## Introduction

THe 1915 Federal League replay completed my replay of the two seasons during which the Federal League existed. In 2019, I replayed the 1914 Federal League season, which was won by the Baltimore Terrapins, who upset the Indianapolis Hoosiers, the winners of the 1914 Fed title in real life. The 1915 replay was won by Chicago, real-life winners by an eyelash in 1915.

I was eager to replay the 1915 Federal League season because it resulted in one of the closest pennant races in Major League history, with the Chicago Whales winning by percentage points over the St. Louis Terriers with the Pittsburgh Rebels, only a half-game behind. Adding to the drama: none of the three top teams had finished their 154-game schedule, leaving unanswered the question "Who would have won had the three top finishers completed their 154-game schedule?"

The 1915 winner produced the same winner as real life, the Chicago Whales, but the logjam at the top of the standings that characterized the real-life pennant race never materialized. The pennant race in the replay, instead, turned into a two-team battle between the Whales and the Newark Pepper (formerly the Indianapolis Hoosiers, who were moved to Newark for the 1915 season).

Newark led the pennant race for most of the season and entered September leading Chicago by three games and St. Louis by five games. With the pennant seemingly well within their grasp, the Pepper promptly fell apart in early September, losing nine of 12. The Whales, meanwhile, caught fire and tied Newark for first place on Sept. 5. By Sept. 14, Chicago had built up a four-game lead that was enough to enable them to hold off the Pepper for the rest of the season.

Newark's collapse marked the second straight replay that the Pepper franchise let the pennant slip away. In the 1914 replay, as the Indianapolis Hoosiers, the Pepper led the Fed through July, only to see the Baltimore Terrapins pass them in mid-August and hang on to win the 1914 pennant by six games over the Pepper.

## Preparation for the replay required a month

I spent a great deal of time preparing the 1915 replay, which allowed me to play it in relatively short amount of time.
For my second straight replay, using baseball-reference.com as my primary information source, I entered, in pencil, the actual starting lineups and pitching rotations for each game for the entire Federal League season, a process that took about a week, but enable me to move quickly from series to series, stopping only to record individual results and keep the standings updated.

Baseball-Reference.com was the primary source relied upon for specific information on trades and player transactions (trades, dates at which a player became activated or de-activated), which was employed at appropriate "dates" (defined by the game number in the schedule) within the replay.

Like all my other replays, the replay results changed from real life as injuries occurred. Overall player usage was relatively accurate in terms of how players were used and how often they were used. Some low-rated pitchers, for example, appeared in a few more games than real-life in order to accommodate blowout games and a handful of starting pitchers made one more appearance than real life in order to fill out the 154-games in the schedule. None of these variations, however, made any significant impact on the final results of the replay.

The 1915 replay got underway at 8:49 a.m., Tuesday, March 9, 2021, a pleasant weather day in the mid-‘50s, with my spouse Carole, once again assuming her role as Inaugural Dice-Roller. The replay concluded, on Tuesday, September 21, 2021, at 8:43 p.m.

The replay required 197 days (six months and five days) to complete, slightly longer than some of my previous replays, owing to the fact that, after 21 years in our previous residence in Winter Park, FL, we moved into a new residence five miles away, in Orlando that demanded a considerable amount of work and attention.

## 1914 FL replay background and guidelines

- The 1915 Federal League replay launched my fifth complete season of year-by-year replays from the Deadball Era starting with 1911. Remaining to be completed: the 1915 AL and NL seasons.
- The MG symbols governed the use of players, per APBA Master Game rules. The 1915 Fed League MG symbols used splits from both sides of the plate, plus $Q$ factors, which added to the realism of the replay.
- Using Steve's Computer Card, I created a number of XC cards to complement some of the rosters. These cards reflected the stats for players who saw minimal playing time. Their performance was reasonably realistic and their performance did not have any significant influence on the final results of the replay
- I utilized APBA's League Error factor, which was +3 for the 1915 season. The Error Factor significantly increased the number of errors in the replay.
- The replay was played from the 2020 version of Master Game boards. Other than the use of the Error Randomizer and a pickoff rule modification, games were played solely within APBA rules.

The Error Randomizer I employed was originally created by OAPBA league manager Dave Larson, a longtime stalwart in my face-to-face league (OAPBA). The Error Randomizer helped to reflect OF errors and increased the number of fielding opportunities for infield play and catchers.

The pickoff rule employed served to reduce the abnormal number of pickoffs that occur within the regular APBA boards. Pitchers and catchers with higher defensive ratings were more likely to pick off runners while lower-graded pitchers and catchers were less likely to record pickoffs. The rule modification worked extremely well.

- I used a 154-game schedule developed from a numerical head-to-head formula as the foundation. The playing schedule was of my own making, for purposes of accurately maintaining the daily standings in a manageable an organized manner. The schedule spanned "schedule dates" from April 11 through September 26. Off days were built into the schedule, as were three double-headers conducted on specific holidays (Memorial Day, July 4 and Labor Day).

To speed the replay along, all teams initially played one another in home-and-away three-game series, followed by two separate rounds of home-and-away four-game series. I incorporated the rhythmic East and West road trips into the schedule, which gave the schedule more realistic feel.

- Trades, roster changes and player debuts were conducted on the same or approximate team game number (not date) as real life, which enabled them to be inserted or deleted at the same time frame as real life. The information was obtained via the transactions listed on Baseball-Reference.com and related Web searches.
- To the extent possible, position players were limited to their real-life games played and total plate appearances and at bats, using a combination of all three defining factors to prevent overusage. Overall, the governing guideline for player usage was common sense.

Rather than rely on at-bats as the primary governing benchmark for regulating overuse of position players, I relied on total plate appearances. Further, to help in governing player usage, I utilized the actual batting orders in the order of games played, available through BaseballReference.com. This proved to be a real boon in terms of managing player usage. There were, of course, some minor discrepancies caused by injuries. All in all, the combination of plate appearances, actual batting orders and movement of players on or about transaction dates served to provide a very realistic presentation for each team.

Starting pitchers were utilized on the game numbers as real life starts and restricted to the same number of starts as real life (with a couple of minor exceptions, which moved a starting pitcher's start up or down in the schedule) to accommodate the actual playing dates. Relief appearances were used with the same frequency as real life, differing if there were blowouts or extra-inning games) that required extended use of pitchers.

## Personal notes

The replay started in Year Two (2021) of the COVID pandemic, which meant spending plenty of time at home and provided plenty of time to roll the dice and play the games.

The biggest impact affecting the preparation and conduct of the replay was the January 15, 2021 sale of our previous residence in Winter Park. After living in Air BnBs and a Comfort Inn for five weeks, we were able to move into our new residence in Orlando on February 26, 2021. During this disruptive period, I utilized the time to prepare the replay (individual stat sheets for players, prepare the schedule and related pre-replay administrative chores)

Getting settled into the new house in Orlando required another couple of weeks, but I was able to start the replay on March 9. Finding time to play the games, however, proved demanding, particularly the time required to clearing out what amounted to a jungle in our new back yard. We inherited the "jungle" from the previous homeowners, who apparently had not taken care of the back yard in a couple of years.

For the second year in a row, our annual RydMe Cup golf outing, played with former colleagues from Disney and Anheuser Busch, was canceled
 because of the pandemic.


Granddaughter Kate (second from left, with the big smile) celebrated her $13^{\text {th }}$ birthday. In the summer, she spent two weeks at Camp Kulakua, near Gainesville, and in September, 2021, entered eighth grade at Lake Highland Prep. Kate reached her mother's height, developed into an enthusiastic and skilled writer, and showed a flair for learning Spanish and achieving high math grades, which was surprising as she constantly says she dislikes math. She also was active in her water polo team at Lake Highland.

Golf was one of the few activities that I was able to continue outside the house during the pandemic. I was able to return to golf just before the start of summer, after rehab helped me overcome a partially torn Achilles tendon my left ankle.

My golf handicap dropped from a 25 to 22, despite ongoing shoulder problems. By lowering my hands, I was able to take larger turn, allowing to add about 20 yards to my drives, without losing any accuracy (in fact, I was more accurate, hitting about nine or 10 fairways each round). My short game continued to be my lone enduring strength on the golf course. Highlight of the year was an 89 at the challenging Pine Barrens course at World Woods, Brooksville, Florida, listed by Golf Digest as one of the 100
 public courses in the U.S.

Both my spouse, Carole, and I received vaccinations for COVID and remained in generally good health, although Carole experienced some manageable heart challenges and a painful foot injury and, just prior to the start of the replay, I had to undergo a demanding rehab program to strengthen my ankle from a partially torn Achilles tendon, avoiding surgery.

## 1915 Federal League pennant race

 Chicago's September run, Newark slump, earns Whales the 1915 pennantThe Chicago Whales and Newark Pepper locked horns in a competitive two-team battle in the 1915 Federal League replay. On the outside looking in were the St. Louis Terriers, who hovered on the edge of the two-team race, but never quite able to get fully into the mix with Chicago and Newark, finishings six games behind.

The remaining five teams were also-rans, all of whom were out of contention by Memorial Day. Pittsburgh, who was one of the three real-life contenders, finished a disappointing fourth and failed to reach the .500 mark at 76-78, just ahead of the Kansas City Packers. Brooklyn and Buffalo battled all season long for sixth place, with Brooklyn finishing in sixth. The 1914 replay defending champion Terrapins suffered a total regression, falling from first to last place, losing their $100^{\text {th }}$ game on the final day of the season to finish 54100.

After five different teams led the league in the early going in April, Chicago took the Fed lead on April 29 and remained there by themselves until the Peppers caught them on June 26.

After battling back and forth for two weeks, Newark pulled ahead of Chicago on July 11 and remained on top until just after Labor Day, Sept. 5, when the Pepper lost seven of their next nine games as their lead slipped away.

Chicago took over sole possession of first on Sept. 8 and, one week later, built up a four-game lead by Sept 14. The Whales, however, almost let it get away, losing five in a row, while the Pepper won their next four straight and pulled to within one game of the lead on Sept. 20.

With a chance to move into a tie for the lead with five games left, the Pepper lost their next game, a tough 2-1, 10-inning decision to Buffalo's Hugh Bedient, dropping them two games behind Chicago, who beat Pittsburgh 5-2 behind their ace, George McConnell.

The extra-inning loss to Buffalo seemed to take something out of Newark, who next traveled to metro rival Brooklyn for their final four games of the season. On Sept. 23, The Pepper overcame a 5-2 deficit to tie the game in the eighth, only to lose to the Tips 6-5. Chicago, meanwhile, hammered the Terriers 11-6, clinching at least a tie for the pennant.

The next day, Brooklyn's Happy Finneran shut out Newark 2-1 on five hits, while Chicago lost to St. Louis lefty Eddie Plank 3-1. The Chicago loss didn't matter, however, as their three-game lead with two games to go clinched the pennant for the Whales.

## Five different teams take turns atop the standings in April

No clear leader emerged in the first month of the season, with Newark, Pittsburgh, Brooklyn, St. Louis, and Chicago all leading the lead at different points during the early going. Newark won eight of ten from April 18-20 while Chicago reeled off eight wins in a row before St. Louis ace Dave Davenport edged George McConnell 1-0 on the final day of the month.

On April 30, Chicago (12-6) led Newark and Pittsburgh (both 11-7) by one game.


## May and June: Whales ride atop the standings for 57 days, but Newark catches Whales at end of June

Chicago continued in front by themselves from May 1-June 26, when Newark finally ran them down and tied the Whales for the lead, where both teams remained tied for the next two days.

On June 29, Buffalo's Al Schulz edged Chicago's Three-Finger Brown 2-1 in 10 innings while Newark knuckleballer Chick Brandom, with a save from Ed Reulbach, beat Pittsburgh's Clint Rogge 2-1 to lift the Pepper into sole possession of first place.

On June 30, Newark (45-29) lead Chicago (44-30) by one game and St. Louis (42-32) by three games.

## July and August: Pepper rules the roost; Chicago and St. Louis remain in the pennant picture

The Pepper stayed in first place for the entirely of July ang August, while Chicago and St. Louis jockeyed for second place .
At one point, on August 5, Newark built up a lead that looked like it couldn't lose, leading St. Louis by seven games and Chicago by eight games. As August wore on, however, the Terriers and Chicago crept ever close to Newark.

On Aug. 26, Chicago ran down St. Louis and moved into second place, three games behind the Pepper, which is where the standings stood on the final day of the month.

The leaderboard, however, was about to undergo a significant change.

## September: Chicago chases down Newark, clinches pennant with two games to go

September began on a positive note for the Pepper as Vic Mosely threw a two-hitter to stifle Pittsburgh's Rebels, keeping the Pepper three games in front of Chicago.

The Rebels, however, stopped Newark in their tracks on Sept. 2, with an 11-4 win over the Pepper, and then followed with a sweep of the Pepper on their Labor Day doubleheader by scores of 4-1 and 11-4. Chicago, after losing to Buffalo's Al Schulz 4-2, swept the Blues in their Labor Day twin bill, pulling them to within one game of Newark.

In just four days, Newark's lead had shrunk from three games to one game over Chicago.
Hosting St. Louis, the Pepper saw their losing streak reach five in a row, dropping the first two games of their four-game series with the Terriers 3-2 to Dave Davenport and 3-2 to Eddie Plank. Chicago, meanwhile, split the first two games of their series at Brooklyn, enabling them to move into a tie with Newark on Sept. 5, both teams with $84-52$ records.

Both teams won their next two games and on September 7 still had identical 86-52 records with Chicago headed into Newark's Harrison Field for a four-game series.

Chicago then served up the knockout blow, sweeping the Pepper in their four-game serieswinning their next seven in a row while Newark, after a pair of wins to close out the St. Louis series, lost their next four straight before Earl Mosely stop the bleeding with a 1-0 two-hit shutout of last place Baltimore.

By Sept. 11, Newark had fallen four games behind Chicago. But the race was not yet over.
The Pepper won their final three games of the Baltimore series while Chicago split four games with Kansas City, but still able to hold onto their three-game lead on Sept. 17. Chicago then split a four-game series with Pittsburgh, while Newark took three of four from Buffalo, to pull within two games of the Whales with four games to go.

The Pepper, however, couldn't keep it going, losing their first two games of their final series, at Brooklyn, while Chicago split a pair of games with St. Louis. With a three-game lead on Sept. 24, the Whales clinched the pennant with two games left, even though they lost to the Terriers 8-3 in the clinching game.

For the Pepper, who played as the Indianapolis Hoosiers the previous season, it was a bitter loss and a haunting repeat of their missed opportunity in the 1914 Federal League replay. Chicago simply outplayed the Pepper when it counted most, going 36-16, .692 over the final two months of the season while Newark, who held the lead going into September stumbled down the stretch, going 10-14 in the season's final month.


## Team by team recap

## First place: Chicago Whales, 95-59, .617, + 3 games



The Whales won the pennant with an impressive stretch run, going 15-9 in the season's final month to catch and pass Newark in the first week of September. Before their September run, the Whales resided on top of the Fed from April 29, ceding the lead to Newark on June 29 and then falling into third place, behind St. Louis from July 23-Aug 24. After tying with the Terriers for second place on Aug. 24, the Whales went 17-11 the rest of the season, which was enough to lift them past Newark and win the pennant, three games ahead of their New York area rivals.

Chicago had one of the league's most powerful offenses, slamming 81 home runs, tops in the Fed, while scoring 643 runs, second in the league. They also worked opposition pitchers for a league-leading 491 BB. The Whales offense totaled ten or more runs in 15 games, tops in the league. In comparison, Whales pitching staff only allowed 10 or more runs in four games.

The Whales offensive driving force for the Whales was 1915 Federal League MVP CF Dutch Zwilling, 290, .368, tied for league lead with 21 HR, led league with 106 RBIs while drawing 74 BB. The catching duo of Art Wilson (.348, .456, 15 HR) and William Fischer (.317, .36x 5 HR) combined to hit .331, hit 22 home runs and drove in 99 runs. LF Les Mann (.284, .357), who jumped to the Whales from the Boston Braves, ranked tenth in the league in batting while RF Max Flack hit a solid .274 and scored 89 runs. 3b Harry Fritz, limited by injuries, hit .275 with seven homers in 90 games.

The Whales pitching ranked third in the league with a 2.77 ERA, led by Cy Young award winner George McConnell (26-8, 1.90) and Claude Hendrix (20-11, 3.43). Mike Prendergast (17-11) and Mordecai Brown (16-13) rounded out the starting quartet while spot starter/reliever Ad Brennan surprised with a 10-3 record and notched two saves.

Chicago had the best defense in the Fed, committing 165 errors, the fewest in the league.

## Second place: Newark Pepper, 93-61, .604, - 2 games

The Pepper had high hopes for the pennant in 1915 and came within three weeks of capturing the title.
After staying close to the Whales over the first half of the season, Newark took over first place on July 11 and remained there until September, when they lost 12 of 16 from Sept. 1-17 to fall three games behind Chicago. Although they closed the gap to a single game on Sept. 20, after winning four in a row, the Pepper lost four of their last five games, including three of four at Brooklyn in their final series against to finish two games behind Chicago at season's end.

Newark's pitching was the strength of the team. Their 2.42 ERA was the lowest in the Federal League and Pepper pitchers surrendered the fewest hits in the league $(1,071)$ and fewest earned runs $(375)$.

The Peppers were led by Ed Reulbach (21-9, 1.32) and Earl Moseley (21-10, 1.85) who threw seven shutouts, including a pair of nohitters against pennant-winning Chicago. George Kaiserling (19-9, 2.33) just missed the 20-win circle. Harry Moran (15-6, 2.05) won 13 of his first 14 decisions, but fell apart down the stretch, losing his last four decisions in a row, all in September. Cy
Falkenberg, one of the Pepper's aces in 1914, slumped to 9-10, 3.17 and was dealt to Brooklyn late in the season.

Newark lost their leading hitter, Benny Kauff, who was transferred by the Federal League to the Brooklyn franchise before the 1915 season as repayment of the outgoing Indianapolis owner's old debts. Even without Kauff, the Pepper ranked second in the league in batting (.249), but it was a hollow number because the Peps lacked a hard-hitting slugger in the middle of their lineup and hit only 26 home runs, dead last in the league. . The two most productive batters were CF Edd Roush (.278, 64 RBIs, 27 SB) and LF Al Scheer (.270, 31 doubles, team-best 76 RBIs, 22 SB). C Bill Rariden ( $.260, .350$ OBP) ranked tenth in the league in OBP, accumulating 64 BB. Leadoff man RF Vin Campbell (.302) ranked fourth in the league in batting, but only had 29 extra base hit and 43 RBIs


## Third place: St. Louis Terriers, 89-65, .578, -7 games

St. Louis played solid, winning baseball all season long and had a great shot at the pennant when September began, only five games out of first. The Terriers offense, however, went to sleep from Sept. 2-16, scoring only 18 runs as the team lost 13 of 15 games, dropping them nine games out of the lead. During their 15-game swoon, the Terriers hit only .220 and left an astounding 103 runners on base. St. Louis turned it around in their final eight games, going 7-1, including three wins over Chicago, but it was too little, too late, finishing five games out of first.

St. Louis depended on a Big Three comprised of durable righthander Dave Davenport (27-14, 1.95, league-leading 364 IP and 27 CG), former A's ace Eddie Plank (20-11, 1.34), and one-time NY Giant Doc Crandall (20-16, 2.59, with four saves). Bob Groom was 15-9 (2.97), but let several games slip away in the second half of the season and was ineffective in relief appearances.

1b Babe Borton (.279, . 382 OBP, 69 RBIs) and LF Ward Miller (.303, . 357 OBP, league-leading 58 SB) were the core of an inconsistent Terriers offense, at best, as indicated by their 18 shutout losses, the most in the league. 2b Bobby Vaughn hit.259, but was only 13-16 in stealing attempts. SS Ernie Johnson drove in 60 runs, second highest on the team, but hit only .203 and committed 40 errors, tied with KC's Johnny Rawlings for the most in the league.

Despite Johnson's struggles at SS, the Terriers total of 173 errors was second-fewest in the league.

## Fourth place: Pittsburgh Rebels, 76-78,-20 games

The Rebels (sometimes call the Stogies...the nicknames are somewhat inconsistent) were the biggest disappointment in the replay, spending most of the season in the second division. They were never a factor in the pennant chase. They got off to a decent start but fell to 18-18 on May 21 and never got back to .500 for the rest of the season. Entering September, Pittsburgh was in fifth place, two games behind Kansas City. The Rebels then caught fire and went 16-8 for the final month to pass the Packers and move into fourth place, where they finished 76-78, a distant 20 games behind the pennant-winning Whales.


Leading the Pittsburgh offense was 1b Ed Konetchy, who hit . 280 and totaled 58 extra-base hits, including 11 home runs, while driving in 102 runs, third in the league. 2b Steve Yerkes, who played for the Red Sox on their 1912 championship team, hit .290 with 54 RBIs and RF Jim Kelly hit a solid .283 with 17 triples. 3b Mike Mowrey drove in 73 runs and team manager and CF Rebel Oakes hit 258 with 72 RBIs. Pinch-hitter Ed Lennox was outstanding as a pinch-hitter, hitting . 288 with seven extra-base hits, eight RBIs and six BB.

The Stogies pitching staff was inconsistent all season long, until September, when the Rebs were a league-best 16-8 for the final month. Clint Rogge won his final nine starts from Aug. 16 through the end of the season to finish 18-11. Elmer Knetzer won six of eight in September to conclude at 17-11. Lefty Frank Allen struggled at times and wound up with a 17-18 record. Cy Barger (9-10) and Bunny Hearn (5-12) were generally ineffective as spot starters and relievers. The pitching staff only gave up ten or more runs in three games all season long.

## Fifth place: Kansas City Packers, 72-82, .468, -23 games

The Packers spent the majority of the 1915 season in the middle of the standings. After a slow start, the Pack moved into fourth place on July 3 and, four days later, hit their peak for the season, getting to .500 (41-41), but then falling back below .500 . Kansas City was able to hold on to their first division position through Sept. 10, but lost eight of their last 12 games, enabling Pittsburgh to catch and pass them and drop the Packers into fifth place at 72-82 for the season.

The KC pitching staff, like the rest of the league, relied on their pitching to carry them. Lefty Nick Cullop was 19-12, 2.04, and had a spectacular run from July 26-Aug. 25, winning six in a row, four by shutouts and finishing with a 7-1, one-hit win over Baltimore. Alas, Cullop lost four of his final six decisions, including his last two starts, just missing the 20-win circle. Lefty Gene Packard was 16-16, with a seven-game win streak from May-June 4. Chief Johnson, expected to be the ace of the pitching staff, fell off to 15-18, frequently victimized by lack of offense. Righthander Alex Main (1214, 3.22) was inconsistent and Pete Henning, who started and relieved, was 6-16, 3.41.

Offensively, Duke Kenworthy was the Packers best hitter for the second straight season, hitting 285, but was frequently in and out of the lineup with injuries. 3b George Perring (.242) let the
 Pack with 64 RBIs and 60 BB while LF Al Shaw (.254) hit nine homers and drove in 58 runs.

On defense, the Packers were shaky. SS Johnny Rawlings committed 40 errors and Kenworthy and C Drummond Brown both committed more than 20 miscues. As a team, KC committed 206 errors, only three less than last-place Baltimore, who had a leagueworst 209 errors. Their pitching, which was better than the three bottom teams in the league, was frequently able to overcome the poor glovework and enable them to make a run at the first division, even though they fell short.

## Sixth place: Brookyn Tip-Tops, 71-83, .461, -24 games

Despite their sixth-place finish, the Tips were one of the most entertaining teams in the replay, with an offense that could erupt and any time, but also could stay dormant for long stretches. The Tip-Tops played over .500 baseball through the middle of May, but fell back to sixth place on May 13 and, after falling into seventh place in late May for a couple of days, settled into sixth place for the remainder of the campaign.
The Brooklyn offense could explode in streaks and led the league with a .261 batting average and .326 team OBP. On April 17, the Tips annihilated Newark 23-6 and, the next day, obliterated Baltimore 19-4. Later in the month, Brooklyn again overwhelmed the Terps by
a 19-3 score. As May wound down, the Tips blasted Buffalo in back-to-back blowouts by scores of 12-5 and 16-1. In June, they again victimized the hapless Terrapins three more times by scores of 15-11, 12-0 (11 innings) and 10-3. For the season, the Tips scored 10 or more runs in fourteen games.

While Brooklyn easily put up plenty of runs, their offense just as easily disappeared. In mid-July, the Tips lost 11 of 13, scoring only 17 runs in the thirteen games, including back-to-back shutouts June 23-24 at the hands of the Terriers Eddie Plank and Doc Crandall. In August, Brooklyn hit an almost identical slump, dropping 11 of 14 games, three of the losses via shutout and scoring one run in two other losses.

The Tips finished strong, sweeping the last-place Terrapins in four games and then serving as spoilers, taking three of four from Newark in their final series of the year to end any hopes the Pepper had of catching Chicago.

Steve Evans enjoyed a terrific half-season with the Tips, hitting .376 and driving in 58 runs before being dealt Baltimore in mid-season. Evans, before being traded and was still with the Pepper, provided a solid one-two batting punch with the Federal League's premier hitter, Benny Kauff, who was runner-up to Evans in the batting race, hitting. 323, but never really coming very close to defending his 1914 replay batting title. Kauff drove in 92 runs, fifth in the league, was runner-up to Evans
 with a . 432 OBP, and stole 57 bases, second only to Chicago's Ward Miller.

LF Claude Cooper was fifth in the league in batting at .300, . 378 OBP, with six home runs and 76 RBIs. 1 b Hap Myers hit .298, but only played two-thirds of the season, driving home 43 runs and had 36 SB. Manager-2b Lee Magee had a strong second half and hit. 289. 3b Al Halt drove in 72 runs, but struck out 104 times, tops in the FL, while SS Fred Smith, acquired in mid-season from Buffalo, hit six home runs and drove in 57 runs.

The Tips were handicapped by a poor defense, committing 192 errors, third-most in the league. Brooklyn's pitchers suffered 145 unearned runs, only 12 less than last-place Baltimore. The Tip-Top's benchmark moment for defensive misplay occurred on June 20, when Brooklyn committed nine errors in 10-2 loss at Newark.

## Seventh place: Buffalo Blues , 65-89, . 422-31 games

The Buffeds, indeed, had the blues throughout the 1915 replay. They started off to a terrible start and settled into the cellar on May 5, where they resided until July 4, when they passed rapidly sinking Baltimore, settling in to seventh place, where they finished the rest of season. The Blues high point of the season came at the end of June, when the Blues swept the Chicago Whales, at Weeghman Park (Wrigley Field) and then won their first two games in July , at Kansas City, completing a six-game win streak.

Buffalo's offense was the worst in the Fed, suffering 16 shutout losses, tied with Kansas City for the second-most in the league. The team was dead last in the league in runs scored .521, batting average (.223), OBP (.283), and slugging (.303). Their only genuine threats was 1b Hal Chase, who led the Fed in home runs (21) and drove in 98 runs while hitting a respectable .283. OF Jack Dalton hit. 280 and had a team-best .358 OBP, but had only 15 extra-base hits. Manager Baldy Louden hit . 263 and 53 RBIs and CF Clyde Engle drove in 62 runs.

Workhorse Al Schulz (20-17, 2.26) was second in the league in innings pitched (331) and threw five shutouts. Schulz won five straight games from Aug. 18-Sept 2, but after losing his next two starts, notched his $20^{\text {th }}$ win on Sept 17 over Brooklyn 7-3. Righthander Fred Anderson (16-11, 2.13) also recorded five shutouts, including a 6-0 one-hitter over Baltimore on the last day of the season. Veteran Hugh Bedient was 13-16, 2.67. and former Cleveland Indian Gene Krapp (9-23, 4.38) lost seven of his eight final decisions and led the league in losses

## Baltimore Terrapins, 55-99, .357, -40 games



The Terps fell from the top spot in the league into the cellar. Despite their last place performance, the replay team overperformed in comparison with their real-life counterpart, who were 47-107, and were not a team to be taken lightly, primarily because of their offensive, which produced 580 runs and led the league with 212 doubles. The pitching, however, was the league's worst, by far, with a 4.58 ERA, high for any era and stratospheric for the standards of the Deadball Era.

The Terrapins started surprisingly strong and were in fourth place with a 22-26 record on June 2, but then lost 11 in a row, dumping them into the cellar. In July, Baltimore lost seven in a row from July 2-7 and, after sweeping Chicago at home in their next four games, lost eight in a row. In August, the Terps suffered a nine-game losing streak and, in the final month of the season, they went through a stretch losing 12 of 13 . From June 3-Sept 26, the team played at a 305 clip.

The two bright spots for Baltimore were Steve Evans (.332, 46 RBIs with the Terrapins in 87 games), acquired from Brooklyn in mid-season, and former New York Highlander Guy Zinn (.312),
who led the team with 57 runs batted in in 106 games. Versatile Vern Duncan hit. 280 and 3b Jimmy Walsh hit six homers and drove in 50 runs before being traded to St . Louis in mid-season.

Baltimore's pitching was their undoing. The Terrapins pitchers led the league in hits allowed, total runs surrendered (854, more than 160 more Brooklyn, who was seventh with 681 runs allowed. The lone bright spot in the Terps pitching was the 1914 replay Cy Young winner Jack Quinn, who somehow managed to post a 18-1 record, despite a 3.30 ERA and poor defensive support. George Suggs was the only other pitcher to win in double figures, going 11-14, 4.79. Aging Chief Bender was 7-18, 5.67 and Rankin Johnson, acquired in mid-year from Chicago, went 7-13, 3.59. Lefty Bill Bailey was 5-17, 5.78 before being traded to Chicago late in the season.

The Terps defense was a sieve, leading the Federal League in errors committed with 209 miscues, which led to 157 unearned runs.


Joe Agler, who started the season with Buffalo and was traded to Baltimore, had a miserable season, hitting only .154 . and was a defensive liability at first base. Agler did manage to draw 50 BB .



Brooklyn 1b Hap Myers hit 298 for the Tip-Tops and stole 36 bases.


After hitting only . 139 in 25 games with Chicago, Al Wickland was traded from the Whales to Pittsburgh, where he took over and hit. 283 for the Rebels.

The Brooklyn Tip-Tops had the league's most prolific offense, hitting a league-best .261 and .320 OBP, scored a league-high 697 runs and also led the league in stolen bases with 236 swipes. The Tips pitching, unfortunately, was almost a total opposite from the offense, ranking seventh in the league at 3.63 , allowing 536 runs and allowed the second most BB with 503 walks allowed.

The pennant-winning Chicago Whales ranked third in batting (.248) and third in pitching (2.77 ERA). What distinguished the Whales offense was their power, pounding out 81 home runs slugging at a .356 clip, leading the Fed in both categories slugging. The Whales also led the league in bases on balls (491).

Lowly Baltimore surprisingly ranked fourth in batting (.241) and scored 580 runs, but were undone by a pitching staff that had a stratospheric (for the times) 4.59 ERA and led the league in runs allowed (855) and hits allowed (1649) by wide margins

Runner-up Newark had outstanding pitching (2.42 ERA) with 92 complete games and 17 shutouts and ranked second in the Fed in batting (.242) but had the second-fewest walks in the league (427) and a hollow . 306 OBP. The Pepper lead the league in three-base hits with 83 triples but were dead last in home runs with 26.

Buffalo had the least productive offense in the league, hitting only .223, ten points worse than Kansas City, which ranked seventh, and had the worst OBP in the Fed at.283. Not surprisingly, the Blues were dead last in runs scored and slugging.


## Chicago's Dutch Zwilling and George McConnell headline '15 Fed All Stars

Pitching dominated the 1915 Federal League All-Star team with all five All-Star starters winning 20 or more games and posting ERA below 2.00 and St. Luis starter-reliever Doc Crandall, who also won a total of 20 games, including three relief wins, posting a miniscule 0.37 ERA as a reliever.

Chicago's George McConnell (26-8, 1.90), was the Federal League Cy Young winner. McConnell was the catalyst for the Whales successful late season drive that overtook Newark. McConnell won 10 straight starts from Aug. 2-Sept. 21, all of them complete games, while posting a 1.78 ERA and beating Newark twice during the win streak. Earlier in the season, McConnell reeled off nine wins in a row from May 5 -June 13, keeping the Whales in contention in the early going.

A close contender for the Cy Young award was St. Louis Terrier Dave Davenport, who was 27-14 for a Terrier team that only had a sputtery offense. Davenport threw six shutouts, including a 5-0 no-hitter over Buffalo on July 6, which started a run of 10 wins in 11 starts through August 14. In his 14 losses, Davenport only allowed a total of 26 runs in five of the losses in games in which the Terriers failed to score. Davenport led the Fed in strikeouts (211), innings pitched (364) and complete games (27) and also saved two games.

Newark's Ed Reulbach and Earl Moseley were a potent one-two combo for the Pepper. Reulbach was 21-9 with a league-leading 1.32 ERA. Reulbach started the season going 10-2 before losing 1-0 in back-to-back losses at Pittsburgh and Chicago, and then winning his next eight in a row. Moseley was 21-10, 191 strikeouts, with two no-hit wins, both over Chicago, along with a one- hitter, four two-hit wins and six three-hit wins.

Rounding out the All-Star team starting five was St. Louis lefty Eddie Plank (20-11, 1.34, second in the league in ERA). From July 23Aug 20, Plank threw four shutouts, part of his season total of seven shutouts.

Earning the MVP award was Chicago CF Dutch Zwilling, who hit . 290 and led the Federal League with 106 RBIs and with All-Star 1b Hal Chase for the league HR and doubles lead. Zwilling led the league in slugging (.498). What really distinguished Zwilling's performance was his ability to deliver in key situations, including a standout performance in a September head-to-head series at Newark, where he went 8-16 with a pair of homers to key a four-game sweep that put Chicago ahead for good in the pennant race.

A strong contender for MVP honors was outfielder Steve Evans, who split his season between Brooklyn and Baltimore. Evans led the league in batting (.351), OBP (.442), and base hits (190), 22 hit by pitches, and sac flies (12). He also ranked second in the league with 104 RBIs, fourth in $\mathrm{BB}(76)$ and third in slugging (.464). What really set Evans apart was his defensive ability Evans powerful throwing arm consistently kept runners from advancing on base while throwing out 14 baserunners. Neither Brooklyn nor Baltimore, however, were able to capitalize on Evans hard-hitting presence in their lineups, both finishing in the second division.

Not on the All-Star team, but certainly worthy of recognition, was Newark's CF Benny Kauff, who was second to Evans in batting (.323), OBP (.423) and stole 57 bases, second in the league to St. Louis All-Star LF Ward Miller, who hit . 303 and stole 58 bases, one more than Kauff.

The remainder of the All-Star infield was lackluster with 2b Lee Magee, Brooklyn (.289, 63 RBI, 27 SB) , SS Jimmy Esmond, Newark (.247, 60 RBI) and 3b Pittsburgh's Mike Mowrey (.243, 73 RBI).

Chicago's All-Star C Art Wilson not only provided sound defensive play, but was an offensive force, hitting . 348 in 93 games and ranking third in HR with 15 round-trippers. Wilson also walked 57 times and drove in 57 runs.

## Position players

## 1914 MVP Benny Kauff unable to repeat 1914 performance, but still had outstanding season



Brooklyn's Benny Kauff was one of the three contenders for MVP consideration, but fell short of making the All-Star team, pre-empted by Chicago's Dutch Zwilling.

Transferred by the league to Brooklyn from Indianapolis before the season got underway, Kauff hit consistently well throughout the 1915 season, but unable to duplicate the kind of performance that earned him All-Star honors in the 1914 replay. In mid-season, on July 12, Kauff was hitting . 341 and appeared poised to take over the Federal League batting lead, but he could hit no more than .305 for the rest of the season and wound up with a . 323 BA for the season, well behind Steve Evans, who hit a league-best 351 .

Still, Kauff had an outstanding year, leading the Federal League in runs scored (109) and finishing second in SB (57) and bases on balls (86). Some of the highlights of Kauff's season:

Newark June 13-July 8: 15-game hitting streak with a .390 batting average. June 14-17: 9-18 .500, six runs in four-game series v. Baltimore
Sept 14: 3R triple, 2R single, 5 RBIs in 8-3 win over Buffalo
Catching combo of Art Wilson and William Fischer added solid punch to Whales offense


Two of Chicago's most productive players were C Art Wilson and C William Fischer. While they were not able to be on the field at the same time, their combined impact on Chicago's offense was substantial.

Wilson, the league's All-Star C, hit a team-best . 348 and . 456 OBP, while ranking second in the league in home runs (15) and driving in 57 runs. Fischer hit .317 and drove in 31 runs while hitting five HR.

When totaled together, Chicago's two catchers
 proved to be an offensive force, hitting a combined .331 with a .408 OBP, 20 HRs and 98 RBIs and 81 BB, giving the Whales an offensive advantage at catcher no other team possessed.

## Buffalo's Hal Chase tied for Federal league lead in home runs and doubles

Blues 1b Hal Chase was the only real offensive threat in a Buffalo lineup that was the poorest offense in the league. Despite pitchers being able to pitch around him, Chase tied with Chicago's Dutch Zwilling for the league lead in doubles (38) and home runs (21). Six of his home runs were three-run homers, which were instrumental in five of Buffalo's 65 wins for the year. He drove in 98 runs, third in the league.

Chase also stole 31 bases, including a steal of home that was instrumental in
 Buffalo defeating Pittsburgh 4-3 on Sept. 10.

Tip-Tops LF Claude Cooper was one of league's top hitters


Kauff's Brooklyn teammate, LF Claude Cooper, hit . 300 for the 1915 replay, one of five FL players to reach the .300 mark. For the season, he drove in 76 runs and ranked fourth in SB with 31 swipes. Cooper's 388 OBP was third in the league.

Cooper's season was highlighted by two hitting streaks. He hit. 375 in a 10-game streak from May 25-June 3, driving in nine runs. From June 26-July 8, Cooper hit in 13 consecutive games, hitting .340. He had two five-hit games in the campaign, one against Newark on April 17 and 5-5 v. the Terriers on August 26.

## Terriers Ward Miller edged Benny Kauff for SB crown

Speedy St. Louis LF Ward Miller was the surprise winner of the ' 15 stolen base title, edging Brooklyn's Benny Kauff in the stolen base department. Miller (D31 steal rating) stole 58 bases and was caught only nine times.

Miller's ability to steal bases was of the two primary cogs in a generally weak Terriers offense. Batting in front of 1b Babe Borton, who drove in 69 runs, Miller scored 80 times. He twice stole four bases in a single game, once on May 21 in a 9-3 win against Baltimore and the other in a $5-2$ win over Newark, twice stealing second and third base in the victory.

Miller finished the year with a 13-game hitting streak, batting . 352 from Sept. 11 until the end of the season on Sept. 26. His 303 season batting average made him one of only five qualifying batters that reached the 300 mark for the season. Miller drove in 58 runs, second on the Terriers.


## St. Louis loss of Charlie Deal changed the Terriers offense after mid-June

Terriers 3b Charlie Deal was the heart of the St. Louis offense for the first half of the season. In real life, Deal was lost to the Terriers due to typhoid fever prematurely ending his season. In the replay, Deal deactivated on June 27, the Terriers the 71st game.

With Deal in the lineup, St. Louis was 41-30, .577, only three games behind Chicago and Newark, who were tied for the league lead when Deal left on June 27. The Terriers played at the same pace (48-35, .578) for the rest of 1915 , but were increasingly dependent on their strong-armed pitching staff to remain competitive.


During his foreshortened season, Deal led the Federal league in batting with a strong .358 batting average and . 388 OBP. From May 2-16, he reeled off a 12-game hitting streak, hitting 476 with 20 hits in 42 at-bats. On May 3 , he stole five bases in while going 3-3 with a BB, leading the Terriers to a 3-2 win over Buffalo. In the opener of the Terriers Memorial Day (May 31) game with Pittsburgh, Deal went 4-4 and hit a two-run homer off the Rebels Elmer Knetzer in a 4-1 win

## Newark's Al Scheer was Pepper's leading hitter in 1915 replay

Lacking Benny Kauff's bat for the 1915 season, the Newark Pepper relied on the hitting of LF Al Scheer. A left-handed hitter, Scheer hit. 270 for the season and led the Pepper with 76 RBIs with 151 hits and 81 runs scored, all tops on the team. His 22 SB were second on the Pepper, five behind team SB leader Edd Roush.

On May 5-7, Scheer was the star of the series in a three-game shutout sweep over Pittsburgh. On May 5, he scored the winning run in a 1-0 win over the Rebels. On May 6, he drove in a run and triples as the Pepper blanked Pittsburgh 3-0. In the finale, he was 24 with a ninth-inning RBI double to clinch a 2-0 win over Pitt. On June 13-14, Scheer homered in two straight games, hitting a solo shot off Baltimore's Chief Bender on May 1 in an 8-3 win and hitting another solo HR the next day, off Buffalo's Russ Ford, while also hitting a double and triple as the Pepper beat the Blues 11-3.

## Ed Konetchy was best hitter in weak Pitt offense

Pittsburgh's anemic offense, which finish sixth in the league in batting, had to battle for runs, as evidenced by their 93 sacrifices, far and away the most in the Fed. The Rebels leading hitter was Ed Konetchy, who was the heart of an inconsistent offense. Konetchy drove in 102 runs while hitting . 280 and a . 433 slugging percentage. He totaled 58 extra-base hits including 33 doubles, 14 triples and 11 home runs while scoring 74 runs, all tops on the team. Two of his 11 home runs came off Chicago's Claude Hendrix and two other came off Buffalo's Al Schulz. Without Konetchy's solid hitting, it is doubtful the Rebels could have finished higher than sixth.


Konetchy hit a three-run HR off Buffalo's Ed Lafitte and drove in six as the Stogies edged Buffalo 12-11 on July 7. In early August, against the Whales Aug 5-8, Konetchy hit . 562 for the four-game series, driving in six runs.

## Terrier 1b Babe Borton led league with 89 walks

St. Louis first sacker Babe Borton hit. 279 and and his 69 RBIs led the Terriers, but he was even better about getting on base himself, leading the league with 89 BB . His 76 runs scored ranked second on the team, behind Ward Miller, the team's only other dependable batsman.

From July 12-16, Borton had an remarkable run, going 17-24, .708. The streak started on July 12, when Borton went 5-5 with a double and triple as the Terriers won at Buffalo 8-3. Heading into Baltimore, Borton continued his hot batting, going 11-15, .733 in the four-game series, driving in five runs and walking four times, leading St. Louis to a sweep of the Terrapins.

Led by Claude Hendrix, who hit six HRs and George McConnell, who hit two HRs, the Whales pitchers totaled 30 extra-base hits and had a slugging average of .307 and score a league-high 52 runs.

## Pitching standouts

For the second straight replay season, eight Federal League pitchers won 20 or more games. Only one of the eight, however, repeated from the 1914 replay, Claude Hendrix of Chicago.

The Terriers produced three 20-game winners: RHP Dave Davenport (27-14), along with lefty Eddie Plank and starter-reliever Doc Crandall, both 20-11. Chicago's George McConnell, the 1915 Cy Young winner, joined Hendrix in the 20 -win circle.

The three other 20-game winners were Newark's Ed Reulbach (21-9) and Earl Moseley (21-10) and hardworking Buffalo lefty Al Schulz (20-17).

## St. Louis righty Dave Davenport carried Terriers pitching load

Davenport, who was only 11-15 for the 1914 Terriers replay, came into his own in the 1915 replay, just missing the Cy Young award. The righthander was the hardestworking pitcher in the Federal League replay, leading the league in games appeared (48), starts (44), while going 27-14, 1.95, with a league-leading 27 complete games and five shutout wins. He led the league with 211 strikeouts and 364 innings pitched.

From July 6 through Aug. 14, Davenport was 11-1 with three shutouts. highlighted by a no-hitter over Buffalo on July 10. As the pennant race headed toward its conclusion, the heavy toll on Davenport began to tell as he went 5-7 from Aug. 19 until the end of the season.

Besides his no-hit win over the Blues, Davenport threw three two-hit wins and six three-hit wins and totaled six shutouts.

## Terriers Doc Crandall notches 20-win season as starter and spot reliever



St. Louis righthander Doc Crandall, like his teammate Dave Davenport, shouldered a heavy load for the pitching-dependent Terriers. Crandall was 17-10 as a starter for St. Louis and also picked up three wins and one loss in relief, as well as four saves.

From mid-August through the end of the campaign, Crandall picked up the load from the tiring Dave Davenport, winning seven of his last 10 decisions, including his final three starts in September. He won his 20th game on the next-to-last day of the season.

In addition to his pitching duties, Crandall hit .261 as a batter, including a pair of hits as a pinch-hitter

## KC lefties Nick Cullop, Gene Packard led Packers

Kansas City fell into the second division in the early going of the replay, but the left-handed combo of Nick Cullop and Gene Packard kept the Pack in the running for fourth place throughout the season.

Cullop (19-12, 2.04) hurled a league-best 10 shutouts, including a marathon 15 -inning $3-0$ win at Chicago on Sept. 15. Packard (17-15, 2.73) was erratic during the season, but was still a force on the hill. He threw back-to-back 1-0 shutout wins over Baltimore on Sept 11 and Chicago on Sept. 16.


Newark trio of Ed Reulbach, Earl Mosely, George Kaiserling fell just short in pennant bid


Newark's pitching was the best in the league, but not enough to offset an offense that lacked much punch and was dependent on stringing together singles and utilizing speed to score.

Ed Reulbach, a key performer for Brooklyn in the 1914 NL replay, led the Federal League with a 1.32 ERA, got off to a great 10-2 start before losing back-to-back 1-0 games to Pittsburgh's Bunny Hearn and Chicago's Claude Hendrix. He rebounded to win his next eight in a row to improve to $18-4$, but then began to tire, going 3-6 from August 16 through the end of the season, finishing 21-9.

Reulbach's Newark teammate Earl Moseley's season was almost a polar opposite
 Reulbach's, starting out 3-4 before no-hitting Chicago 6-0 on May 26. Even after his no-hit win, Moseley was not quite in the groove, losing four of his next seven decisions plus a couple of no-decision starts. On July 4, Mosley threw a threehitter at Kansas City and, from that point forward, was 14-2 the rest of the season, including a second no-hitter against the Whales on July 23.

George Kaiserling (19-9, 2.33) was a steady performer all season long, but missed two opportunities to win 20 games, losing to Buf falo 2-1 in 10 innings on Sept. 21 and the recording a no-decision at Brooklyn in the Pepper's final series, giving up five runs in seven innings in a 7-6 loss.

## Baltimore's Jack Quinn recorded winning record for last place Terps

The most curious pitching record in the 1915 replay belonged to Baltimore Terrapin ace Jack Quinn, the 1914 replay Cy Young winner. Despite playing with a team that had the worst defense and supporting cast of pitchers in the league, Quinn managed to go 18-12, 3.30. He got off to a surprising 10-2 start, including a six-game winning streak from Apr. 15-May 7, but could not keep up the pace for the entire season as the Terrapins spiraled downward in the standings. Quinn threw five shutouts in the 1915 replay.


## Buffalo's Al Schulz battled down stretch to win 20 games

Buffed lefty Al Schulz (20-17) had the misfortune of being saddled with the league's worst offense, but battled all season long and recorded his $20^{\text {th }}$ win on Sept. 17 with a $7-3$ win at Brooklyn. From Aug. 18 through the end of the season, Schulz was 6-3, including a five-game win streak, pitching himself into the 20 -game circle.

Schulz threw five shutouts, including a 3-0 one-hitter at St. Louis on Aug. 30. During a three-game losing streak in August, the Blues only scored two-runs in support of Schulz, who lost 1-0 and 3-1 to Newark and 2-1 at Chicago.

## 1915 Federal League pinch hitting



Federal League pinch hitters averaged .229 in the 1915 replay, almost the same as the 1914 Federal League average (.233).

The Kansas City Packers had the highest team batting average (.260) and seventhplace Buffalo had the most pinch hits (24) while last-place Baltimore had the most RBIs (11).

The leading pinch-hitter in the league was Pittsburgh's Ed Lennox, whose pinchhit totals far surpassed anyone else in the league. Lennox had 15 pinch-hits in 52 at bats (.288), with five doubles. He drove in eight runs. He also walked six times and had a .367 OBP as a pinch hitter.

## CF Dutch Zwilling had outstanding season; edged Evans for MVP honors

Chicago CF Dutch Zwilling was the Whales offensive leader and, throughout the season, delivered in key moments for Chicago, earning him the 1915 Fed MVP award for 1915.

One of the few legitimate power hitters in the league, Zwilling led the league in RBIs (106) and tied with Buffalo's Hal Chase for the league title in home runs (21) and doubles (38). For the season, he hit .290 with an OBP of .358, stealing 19 bases and walking 74 times.

Zwilling had two extended hitting streaks during the latter part of the season, both instrumental in enabling the Whales to catch and pass Newark down the stretch. From Aug. $4-16$, Zwilling hit . 438 in a 12-game streak. In September, when the Whales needed his bat the most, Zwilling had a 10-game hit streak during which he hit . 341 with five HRs and 13 RBIs and went 8-16 as the Whales swept Newark in a four-game series on the road to pull four games ahead in mid-September.

Zwilling's only weakness was his defensive play. He committed 15 errors and baserunners were able to take advantage of his weak throwing arm

## Season Steve Evans leads Federal League batters from mid-June through end of season

OF Steve Evans was at or near the batting title league throughout the entire 1915 replay. During the first two months of the season, St. Louis 3b Charlie Deal was the batting leader but, after Deal was disabled in late June, Evans moved to the top of the batting leaderboard and never looked back.

At the end of June, Evans led the league with a gaudy .387 batting average with Deal in second place at .367 and Brooklyn's Benny Kauff third at . 351 .

Kauff narrowed the cap to .350 v Evans .353 at the end of July, at which time Deal, who was de-activated because of illness, was no longer a factor in the batting race. By the end of August, Evans pulled well out in front of Kauff, .347-.327, and the spread remained about the same by season's end, with Evans hitting . 351 to Kauff's . 323 .

## Brooklyn went on scoring rampage in April

Brooklyn's offense looked like world-beaters during April, outscoring their opponents 104-46 for the month, while going 10-8.

The Tips exploded for 42 runs in two games on April 17-18. At Newark, on April 17, Brooklyn scored nine runs in the fourth inning and seven more in the seventh, while piling up 26 hits in a 23-6 runaway. The Tips were led SS Milt Reed (6 RBI, including a 2R HR), RF Steve Evans (5 RBI) and 1b Claude Cooper (5-6, 4 RBI, including a 2R HR). The next day, the Tip-Tops again totaled 26 hits while bludgeoning Baltimore 19-4, scoring eight runs in the fifth inning. Seven Tip-Top batters had three hits in the game, but only two of the 26 hits were for extra bases.

Less than a week later, on April 23, Brooklyn scored seven runs in the first inning, including a bases-loaded triple by $\mathrm{Al} \mathrm{Halt}$, as they buried Buffalo 9-0, behind Happy Finneran, who threw a three-hitter. On April 27, they again scored 19 runs as they slammed Baltimore 19-3, with P Tom Seaton going 5-6 with 6 RBIs and Steve Evans hitting two HRs with four RBIs.

Kansas City's erratic offense totaled 21 LOB in pair of early season losses to St. Louis. The Packers were adept at getting men on base in back-to-back losses at St. Louis on Apr 19-20, but only scored five runs while losing 11-2 and 4-3. KC left 10 men on base in the 11-2 defeat and the next day left 10 on base, including the bases loaded in the ninth inning, while losing 4-3 on April 20.

Baltimore overcomes 9-1 deficit for win over Terriers. On May 20, with the game tied 1-1 in the sixth, St. Louis jumped on Baltimore's Jack Quinn for eight runs to pull ahead 9-1. The Terps rebounded, however, for six runs in the bottom of the inning against St. Louis starter Bob Groom and went on to score three more runs in the final two innings for a stirring 10-9 ceomfrom behind victory over the Terriers.

Brooklyn and Baltimore slugged it out in four-game series in June. Brooklyn's hard-hitting offense again staged another impressive performance as they swept a four-game series over Baltimore June 5-7. The Tips hit . 357 in the four games, scoring 38 runs with newly acquired Steve Evans going 10-16, . 625 with 8 RBIs and Lee Magee going 11-21. The series sweep, however was not a runaway. Baltimore hit. 319 in the four games and scored 25 runs.

Chicago pushed over five runs in the ninth inning for a 7-5 come-from-behind win against Newark on July 7. A walkoff two-run HR by Max Flack with two-out in the bottom of the ninth, off Pepper reliever Chick Brandom, was the game winner.

Chicago blew a 7-1 lead in the ninth inning when Kansas City scored six times to tie the game. The Whales, who accumulated $\mathbf{2 1}$ hits in the game, finally outlasted the Packers 8-7 in 15 innings.

## Chicago's Claude Hendrix excelled at the plate and on the mound.

Whales righthander Claude Hendrix enjoyed a terrific year both pitching and batting. His six home runs left him just outside the Top Ten home run hitters in the league.

Baserunning exploits: On April 17, Pittsburgh 2b Steve Yerkes scored from first on a base hit by Jim Kelly in first inning of a 5-4 Rebels win over KC. LF Guy Zinn scored from first on a single by Steve Evans on July 21 as Terp ace Jack Quinn blanked the KC Packer 7-0. The next day, July 22, Brooklyn 2b duplicated the feat, scoring from first on single by Claude Cooper as the Tip-Tops lost to St. Louis 6-4.

Buffalo RHP Gene Krapp walked 10 in a long relief assignment for losing pitcher Russ Ford against Brooklyn in a 16-1 loss on May 30. Krapp was 9-23 for Buffalo in the 1915 replay.


Pittsburgh's Cy Barger was on the losing end of two 1-0 decisions. He lost to Buffalo's Hugh Bedient on May 26 and Baltimore’s Jack Quinn on Aug. 21.


## Pitching Notes

Cy Young winner George McConnell was at his best down the stretch. McConnell won his last 10 decisions in a row from August 2 through the end of the season. On Aug 16 and Aug 21, he threw back-to-back shutouts against Buffalo and Boston followed by a 3-1 three-hitter to beat Newark's Ed Reulbach 3-1.
He also beat Newark a second time during his winning streak, edging Tom Seaton 5-4 at Newark on September 10. Earlier in the season, McConnell reeled off nine wins in a row from May 5- through June 13, including shutouts against Buffalo and Kansas City.

In an exceptional relief appearance, St. Louis lefty Eddie Plank threw 10 shutout innings, allowing only one hit and 2 BB in a 2-1, 20-inning loss to Chicago on Apr 15.

## Newark's Harry Moran got off to great start, but fell apart in the stretch.

Pepper righty Harry Moran started the 1915 replay with nine consecutive wins before losing 3-2 to at Kansas City on June 25 . He then won five of his next six to improve his record to a gaudy 15-2. During September, however, Moran lost the magic, going 0-4, losing starts to Chicago 7-3 and Baltimore 10-2 and then losing two games in relief to Brooklyn in the Pepper's final four games of the year, blowing a 6-5 lead in the finale to lose 7-6.

Veteran KC righthander Chief Johnson threw back-to-back 1-0 shutouts in July. Johnson threw a two-hitter to beat Brooklyn's Frank Smith 1-0 July 15 and followed up
 four days later with a 1-0 one-hitter to beat Buffalo's Fred Anderson.

Kansas City's Alex Main did not allow an earned run in three consecutive starts. In the second game of the Packer's Memorial Day doubleheader on May 31, Main lost to Chicago 5-2, but all five Whales runs were unearned, resulting from four Packer errors. Main won his next two starts, both against St. Louis, beating the Terriers Bob Groom 5-3 on June 5, allowing three runs, all unearned and, two days later, beating Eddie Plank z4-1, with the Terriers lone run unearned as the result of an error by (insert).

In late June, Newark's Ed Reulbach lost a 1-0 decision to Pittsburgh's Bunny Hearn, allowing only four hits over eight innings. In his next start, against Chicago, it was déjà vu, with Reulbach again giving up only four hits and a lone run over eight innings, only to lose to Claude Hendri, giving Reulbach back-to-back 1-0 defeats.

A month after Reulbach suffered his twin 1-0 losses, the same thing happened to Pittsburgh's Clint Rogge, who also lost back-to-back 1-0 decisions in mid-season. On July 26, Rogge lost 1-0 to Bob Groom and, in his next start, lost 1-0 to Nick Cullop.

Cy Falkenberg, who spent most of the season with Newark, was acquired by Brooklyn on August 7. After splitting his first two decisions with the Tip-Tops, Falkenberg demonstrated the form that made him a force with Cleveland in 1913 and 1914, throwing shutouts in two of his last three starts, blanking St. Louis 7-0 on one hit on Sept. 10 and, two starts later, throwing a 4-0 three-hitter at Baltimore. In between the shutouts, Falkenberg lost a heartbreaker to Buffalo's Fred Anderson, going 10 innings only to lose 1-0.

Baltimore's Jack Quinn got off to a remarkable start for the last-place Terrapins, winning nine of ten from Apr 15-May 31 for dazzling 10-2 record to start the season. As summer progressed, however, the wins became more difficult to come by and Quinn went 8-10 for the rest of year, but still wound up with a very respectable 18-12 record for the cellar-dwelling Terps.

George LcClair, dealt from Buffalo to Baltimore in mid-season, lost his first three starts for the Terps, but finished strong, winning three of his final four decisions, including a three-hit 3-0 win over KC and a 2-0 five hitter to beat Buffalo.

KC back-to-back shutouts over Chicago in September. In one of the best pitching duels of the 1915 replay, KC's Nick Cullop beat Chicago 3-0 in 15 innings on Sept. 15. Cullop went the distance, giving up only five hits. Whales righthander Mike Prendergast threw 12 scoreless innings, allowing only two hits. KC finally won the game in the $15^{\text {th }}$, scoring three runs off Claude Hendrix, on in relief for Prendergast. The next day, KC victimized Whales veteran Three-Finger Brown, who gave up only three hits, but lost to lefty Gene Packard 1-0. Newark, trying to get back into the lead at this stage of the race, was only able to split with Baltimore and only gained one game against the Whales.

Whales lefty Ad Brennan (10-3) won three key games down the stretch. Brennan won three decisions in a row from Sept. 3-18. Brennan beat Buffalo 4-3, despite giving up a 2R HR to Hal Chase on Sept. 3. He then beat KC 9-2 on Sept. 14 and then won in relief against Pittsburgh 5-2 on Sept. 18.

Newark's Ed Reulbach (21-9) was the only pitcher to go 7-0 against a single opponent during the 1915 replay. Reulbach was a perfect 7-0 against Buffalo. Reulbach was also a perfect 5-0 against Kansas City.

St. Louis ace Dave Davenport (27-14) also won seven, with an impressive 7-1record against the champion Chicago Whales. He also was a five-game winner against KC, going 5-2 against the Packers.

The ony pitcher to win win six games against another team was Terriers lefty Eddie Plank, who was 6-0 against Newark.
Ten pitchers racked up five wins again other opponents with Davenport and Cy Young winner George McConnell winning five against two separate teams. Six diefferent pitchers were five game losers against other teams with Buffalo's Hugh Bedient going 1-5 against both Newark and St. Louis.

Kansas City right Chief Johnson was 5-2 against Baltimore and 1-5 against Newark. Al Schulz (20-17) was the only twentygame winner with five losses against a single opponent, going 1-5 v. Newark.

## Pepper hurler Farl Moseley no-hits league-leading Chicago Whales, fans nine.

Newark righthander Earl Moseley threw a no-hit gem to lift the Peppers over Chicago 6-0, pulling the Peppers to within three games of the Federal League lead. The win evened Moseley's record at 4-4 and was his third shutout of the season and improved Newark's record to 23-18. Chicago, who list the opener of the three-game series to Newark's George Kaiserling 5-1 the day before, fell to 26-15.

Mosley only allowed five baserunners, three via walks, while striking out nine. Mosley walked Dutch Zwilling in the first inning, Bill Jackson in the second inning and, with two outs in the ninth, issued a walk to Whales C Art Wilson, who was returning to the Chicago lineup after 10 days on the injured list. Only one Whales batter, Al Wickland, reached second, stealing the base after getting aboard via a fielder's choice in the first.

Two batters, losing pitcher Mike Prendergast and SS Joe Tinker, got aboard via errors by Pepper 1b Emil Huhn and 2b Jack Farrell.


The Peppers gave Mosely a 2-0 lead in the first on a two-run double by Frank LaPorte. Newark added two more in the fourth when Emil Huhn and Edd Roush both scored on a two-base error by Whales 3b Rollie Zeider. Newark also scored two more single runs late in the game on a sac fly by C Bill Rariden and an RBI single by Huhn.

Moseley's no-hitter was the second straight Newark win over Chicago. The Peppers won the opener of the three-game series with a 5-1 win behind George Kaiserling.

## George Kaiserling throws no-hitter for Peppers; edges Buffalo 1-0



Righthander George Kaiserling recorded Newark 's second no-hitter within a three-week span, outdueling Buffalo's Hugh Bedient 1-0. The win was the second-place Peppers' eighth straight win and kept them within three games of league-leading Chicago.

Kaiserling missed a perfect game by only one batter, walking Blues leadoff man Benny Meyer to lead off the fourth inning. Meyer stole second, but that was the only offense generated by the Blues, who lost their fifth in a row. In completing his no-hit gem, Kaiserling recorded 15 outs via ground balls and struck out three Blues hitters.
Even though Kaiserling threw a no-hitter, his victory was not an eacy win. Buffalo's Hugh Bedient only allowed five hits and did not give up a run until two outs in the bottom of the ninth, when Peppers SS Jimmy Esmond, aboard via an error by Bedient, slid home ahead of a throw to the plate by Blues SS Roxey Roach. The unearned run handed Bedient his seventh loss of the campaign while Kaiserling improved to 8-3 on the season.

The win lifted Newark's record to 38-23 ). The Blues (24-37) remained mired in last place in the Federal League, tied with Pittsburgh and Baltimore.

Rebels' Konetchy hits three-run HR to win game, drives in six in slugfest
Pittsburgh 1b Ed Konetchy drove in six runs to lead the sixth-place Rebels (38-44) to a wild 1211 win over seventh place Buffalo (34-38), capping his big day with a three-run home run in in the eighth inning that proved to be the game winner in a wild back-and-forth game.

Pittsburgh got off to a fast start in the first when player-manager Rebel Oakes hit a three-run HR off Buffalo starter Ed Lafitte, making his first start for the Blues since being acquired from Brooklyn. After Buffalo scored in the top of the second, the Rebs piled up six more runs in the bottom of the inning, highlighted by a three-run double by Konetchy, seizing what looked like an insurmountable 9-1 lead. Ed Lafitte, who started for Buffalo, walked five in less than two innings of work, all of whom scored, before giving way to reliever George LeClair

Buffalo, however, rebounded in the top of the third, driving Pittsburgh starter Walt Dickson from the game with six hits, scoring five runs, to cut the Rebels lead to 9-6. The Blues added another run in the fourth on a pair of Rebel errors to make it 9-7. The Blues then took an 11-9 lead in the fifth with a four-run rally highlighted by an RBI single by Clyde Engle and a two-run double by SS Roxey Roach off Pittsburgh reliever Ralph Comstock.

Blues reliever LeClair had kept the Rebels scoreless from the second through the seventh, but ran into trouble in the eighth, giving up back-to-back singles to Marty Breghammer and Al Wickland and, two batters later, served up a three-run homer to Konetchy, his eighth HR of the 1915 season. Konetchy's HR gave the Rebels a 12-11 lead, which reliever Clint Rogge preserved in the ninth.

Pittsburgh has won five of its last seven games to tie them with Brooklyn, 12 games behind. For the Blues, the setback was their second straight loss, dropping them to sixteen games in back of league-leading Chicago.
