 14, pushing over five runs on five singles and a walk off Phillies starter Eppa Rixey.

New York scored nine runs in the first three innings in a 11-2 runaway over Chicago on Aug 16. The Giants piled up 22 hits in the lopsided victory. Cubs starter Charlie Smith never made it out of the first, giving
 up six runs on seven hits before giving way to Casey Hageman, who gave up five runs the rest of the game.

Boston totaled 23 hits in a 14-7 win over Cincinnati on Aug 6. Braves SS Rabbit Maranville had three RBIs and reserve OF Ted Cather hit a three-run homer off hapless Earl Yingling.

In an epic comeback, Boston shook off deficits of 4-0 and 9-4 to beat St. Louis 10-9 in 10 innings on Sept. 2. The Braves totaled eight extra base hits in the win, including a two-run pinch-hit triple by Les Mann and a pinchhit double by Josh Devore to win the game in the $10^{\text {th }}$ inning.

A day after piling up eight extra base hits against St. Louis, Boston racked up 11 runs in the second inning in a $\mathbf{1 3 - 1}$ win over St. Louis on Sept 3, in the second game of a doubleheader. After the Cards won the opener 3-2, the Braves offense went to work in Game Two with 11 runs in the second, including a grand slam HR by 3b Red Smith and a two-run triple by C Bert Whaling.

Reds OF Armando Marsans was 7-14, . 538 to lead Cincinnati to a three-game sweep over Brooklyn May 5-7.

Phila RF Gavvy Cravath went 5-11, .456, with two HR, 4 RBIs and six runs as the Phils swept Cinc May 15-17.
Pittsburgh 1b Ed Konetchy was 9-7, .529 with a home run and 5 RBIs to lead the Bucs to a four-game sweep of Cincinnati June1-4.

Reds 1b Dick Hoblitzell went 8-15, . 533 with a pair of triples and 4 RBIs against St. Louis June 5-8, but the Cards won three of the four games.

Chicago's Vic Saier drove in all three Cub runs in a 3-0 shutout by Hippo Vaughn against Pitt on June 15.
Brooklyn 3b Red Smith was on fire for a five-game stretch June 18-23. In a four-game home series against Philadelphia June 18-21, Smith was $11-15$ as the Brooks split a four-game series with the Phils scoring four runs and driving in furns runs. In Pittsburgh, in his next game, Smith was 2-5 with 4 RBIs. For the five games, Smith
was 13-20, .650 with eight RBIs. All 13 hits in his hot streak were singles.

## Pitching Notes

Christy Mathewson's recorded 75-inning streak without issuing a BB from Apr 29-June 5


Giants great Christy Mathewson went 75 2/3 consecutive innings without giving up a BB over a 10-game span that stretched from Apr 29-June 5. During his remarkable run, Mathewson went 8-2 over the ten games, including the starting and final games of the streak.

After walking Boston's Rabbit Maranville with no out in the third inning of a 9-3 Giants win on April 29, Mathewson did not walk another batter in his next eight appearances, including seven starts and a relief outing. The amazing streak ended on June 5 in a 10-5 loss to Philadelphia, when Mathewson issued a free pass to with two outs in the third inning to Phillies leadoff man Hans Lobert.

Hippo Vaughn's August almost single-handedly kept Cubs hanging around in pennant chase
Hippo Vaughn had a remarkable run in August as the Cubs tried to battle their way through the front-runners. Vaughn was 6-2 for the month, throwing three shutouts.

The Cubs lefty threw back-to-back shutouts against St. Louis and Pittsburgh on Aug 4 and Aug 8 and then cruised to an easy 92 win over Boston on Aug 11. Vaughn then made it three shutouts in four games with a 5-0 whitewash of New York on Aug 14, allowing three hits and fanning 10 Giants, including six Ks in a row in the middle innings.

At one point, Vaughn threw $331 / 3$ consecutive innings without giving up a run. The streak started in the final four innings of a tough 2-1 loss at Cincinnati on July 29 and continued through the first six innings on of the win over Boston on August 11 when Vaughn gave up three straight singles in the seventh with Johnny Evers ending the streak with an RBI single.

Even in defeat, Vaughn pitched magnificently. His two setbacks were a 1-0 loss to the Giants, resulting from his own throwing error and a 5-3 loss to Brooklyn after throwing 13 innings of long relief, while giving up only two runs. For the month, Vaughn only allowed eight earned runs had an ERA of 0.96 .

Apr 15 After an off day, the Pirates lost to Cincinnati 7-5, with Erv Kantlehner giving up all seven runs early.
Apr 16 Babe Adams only allowed four hits to roll over Cincinnati 12-0.
Apr 17 Wilbur Cooper threw his second straight shutout, whitewashing Cincinnati 4-0, giving up six singles.
Individual notes
New York's Rube Marquard made three wild pitches as Brooklyn lost 9-5 to the Giants on Opening Day.
Boston's Lefty Tyler lost two straight games in a row, despite allowing only three hits in eight innings in each of the losses. In the opener of a Memorial Day doubleheader on May 31, Tyler lost 1-0 to Philadelphia's Joe Oeschger when Phillies 1b Fred Luderus homered for the game's only run. In his next start, only June 3, Tyler lost to New York's Rube Marquard in a 3-2 squeaker. Marquard scored two of New York's three runs, thanks to errors by Tyler and SS Rabbit Maranville.

Reds righthander Red Ames may have enjoyed the best day of any pitcher all season long on May 31 (Memorial Day) in an 8-1 win in the opener of a doubleheader against the Cubs. On the mound, Ames threw a complete game three-hitter Chicago, striking out nine and walking only two. At the plate, Ames was 4-4, with a solo HR and a pair of RBI singles, driving in three runs.

Pirate southpaw Wilbur Cooper lost a tough 3-1, decision to Cincinnati on June 19, allowing only seven hits. After giving up back-to-back singles to Buck Herzog and Bert Niehoff in the first, Cooper and Red Ames dueled for another 12 innings before Niehoff tripled home Herzog in the top of the 13th and then scored on an RBI single by Tommy Clarke. The loss was particularly painful for Cooper, who held Cincinnati hitless from the second through the $10^{\text {th }}$ inning, before Cincy 2 b Heinie Groh hit a run-scoring double to tie the game at two apiece after Pittsburgh had scored in the top of the $12^{\text {th }}$.

Brooklyn's Ed Reulbach just missed a no-hitter against Pittsburgh on June 23. Reulbach retired 23 batters in a row before Mike Mitchell singled with two out in the eighth. Reulbach finished with a two-hit 13-0 shutout.

Hard-luck Giants pitcher Jeff Tesreau threw three shutouts in an 11-day span from July 1-11, shutting out Cincinnati, Pittsburgh and St. Louis while dropping a 3-1 decision to the Pirates on July 4.

Phillies reliever Stan Baumgartner had a fantastic long relief win at Chicago on July 4. Baumgartner entered the game in the bottom of the $10^{\text {th }}$ and blanked Chicago for the next 14 innings, allowing only four hits. The Phils scored three runs the $25^{\text {th }}$ inning to win 5-2, earning Baumgartner his first win of the season.

Brooklyn ace Jeff Pfeffer beat Chicago 5-3 in a 21-inning marathon on Aug 20. Pfeffer gave up two runs in the first inning, but let a 3-2 lead get away in the ninth when he walked in the tying run to make it 3-3. Pfeffer then was at his best over the next 12 innings, allowing only one hit, dueling with Hippo Vaughn, on in long relief for Chicago. In the top of the 21st inning Dodgers 3b Dick Egan hit an RBI double and then scored on a Lew McCarty single to make it 5-3. Pfeffer struck out nine in the win.

Black and blue marks. Giant lefty Rube Marquard hit three Cincinnati batters (Dick Hoblitzell, Johnny Bates and Buck Herzog) in a 7-5 loss to Cincinnati on May 22. Cardinal Bill Doak hit three Giants batters (Red Murray, Chief Meyers and Art Fletcher) in a 3-1 win over NY on Aug. 28.

New York great Christy Mathewson uncharacteristically uncorked two wild pitches that scored two runs while throwing to Cub C Jimmy Archer in a 4-1 loss to Chicago in the first game of a Labor Day DH on Sept 3.

Pittsburgh's Wilbur Cooper recorded seven shutouts in the replay, twice throwing back-to-back shutouts. Cooper opened the season with a pair of shutouts, blanking St. Louis 1-0 in ten innings on Apr 12 and, five days later, shutting out Cincinnati 9-0. Later in the season, Cooper shut out the Phillies 7-0 on Aug 17 and, nine days later in his next start, shut out NY 7-0 on two hits.

Yingling lost nine in a row from May 17-July 3 before snapping the losing streak with a 2-1, five-hit victory on July 3, allowing no earned runs, in a determined start in the opener of a doubleheader. He won his next start, on July 11, against Philadelphia, but then reverted to form, losing six of his last seven decisions to finish with a dismal 4-18 record.

Reds righthander Phil Douglas suffered through a 13-game losing streak May 8-July 21. Four of his13 losses came in relief. Shufflin' Phil finally snapped the losing skein on July 24 with a four-hit, CG win over Boston.

## Phillies Alexander, Boston's Bill James only pitchers to defeat an opponent seven times

Boston needed to look no further than the Phillies combo of Grover Cleveland Alexander and Erskine Mayer to determine how they failed to win the pennant. Alexander was 7-0 against Boston and Mayer was 6-1 against the Braves. If Boston had won only three of the 13 games they lost to the Phillies duo, they would have tied for the NL pennant with Brooklyn.

Besides Alexander, Bill James was the only seven-game winner against a single team in 1914, winning seven of eight against the Cards. James also beat Chicago five times. Erskine's six wins against Boston made him the only six-game winner against another team

Brooklyn's Jeff Pfeffer was 5-0 against both Chicago and Cincinnati. Besides Pfeffer and Bill James, five-game winners v. single opponents were the Cardinals Bill Doak, who knocked off Brooklyn fives, Dick Rudolph, Boston (5-0 v. Cincinnati), and Hippo Vaughn, Chicago (5-1 v. Philadelphia).

## St. Louis 5, Brooklyn 0

## Cards Bill Doak no-hits first place Dodgers as St. Louis moves up to

The surging St. Louis Cardinals won their sixth game in a row, but the big story was a no-hit performance by Card righthander Bill Doak, who tossed the first no-hitter of the 1914 National League season.

Doak was in total command throughout the contest. He walked Dodger leadoff man Jack Dalton to start the game, but then put away the next 20 batters in a row before walking John Hummel in the seventh inning. Doak walked George Cutshaw to start the eighth, but got the next batter, Dick Egan, to hit into a double play. Doak then retired the final four batters in a row to complete his no-hitter, nailing Jake Daubert on a groundout to third base to finish his no-hit gem.
St. Louis jumped out to a one-run lead in the bottom of the first when 1 b Dots Miller singled home Lee Magee, aboard via an error. Two innings later, the Cardinals pushed over three more runs as Dots Miller got aboard on an error by Brooklyn C Otto Miller and the next four Cardinal batters all singled off Dodger starter Nap Rucker, plating three runs for a 4-0 St. Louis lead. The Cards scored their final run in the seventh on an RBI single by Zinn Beck, who wound up with three hits for St. Louis. LF Walton Cruise also had three hits for the Redbirds.


The win moved St. Louis (15-13) into a tied for second with Chicago, only one game behind the Dodgers (16-12). In his first four starts into the 1914 season, Doak is 4-0, has thrown four complete games, allowing only eight hits and two runs in 36 innings. His 1914 start is remarkable contrast to his performance in the 1913 NL replay, when he was only 2-8, 4.74 for the Cardinals, who finished in last place.

## Phillies score three in top of 25th to top Cubs in extra-inning classic

The struggling Philadelphia Phillies edged Chicago in a tense 25 -inning game, capped by an extraordinary 14 -inning long relief pitching performance by Phils reliever Stan Baumgartner.

The Cubs scored first, in the third inning, on an RBI single by Tommy Leach. The Phils tied the game in the fifth after Bill Killefer scored on an error by Cubs 3b Heinie Zimmerman, but the Cubs tallied in the bottom of the inning when Zimmerman singled home Vic Saier. Philly tied the game at two apiece in the sixth when Frank Lobert scored on an error by Cubs SS Red Corriden. With the game knotted at two each, Phillies starter Erskine Mayer and Cubs starter Larry Cheney each left the game after nine innings, both pulled for pinch hitters.

For the next 15 innings, neither team scored with the Cubs using Zip Zabel, newly-acquired Casey Hagemen, lefty George Pierce and Jimmy Lavender to keep the Phils offense in check.
 For Philadelphia, Ben Tincup pitched the $10^{\text {th }}$ and $11^{\text {th }}$ inning before giving way to lefty Stan Baumgartner. Baumgartner pitched masterfully, throwing the next 14 innings without giving up a run, giving up only four hits and three walks, to earn the victory.
In the top of the 25th, with Jimmy Lavender on in relief for Chicago, Dode Paskert led off with a double and scored on a triple by Beals Becker to put the Phillies ahead. Becker then scored on a single by cleanup hitter Frank Lobert, who promptly stole second and scored the Phils' third run of the inning on an RBI single by Fred Luderus, off Bert Humphries, who relieved Lavender, giving Philly a 5-2 lead.

Baumgartner blanked the Cubs in the bottom of the $25^{\text {th }}$ to finish the game and earn his first win of the season. Cubs 3 b Heinie Zimmerman had five hits in the game, but also committed three errors, none of which figured in the scoring. Beals Becker had four hits for Philadelphia. The last-place Phillies improved to $34-45$ while the slumping sixth-place Cubs lost their third straight game and dropped to 36-43.

## Pittsburgh 1, St. Louis 0 (17 innings)

## Doak throws 15 innings of no-hit baseball, only to lose to Pirates in marathon game

PIttsburgh won a remarkable 1-0, 17-inning classic that featured a memorable performance by Cardinals ace Bill Doak, as well as brilliant pitching by Bucs starter George McQuillan.

The game was a scoreless affair for 16 innings until Pittsburgh's Ed Konetchy doubled home Jim Viox in the bottom of the $17^{\text {th }}$, handing Doak a heartbreaking loss after an extraordinary outing.


Doak carried a no-hitter through 15 innings before Pirate LF Max Carey broke it up with a leadoff single in the $16^{\text {th }}$ inning. While not as remarkable as Doak's no-hit pitching, Pirate starter George McQuillan was equally effective, allowing only seven hits - and no runs - over the first 16 innings. After his single, Carey stole second but was stranded when Doak retired the final two batters in the $16^{\text {th }}$, including Jim Kelly, who pinch-hit for McQuillan.

In the top of the $17^{\text {th }}, \mathrm{Al}$ Mamaux took over for Pittsburgh and retired the Cards without a run. Doak walked leadoff man Jim Viox to start the bottom of the 17th and, two batters later, walked Joe Kelly to move Viox to second. After Doak retired Honus Wagner on a pop fly for the second out, Ed Konetchy scorched a double to score Viox and give the Pirates a hard-fought win.

Doak's performance was even more impressive than a 5-0 no-hitter he threw against
Brooklyn on May 12. He struck out 10 batters and walking five over 16-plus innings. McQuillan also fanned 10 batters, walking only three.

The win snapped a three-game losing streak for Pittsburgh (54-46), and tied the Pirates with NY for second place, only one game behind first-place Brooklyn. Slumping St. Louis (53-47) suffered their eighth loss in their last 11 games, dropping them two games behind the Dodgers

## Cincinnati 12, Philadelphia 6

Tail-enders combine for 10 stolen bases; Reds lose two to injuries in wild offensive battle

Cellar-dwelling Cincinnati erupted for seven runs in the fifth inning to bury seventh-place Philadelphia 12-6 in an offensive battle that featured wild base-stealing antics and bizarre finish.

The Reds opened the scoring in the second when Fritz von Kolnitz singled and moved to third on a double by Bert Daniels. With Mike Gonzalez at the plate, von Kolnitz scored on a straight steal of home and Daniels stole third and then scored when Gonzalez singled. The Phils countered with a steal of home of their own in the bottom of the second when Gavvy Cravath, the most unlikely of base-stealers stole home on the front end of a triple steal with Dode Paskert and Jack Martin also moving up, with Martin later scoring after Paskert was caught trying to make it two steals of home in one inning.

The Reds built up a 4-2 lead after four innings and then exploded for seven runs in the fifth, six of
 them off Phils starter Eppa Rixey, who left after giving up a total of 10 runs, all earned.

Down 12-2, the Phillies added four more runs on a two-run HR by Sherry Magee and a two-run single by Hans Loberts, but it was too little, too late, as Cincinnati went on to win 12-6. The win was a costly victory for the Reds, however, with LF George Twombly and backup SS Marty Breghammer colliding in the $8^{\text {th }}$ inning and both out until mid-September.

Cincinnati's Rube Benton went the distance for the Reds, evening his record at 14-4. Rixey, who absorbed the majority of the punishment from Cincinnati, took the loss to fall to 2-7.

Combined, both teams stole a combined 10 bases, seven by Cincinnati. Both teams also had two runners caught stealing.

Cincinnati (54-73) snapped a three-game losing streak while the Phils (57-70) lost their $11^{\text {th }}$ game in the last fourteen contests.

Phils ace Grover Cleveland Alexander snapped a two-game losing streak in grand fashion, no-hitting Chicago 2-0, walking only two, to win his $22^{\text {nd }}$ game of the season. Alexander outpitched Chicago's Hippo Vaughn.
Alexander's no-hitter was the second no-hit game in the NL in the 1914 season. Bill Doak of St. Louis earlier no-hit Brooklyn on May 12.

After both teams were scoreless over the first three innings, the Phils pushed over two runs in the fourth off Vaughn on an RBI triple by Gavvy Cravath, followed by an RBI single by Beals Becker, scoring Cravath.

The two runs were all Alexander needed, striking out seven Cubs and walking only two

## Bill Doak pitches keeps Cards close to first-place Brooklyn with hard-fought 1-0, 15-inning classic

Bill Doak won his sixth straight game since Aug 19, outpitching Pittsburgh's Babe Adams to win a 1-0 decision over the contending Pirates.

Coming off a 17 -inning 5-4 win in his previous start, against Brooklyn, on Sept 10, Doak showed no signs of fatigue, allowing only five hits to the punchless Bucs, while walking four. Pirates veteran Babe Adams, meanwhile, struggled to the get ball over the plate, walking 11 batters. St. Louis, however, could not capitalize on the multitude of baserunners until the $15^{\text {th }}$, leaving 16 men on base.

The Cardinals won the game in the bottom of the $15^{\text {th }}$ when Owen Wilson lead off with a single and went to second on an error by Pirate CF Zip Collins. After Ivy Wingo sacrificed Wilson to third, light-hitting Art Butler, a former Pirate, singled Wilson home for the only run of the ball game.

The win was the Cards (77-67) eighth in their last nine games and kept the Redbirds within two games of Brooklyn (79-65), who defeated the Giants 6-1. The loss pushed Pittsburgh (76-68) into third place, tied with Boston, three games out

## Brooklyn 4, Philadelphia 3 (10 innings)

## Stengel's HR in 10th gives one-game lead over Cards with one game left in the season



Brooklyn's Casey Stengel hit a dramatic game-winning $10^{\text {th }}$ inning home run to lift the Dodgers to a 4-3 win over Philadelphia. The Dodger victory combined with a 2-1 Cardinal loss to Chicago, moved the Dodgers into a one-game lead in the National League, with only one game left in the season.

The Phillies and Dodgers both scored in the first. Brooklyn moved in front 2-1 in the fifth on an RBI single by Stengel, but the Phils squeezed home a tying run in the sixth. The Brooks regained the lead 3-2 in the eight on a Guz Getz RBI single, but the Phils tied the game in the top of the ninth on a Hans Lobert sac fly that scored pinch-runner Milt Reed, who had moved to third on a stolen base and passed ball.

Dodger starter Pat Ragan retired the Phils in the top of the $10^{\text {th }}$. In the bottom of the frame, Stengel, leading off the inning, hit a dramatic home run off reliever Ben Tincup to win the game for Brooklyn.
Pat Ragan (14-14) was the winning pitcher for Brooklyn, holding the Phils to seven scattered singles and a double by Hans Lobert to lead off the game. Twenty-one game winner Erskine Mayer went nine innings for Philadelphia, but was pulled for pinch-hitter Ed Burns in the ninth. Ben Tincup (8-13), who gave up Stengel's HR, took the loss.

Stengel's HR gave Brooklyn (85-68) a one-game edge over St. Louis (84-69) as the season enters its final day. A Brooklyn win or St. Louis loss would clinch the pennant for the Dodgers.
